NEWS IN MINNESOTA

EVENTS OF A WEEK THROUGH-OUT THE STATE.

The state meeting of the Ancient Order of Hibernians will be held in Winona Sept. 18 to 20.

Richard Stack, nine years old, was drowned in the Mississippi river at Minneapolis while fishing.

Paul Schultz, thirteen years of age, was drowned in the Mississippi river at Minneapolis while bathing.

Roy Peterson, aged seven, was almost instantly killed at Minneapolis by being run over by a heavy lumber wagon.

During a heavy electrical storm the Norwegian Lutheran church of South Stillwater was struck by lightning and destroyed by fire.

Arthur Tibbitts, the twelve-year-old son of Rev. A. H. Tibbitts of Minneapolis, was drowned in the Mississippi river while bathing.

Henry Doerr, the twelve-year-old son of a Mankato cigarmaker, was drowned in the Minnesota river while bathing with a number of other boys.

The Duluth, Missabe and Northern road has completed its line into Holman and is fast pushing toward Boyer, where it will enter within the next few days.

Arthur McClellan fell into a vat of boiling water at the Swift Packing company's plant at South St. Paul and died a few hours later at the St. Paul city hospital.

The elevator of Bingham Bros. at New Ulm was struck by lightning and burned to the ground. The elevator was valued at \$10,000 and the grain destroyed at \$8,000.

Plans for the sanatorium for consumptives, which the state will build at Walker, have been completed by the architect and bids for construction will be opened shortly.

Burglars broke into the vault in the city clerk's office at Minneapolis and stole \$483.75 in cash. There was more than \$1,200 in the vault, but the robbers overlooked a portion of it.

The German Evangelical Lutheran synod of Minnesota and other states, in annual session at Sanborn, this state, condemned all secret societies and warned its members not to join them.

Gilbert Webster, one of the early settlers of Blue Earth county, died suddenly of heart disease. He was a member of the Mapleton colony that located in this state in 1856, coming from the East.

In the case of Lawrence Martin vs. J. J. McDonald, for damages from a shot in the back while in the latter's saloon at Swan River last December, the jury returned a verdict for the plaintiff of \$600.

Mrs. Mary Hanson, thirty-eight years of age, committed suicide at Minneapolis by taking poison. The rash act is believed by her friends to be due to grief over the death of several of her children.

The huge water tank on the top of a five-story wholesale building at Duluth gave away and fell to the dock in the rear, letting loose 15,000 gallons of water that flooded the building from roof to basement.

The dead body of Marvin Losey, former deputy sheriff of Polk county, this state, and a well known politician of Populist days, was found in his room at Seattle, Wash. Death was caused by inhaling gas.

John Alexander Dowle of Zion City, Ill., is charged by the state dairy and food commission with attempting to dodge the Minnesota pure food law by selling for lard at Winona a composition of tallow and cottonseed oil.

David P. Jones will try for the Republican nomination for the office of mayor of Minneapolis, in which he has served a portion of one term by appointment of the city council and is now serving a complete term by election of the voters.

The decision by Attorney General Moody in favor of the state of Minnesota in the swamp land grant matter is the cause of considerable joy to Attorney General Young, who has been pushing the state claims. The claims involve 150,000 acres, of which about 100,000 were disputed.

The supreme court has rendered a decision holding that all railroads operating in the state must construct their own bridges without monetary aid from the locality wherein the bridge is being erected. The railroad companies must also maintain safety devices at all public crossings and without compensation.

Emmet Wallace, who has traveled with shows and museums as "the glass eater," was found in a serious condition on the streets of St. Paul and was taken to the city hospital by the police. The man complained of stomach troubles, which the physicians at the hospital say is not surprising, considering his diet.

Mrs. Stella Brennan, accused of having killed three of her stepchildren and now serving a term in the Stillwater penitentiary on a charge of murder, has taken first steps in an effort to secure her freedom by retrial of her case. Notice of a motion for new trial has been served upon A. J. Smith, county attorney, and filed in the Hennepin county district court.

The mayor of Browns Valley has served notice on the dispensers of intoxicants that the Minnesota state law against the sale of liquor to Indians will be enforced unless such sale is discontinued. This notice is intended to counteract the decision of the United States supreme court holding that Indians who have complied with the land in severalty act are full sedged citizens of the United States.

WORK OF CONGRESS.

Tuesday, June 26. Senate—Railroad rate bill sent back to conference; naval appropriation bill finally passed.

House—Omnibus public building bill passed after an hour's consideration; general deficiency bill, the last of the supply measures, taken up; railroad rate bill sent to conference.

Wednesday, June 27. House—General deficiency bill, last of the big appropriation measures, passed; also the senate bill providing for a lock type of canal on the isthmus of Panama.

Senate—Naturalization bill passed; greater part of the day devoted to discussion of measures now in conference.

Thursday, June 28. Senate—Greater part of day spent in discussing the public building bill. The time being occupied in the main by efforts on the part of individual senators to secure increases of amounts allotted for public buildings in cities and towns of their respective states.

House—Conferees on agricultural bill instructed not to recede from their position on meat inspection; many bills on the private calendar passed.

Friday, June 29. Senate—Day devoted to consideration of conference reports, including the railroad rate bill, the pure food bill and the meat inspection provision of the agricultural bill. All were adopted.

House—Conference reports considered to the exclusion of all other business, half a dozen reports on important bills being adopted.

Saturday, June 30. Senate and House—Day devoted to final action on conference reports. Adjournment taken at 10 o'clock in the evening.

BRYAN IS ENDORSED

WISCONSIN DEMOCRATS FAVOR HIS NOMINATION FOR THE PRESIDENCY IN 1908.

Milwaukee, June 28.—The platform adopted by the Democratic state convention strongly endorses William Jennings Bryan as the Democratic candidate for president in 1908.

Among other things the platform demands enforcement of the statutes against all trusts, combinations and monopolies; favors revision of the present tariff; the election of United States senators by direct vote and government control and regulation of all public service corporations.

On state matters the report favors a law conferring upon municipalities power to regulate public service corporations; favors 2 cents per mile maximum passenger railroad rate; taxation on the ad valorem basis and amendments to the primary election law.

Tuesday, June 26. President Roosevelt has signed the postoffice appropriation bill.

Captain Aubrey Crocker, sixty years old, one of the best known yachting skippers in America, is dead at Cobasset, Mass.

The United Daughters of the Confederacy of the United States are to have a building at the Jamestown (Va.) exposition.

John Collins, aged twenty-three, and his sister, Clara Collins, aged eleven years, were drowned in Terbrush lake near Fenton, Mich.

Commander Booth-Tucker and Miss Minnie Reid were married Monday at the Salvation Army's citadel, South Tottenham, Eng., General Booth officiating.

Thomas F. Gunn, rector of the Church of the Immaculate Conception at Cedar Rapids, Ia., for the past forty years, died suddenly from a stroke of apoplexy.

Wednesday, June 27. Burglars blew open the safe in the postoffice at Bisbee, N. D., securing about \$160 in silver and \$300 in stamps.

Nearly 500 delegates are attending the second annual convention of the National Interstate Telephone association in Chicago.

At Chicago Frank Horvat killed his wife by cutting her throat with a razor and then gashed his own neck so badly that he cannot recover.

A powerful organization known as the Policyholders' Protective league has been formed by the business men of San Francisco to enforce fair treatment from all insurance companies.

Professor C. W. Pearson, a member of the faculty at Beloit (Wis.) college for nineteen years, has resigned and will receive a Carnegie pension. Professor Pearson has been teaching for forty years.

Thursday, June 28. Jere Dunn, a widely known sporting man, is dead at Elizabeth, N. J., of cancer.

Alexander Muir, author of Canada's national hymn, "The Maple Leaf," died suddenly at Toronto.

Three men were drowned in an oil tank at Waterbury, Conn. They were overcome by fumes and fell in.

Miss Eva Booth, commander of the Salvation Army in the United States, is seriously ill at her home in New York city.

Tugs have succeeded in floating the Italian steamer Vincenzo Ecomano, ashore off Fire Island, N. Y. The steamer went ashore June 17.

The 16,000-ton battleship New Hampshire will be launched from the yards of the New York Shipbuilding company at Camden, N. J., Saturday morning.

Friday, June 29. The president has signed the military academy appropriation bill.

The thirty-third annual Chautauqua assembly opened Thursday at Chautauqua, N. Y., with an attendance larger than usual.

Dr. Robert Craik, seventy-seven years old, dean of the medical faculty of McGill university from 1899 to 1901, is dead at Montreal.

Roy Peterson, aged seven, son of A. Peterson of Minneapolis, was instantly killed at New Boston under the wheels of a heavily loaded wagon.

Rudolph Lacher, aged eleven years, was drowned in the Mississippi river at St. Paul while playing with an older brother and two other companions.

District Attorney John B. Moran was given the gubernatorial nomination by Massachusetts prohibitionists in their state convention in Boston.

Saturday, June 30. John E. Bush, Hawaiian interpreter in the legislature and the courts, is dead at Honolulu.

Samuel J. Flickinger, a newspaper man, has been appointed private secretary to Governor Harris of Ohio.

Herman Schnibbe, a wealthy grocer of Brooklyn, was killed in a collision between his automobile and a trolley car.

William Graves, vice president and general manager of the Diamond Match company, is dead at Portland, Ore.

Secretary Root will accept the hospitality of Chile and make part of his trip along the west coast of South America on a Chilean warship.

Rev. William Alexander, D. D., LL. D., professor of church history in the Presbyterian Theological seminary, is dead at San Anselmo, Cal.

Monday, July 2. George Knox, who broke his neck and fractured his skull forty-six years ago, is dead at his home in New York city, aged ninety years.

Lawrence Hazen, ex-chief of Cincinnati detectives, widely known for breaking up gangs robbing Adams express cars in several states, is dead at Cincinnati.

A receivership for the Union Traction company of Chicago and its underlying companies has been applied for in the federal court by the Guaranty company of New York.

Rev. Father Kruska of Ripon, Wis., has received word that Archbishop Weber of Poland has been transferred to America, where he will have supervision of the entire Polish Catholic church in America.
