

NEWS IN MINNESOTA

EVENTS OF A WEEK THROUGH-OUT THE STATE.

Bradbury Richardson, postmaster at Glencoe, is dead, aged seventy-four.

James Ralston of Minneapolis, aged nineteen, was kicked to death by a horse.

C. L. Anderson, a substitute mail carrier, was killed by a street car at Minneapolis.

Rev. August Olson, for forty years a resident of Afton, is dead, aged seventy-eight years.

T. S. Gray, for a number of years manager of the West hotel, Minneapolis, died last week at Milwaukee.

Herman and Henry Schultz were badly injured at St. Paul when a street car hit an oil wagon upon which they were riding.

Alexander B. Lyon, for thirty years a conductor on the Hastings and Dakota division of the Milwaukee road, is dead at Minneapolis.

Rue M. Riegel, fifteen years old, only son of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Riegel, was drowned in the Mississippi river at St. Paul while bathing.

Frank Hodmarck, an eight-year-old boy, was drowned while bathing in a pool of water in a deserted quarry on the outskirts of Minneapolis.

The explosion of a mold used by the city railway company in welding rails at St. Paul injured several people by a shower of molten metal.

James T. McMillan, aged sixty-seven, one of St. Paul's pioneer citizens and the first man to establish a packing plant in that city, is dead.

Monday, Sept. 3, has been designated as Labor day by Governor Johnson in a proclamation in which he pays a high tribute to the laboring man.

W. R. Alexander of Two Harbors, a brakeman on the Duluth and Iron Range road, fell from engine No. 76 at Eveleth as the result of a sunstroke and was killed.

Frank Wenver is the first Blue Earth county farmer to finish threshing and reports a yield of twenty-two bushels of No. 2 wheat to the acre and forty-five bushels of oats.

Mrs. Augusta Windhorn, eighty-two years old, was fatally burned at her home in the town of Stark, Brown county, as a result of attempting to start a fire with kerosene.

Estimates furnished by passenger officials show that the railroads hauled in approximately 164,000 people to the Twin Cities last week on account of the G. A. R. national encampment.

While on his way home from work at Minneapolis Fred Krouse, eighteen years of age, was run into by a supply car on the street railway tracks and was so badly crushed that he died within a few hours.

William Wakefield, aged eighty-one, for fifty years a resident of St. Paul and one of the best known old settlers in the city, is dead. Mr. Wakefield had been ill but a short time and his death was due to old age.

The saloon of Albert Zinsky, West St. Paul, was held up at 3 o'clock in the afternoon by a lone highwayman. The bartender, Joe Gilowsky, was beaten into insensibility and the cash register was robbed of all it contained, amounting to \$15.

While trying to avoid a collision with a buggy containing a woman and two children Kenneth Rand, the eighteen-year-old son of A. T. Rand of Minneapolis, was thrown from his automobile at Excelsior and received injuries that may prove fatal.

August Bernhardt, a prominent farmer, committed suicide while in a field on his farm in the town and county of Nicollet. Death evidently resulted from poisoning, but the kind of drug used is not known. The body was found in the field after the man had been dead some time.

George Lally, who has had charge of the Minnesota Malting company's elevator at Rice station, Goodhue county, was found dead in the pasture where he had gone to milk the cow. He was forty years old and is survived by a family. It is presumed that death was due to heart failure.

A. L. Cole & Co. of Akeley have closed a deal with the Red River Lumber company for a forty-acre tract of land one and a half miles south of Akeley and at once will begin the construction of a packinghouse. It is said that the firm intends to buy up all of the available cattle in Northern Minnesota.

A popular appeal for campaign contributions has been sent broadcast throughout the state by the Republican state central committee. The appeal is signed by Chairman A. B. Cole and Secretary C. H. Warner and calls upon every voter in the state to contribute as generously as he can to the funds for the Republican battle this year.

In a circular to county auditors Attorney General Young advises that women had better be allowed to vote at the primaries for school superintendents. He does not withdraw his opinion recently given that women have no right to vote at the primaries, but since there has been some controversy on the question he advises that they be allowed to vote and the votes be kept separate.

Governor Johnson has ordered the railroad and warehouse commission to compel the three Northern roads to put into effect the grain rate which they proposed as a compromise early last week. The governor is of the opinion that if these roads were willing to make a reduction of 10 per cent on grain, which they can afford to do by their own statement, they should be compelled to do so.

GOVERNOR'S PLEA IN VAIN.

Mob Listens to His Speech but Insists on Lynching Negro.

Columbia, S. C., Aug. 17.—Bob Davis, the negro who on Monday murderously assaulted Miss Jennie Brooks with intent to commit assault and who afterwards outraged a fourteen-year-old negro girl, was lynched at Greenwood about 7:30 p. m. A negro woman fired the first shot at Davis.

Governor Heyward reached the scene shortly after the negro had been captured. A platform was erected in a fence corner on the premises of the victim's father, from which platform Governor Heyward addressed the mob in an effort to prevent the lynching. The governor beseeched the mob not to lynch Davis, but in vain.

At the conclusion of his speech the governor was vociferously cheered. The mob then rushed the prisoner from the view of the governor and within a short distance of the home of his victim the negro was riddled with bullets.

Strikers Stone Root's Train.

Buenos Ayres, Aug. 18.—While Mr. Root and a party were returning from the Chacomus ranch strikers hissed and stoned the train, breaking three windows in Mr. Root's car and wounding the minister of agriculture in the neck. Several others of the party were slightly injured. The police are making an investigation.

CANNON IS ENDORSED

ILLINOIS CONGRESSIONAL CONVENTION FAVORS SPEAKER FOR PRESIDENT.

Danville, Ill., Aug. 17.—Joseph G. Cannon, speaker of the national house of representatives, was renominated unanimously for congress by the Republican congressional convention here. He was also endorsed for president in 1908.

The speech which Mr. Cannon delivered to the convention after his nomination by acclamation was in the nature of a reply to Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, in the labor crusade over the anti-injunction bill and leaves no room for doubt as to the nature of the appeal which will be made to the people during the coming congressional campaign for the continuance of the Republican party in power. The keynote sounded by Speaker Cannon was to "stand pat." He stated emphatically that the tariff should be revised only when revision would do more good than harm to the great mass of people.

Speaker Cannon met the labor matter which vexes many districts with characteristic boldness. He scored unmercifully the measure which was introduced in congress with the sanction of President Gompers of the American Federation of Labor and which in substance prohibits the United States courts from issuing injunctions in any case between employer and employe unless necessary to prevent irreparable injury for which there is no adequate remedy at law.

TIDAL WAVE IN HAWAIIANS.

Phenomenon Attributed to Valparaiso Earthquake.

Honolulu, Aug. 18.—Wireless reports from Hawaii, Maui and Hilo islands report a tidal wave, the general height of which was five feet.

In the enclosed bay of Maalea, on the island of Maui, its height was estimated to be twelve feet, where it carried away a wharf and its superstructure.

The tidal wave is attributed to the earthquake at Valparaiso. Thirty years ago an earthquake in South America produced similar effects here.

It is declared in official circles at Constantinople that the sultan has completely recovered from his illness. Representative Joseph H. Dixon of Montana has announced his candidacy for the United States senate to succeed William A. Clark.

John M. Nelson of Madison, Wis., has been nominated for congress by Republicans of the Second Wisconsin district to fill out the unexpired term of the late Congressman Adams.

J. C. Stubbs, traffic director of the Harriman system in Chicago, has accepted an offer of \$70,000 a year from an English railroad corporation to go to London and handle the company's American travel.

The iron trades council of San Francisco has decided to take a stand for an eight-hour day. This is the first iron trades council in America to reach such a decision. Six thousand men are involved.

B. A. Lamason, a wealthy banker of Ankeny, Ia., was struck by lightning and instantly killed.

Brazil's announcement of the reduction of tariff on American flour has produced consternation in Argentina. Many Greek families are leaving Bulgaria for Salonica, European Turkey, by way of Servia, to escape Bulgarian persecution.

A protracted drought was broken in Missouri Wednesday by heavy rains, which have insured the corn crop and greatly benefited pastures.

Andrew O'Dea, former coach of the University of Wisconsin boat crew, has gone into the sheep raising industry at Wyoming Junction, Wyo.

Directors of the Standard Oil company have declared a dividend of \$6 per share on the company's stock, as compared with a dividend of \$3 three months ago and \$6 one year ago.

Philadelphia is tormented with a plague of fleas.

Nebraska Democrats and Populists have nominated a fusion state ticket.

The wife of Vice Admiral Rojestvensky is seriously ill at St. Petersburg.

Pitts II. Burt, a broker and brother of General Burt, U. S. A., retired, is dead at Cincinnati, aged sixty-nine.

Twenty-one men were killed and many others injured by an explosion in a fireworks factory at Bahia, Brazil.

Mike (Twin) Sullivan of Lowell, Mass., and Rube Smith of Denver went twenty rounds to a draw in the latter city. Sullivan was groggy at the end of the contest.

The sultan of Turkey has ordered the release of all the prisoners in the empire who have completed two-thirds of their sentences as a mark of gratification for the recovery of his health.

Thomas M. Campbell has been nominated by the Democratic party as its candidate for governor of Texas.

William B. Cahill, formerly a well known actor, is dead in New York. Cahill toured the United States in the fifties.

Trade of the United States with its non-contiguous territories amounted in the fiscal year just ended to \$119,304,511.

The sultan of Turkey Friday attended the selamluk with the usual ceremonial, showing that his health has improved considerably.

The crush of returning European travel has set in and every arriving steamer is crowded to its capacity with homecoming Americans.

Rebecca S. Clark, better known as "Sophia Hay," writer of many books for children, is dead at Norridgewick, Me., at the age of seventy-three years.

Prince Mohamed Ibrahim of Egypt was most seriously injured in an automobile accident at a level crossing at Barnay, Normandy. His chauffeur was killed.

Annie Davis, aged thirty, said to have been the largest woman in the world, died suddenly at her home near Huntington, W. Va. She weighed 720 pounds.

Rev. J. L. Alexander, one of the most widely known ministers of the Cumberland Presbyterian church, is dead at Nashville, Tenn. He was seventy-seven years old.

Commercial receipts from the Alaskan cable and telegraph lines owned by the government amounted to \$24,000 in July, which is \$2,000 in excess of the amount collected by the United States in any previous month.

Vice President Fairbanks reviewed the troops at Fort Benjamin Harrison, Ind., Monday.

Burglars entered the Elite laundry at St. Paul and after blowing the safe got away with \$240.

Democratic leaders of Kansas are trying to secure the participation of William J. Bryan in the coming state campaign.

John Linder, a Lincoln Republican, of Carlisle, has been nominated for congress by the Democrats of the Eighteenth Pennsylvania district.

The Santa Fe railway has voluntarily granted its 1,000 telegraph operators, Chicago to El Paso, an increase of wages averaging about \$4 a man.

According to report John D. Rockefeller has under consideration a proposition to endow a home for chorus girls to the extent of \$100,000. The project was planned by Miss Marie Cahill, the actress.
