

FAMILY HARD SMITTEN

At Warroad--Two Former Residents of Swanville Taken to Their Maker

Mrs. D. J. Zenner died at her home in Warroad Tuesday evening, Oct. 18. Mrs. Zenner was formerly Miss Mary Ann Carson of Swanville, Minn., and had taught school in Morrison county, where her parents, Mr. and Mrs. F. D. Carson still reside.

She came to this place two years ago accompanied by her husband and brother, E. J. Carson, and has since made this place her home.

Her death cast a shadow on our village which will long be remembered, it being one of the saddest that ever occurred here. Mrs. Zenner leaves a loving husband, an infant baby girl, father and mother, two brothers, E. J. Carson of Warroad and W. T. Carson of Ross, N. D., and two sisters, Mrs. C. Zimmermann of Warroad and Miss Maggie Carson of Swanville, Minn. Mrs. Carson and daughter, Miss Maggie, of Swanville and W. T. Carson of Ross, N. D., arrived here in time for the funeral which took place Saturday, Oct. 20. Mrs. Zenner had a host of friends who extend their heartfelt sympathy to the sorrowing relatives left behind.

John Zenner of this place, formerly of Swanville, died of typhoid fever at the home of his sister, Mrs. Chas. Graham, Wednesday morning. The body was taken to the home of his brother, D. J. Zenner, where it was cared for until Saturday, when a double funeral was held, the remains of Mrs. Zenner and of her brother-in-law, John Zenner, being interred simultaneously. The obsequies were held at the Roman Catholic church at Warroad, an impressive and beautiful sermon being preached over the remains, which were followed to their resting places in the Warroad Catholic cemetery by a large number of sorrowing friends.—Contributed.
