NEWS IN MINNESOTA

EVENTS OF A WEEK THROUGHOUT THE STATE.

Henry Walros, one of the oldest residents of Mankato, is dead, aged ninety-one.

The ticket sales at the last Minnesota state fair amounted to \$152,541.72, as against \$134,786.85 in 1905, a gain of \$17,754.87.

The deposits in Minnesota state banks have increased from approximately \$50,000,000 in 1904 to over \$70,000,000 in 1906.

Twelve valuable horses were burned to death in a fire which destroyed the stable of the Minneapolis Omnibus and Transfer company.

Robert C. Hine, former judge of the municipal court at St. Paul, is dead at Charleston, S. C., after an intermittent illness of long duration.

Agitation for the division of Polk county has again been started by Fosston men and a petition is being circulated asking for the creation of Nelson county.

S. S. Johnson of Isosco township, Waseca county, claims to have seen an antelope on his farm and to have chased it with a gun, but was not able to get close enough to shoot.

Representative McCleary of Mankato is being talked of as a possible applicant for the position of commissioner of the general land office in the place of Commissioner Richards.

William Olson, a lad nine years of age, was almost instantly killed at Duluth while coasting. He ran into a street car at a crossing and sustained injuries that resulted in death in a few minutes.

Miss Anna Thompson, one of the most beautiful and popular young ladies of Moorhead, was struck by a Northern Pacific train in front of the Northern Pacific depot in that city and instantly killed.

After taking a quantity of carbolic acid John Johnson Lang hanged himself from one of the girders of the viaduct on Nicollet Island, Minneapolis. Despondency over his wife's illness was the cause of the suicide.

Judge Searle of St. Cloud has tendered his resignation to Governor Johnson because of ill health. His term expires next January and Governor Johnson has appointed M. D. Taylor of St. Cloud, judge-elect, to fill out the unexpired term.

Hector McLean, a farmhand, was found dead in the stable on the farm belonging to John Rae near Glyndon. It is thought that he was killed by a kick from a cow. The cow was standing over him in the stall and the man's body was severely bruised.

Tom McGinnis and his sister, Indians, were drowned in the Rainy river near Laurel while fishing. Their birch bark canoe was struck by an ice floe and sank. The floating ice in the river prevented them from reaching shore and both perished.

Frank Veigel, one of the earliest residents of Blue Earth county, is dead at his home in West Mankato. He was eighty years old. He located on a farm in Blue Earth county in 1852, residing there until three years ago, when he moved into the city.

Rev. J. N. Henry of Champlin, a Civil war veteran and prominent in G. A. R. circles, is dead, aged eighty-five. Dr. Henry came to Minnesota in 1872 and settled in Champlin five years later. He filled the pulpit in the Methodist church and practiced medicine for twenty-nine years.

Charlie Jms, a Chinese laundryman of Spring Valley, faces the danger of deportation at any time on account of the loss of his passport. This and other valuable papers were stolen from his laundry one night last week. All of them were in his pocketbook, which also contained \$160 in money.

Little Albert Bower, whose father is a farmer near Lake George, is lying at St. Anthony hospital, Bemidji, in a critical condition as the result of swallowing a short lead pencil, including the brass tip and rubber. The pencil is lodged in the right bronchial tube of the lungs and the possibility of its abstraction is remote.

Mrs. August Niebel, convicted at Mankato of having assaulted Paul Kintze with a heavy castor used for moving stoves, was sentenced to pay a fine of \$50 and costs. When she handed over the amount she remarked that Kintze had the punishment coming and that it was worth all it cost to her to give it to him.

Mrs. Anna Goodnow of Akeley was wounded in the arms and legs with fine gunshot, the result of putting a loaded stick of wood into the stove. Some one had been stealing fuel and by accident one of the loaded sticks was thrown into the fire. Mrs. Goodnow was before the stove when the gunpowder or cartridge exploded and how her life was spared is a miracle.

The Mankato Commercial club, by a unanimous vote, has "most earnestly requested" the senator and three representatives from Blue Earth county to refuse to accept passes from the railroad. This action was taken after an address by Dr. J. W. Andrews, who said the reason there had been no railway rate legislation in this state was because the railroads gave rebates to influential business men and passes to members of the legislature.

For interest paid on war bonds issued to raise funds for the suppression of Indian troubles in 1862 Minnesota will receive \$67,792.23 from the federal treasury. State Auditor Iversen has received a telegram from the treasury department at Washington that it had been determined that the claim of the state in this matter was a just one and that the sum mentioned was due. It will be placed in the deficiency appropriation bill at the forthcoming session of congress.

NEWS CONDENSATIONS

Wednesday, Nov. 28.

Spanish laborers continue to arrive at Colón to assist in the work of building the canal. They are giving entire satisfaction.

Preliminary compilations of dividend and interest payments to be made in December indicate that about \$90,000,000 will be expended for these purposes.

In the municipal assembly at Tokio the proposition that the city purchase the street railways and manage them as a municipal undertaking was defeated.

Shelby M. Cullom, clerk of the Arizona supreme court and a nephew of Senator Cullom of Illinois, is dead at Phoenix of consumption. He was thirty-eight years old.

Fire at New Britain, Conn., destroyed the handsome Y. M. C. A. building and spread to several other buildings in the neighborhood, causing a loss of over \$100,000.

Thursday, Nov. 29.

The Spanish cabinet has resigned.

Rev. William Howe, a centenarian and the oldest Baptist clergyman in the world, is dead at Cambridge, Mass.

The Denver and Rio Grande, Colorado and Southern and Colorado Midland railroads have increased switchmen's wages 4 cents an hour.

While performing a delicate operation at Cheltenham, Eng., Dr. G. B. Ferguson, ex-president of the British Medical association, dropped dead.

The directors of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railway company have declared an extra dividend of 10 per cent. Similar dividends were paid in 1904 and 1905.

Governor J. K. Toole of Montana has selected Miss Minnie Conrad of Great Falls, daughter of W. G. Conrad, to christen the cruiser Montana, which will be launched at Newport News Dec. 5.

Friday, Nov. 30.

Mayor Elisha Dyer of Providence, R. I., and former governor of Rhode Island, is dead.

Jennie Yeaman, popular as a singer and actress a decade ago, is dead in New York city after a long illness.

The negotiations for the transfer of Newchwang from the Japanese to the Chinese authorities are almost completed.

Emperor William, in recognition of Thanksgiving, has presented a large photograph of himself to the American church at Berlin.

Charles H. Chamberlin, senior counselor of the United Commercial Travelers for the grand council of Wisconsin, died suddenly at La Crosse.

Brigadier General George W. Baird, U. S. A., retired, is dead at Asheville, N. C. General Baird was born in Connecticut in December, 1839. He served in the Civil war and on the Western frontier, participating with gallantry in several Indian campaigns.

Saturday, Dec. 1.

A French squadron of warships has sailed for Tangier.

Sir Edward J. Reed, formerly chief constructor of the British navy, is dead. He was born in 1830.

Three steamers which arrived at New York Friday from the Mediterranean brought 4,670 steerage passengers.

Richard J. Garvey, representative-elect from the Second Missouri district, is dead at St. Joseph, aged forty-two years.

Dispatches to Dun's Trade Review indicate that the interruption of the holiday was fully made up by the business in special lines of merchandise for Thanksgiving.

William E. Tillotson, a wealthy woolen manufacturer, is dead at Pittsfield, Mass., following a stroke of apoplexy. He was a large property owner in Chicago.

Monday, Dec. 3.

Nathan M. Flower, a member of the New York Exchange and of the firm of Flower & Co., stock brokers, is dead. Mr. Flower was a nephew of the late Roswell P. Flower.

Captain Thomas Fuller, veteran shipmaster and hero of many an exciting experience on the high seas in days when piracy and mutiny were frequent, is dead at Salem, Mass.

Four Spanish-American shoplifters have been arrested at Los Angeles, Cal., by detectives and \$6,000 worth of silks, furs and clothing stolen from local department stores recovered.

The Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railroad has filed with the Wisconsin secretary of state articles increasing the company's capital stock \$150,000,000. For so doing the company paid \$150,101.

Tuesday, Dec. 4.

Attorney General Leroy F. Youmans, regarded as one of the most brilliant orators in the South, is dead at Columbia, S. C.

The Wisconsin state railroad rate commission has reduced the rate on beet pulp 20 per cent. Numerous hearings have been held on the matter.

Sweden will be represented by one or more warships at the naval display on the occasion of the opening of the Jamestown (Va.) exposition next year.

It is announced at the White House that the president will reappoint Judson B. Clements to be a member of the interstate commerce commission. Mr. Clements' term expires Dec. 31, 1906.

The case of the Mississippi railroad commission vs. the Illinois Central railroad, involving the right of the state to compel through trains to stop at small stations, has been decided by the supreme court of the United States against the commission.

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TWO SENATORS ACCUSED.

Wyoming Solons Charged With Covering Up Land Frauds.

Salt Lake City, Nov. 29.—Serious charges against two United States senators and the commissioner of the general land office have been made before E. E. Clark of the interstate commerce commission in his investigation of timber and coal land frauds in Wyoming and other Western states.

Michael Myendorf, special agent for the land office, who began an investigation of alleged coal land frauds in Utah and who, before he had completed his work, was transferred to Los Angeles and then to Portland, presented his affidavit, in which he told of efforts made by influential men to induce him to cease his investigation.

He named Senators Warren and Clark of Wyoming, Commissioner Richards of the general land office and George F. Pollock, chief of department B, interior department, Washington. He alleged that in Denver Senator Warren told him he ought not to go after the Union Pacific and incur the enmity of that company. He charged that the land department at Washington had suppressed evidence secured by him.

HEAD OF ROAD KILLED

PRESIDENT SPENCER OF SOUTHERN RAILWAY VICTIM OF REAREND COLLISION.

Lynchburg, Va., Nov. 30.—Samuel Spencer, president of the Southern Railway company and recognized as one of the foremost men in the development of the Southern states, and six other persons were killed at 6:10 a. m. in a rear end collision between two fast passenger trains ten miles south of Lynchburg and a mile north of Lawyer's depot. Philip Schuyler, a retired capitalist of New York, was among the killed, together with other guests of Mr. Spencer. Only Mr. Spencer's private secretary, E. A. Merrill of New York city, and one of three porters survived the accident. The dead are:

President Samuel Spencer, New York city; Charles D. Fisher, Baltimore; Philip Schuyler, New York city; Francis T. Redwood, Baltimore; D. W. Davis of Alexandria, Va., private dispatcher to President Spencer; J. W. Shaw, colored, who died in a hospital here; one unknown person. Mr. Spencer's destination was Friendship, N. C., where he was going on a hunting trip with Messrs. Schuyler, Fisher, Redwood and Merrill as his guests.

LIFE INSURANCE CONTRIBUTIONS

President Determined That Money Shall Be Refunded.

Washington, Dec. 3.—Before he retires from office President Roosevelt intends to have refunded to the policyholders of the "big three" insurance companies the money contributed to the Republican national committee in 1904 by the Equitable Life, the Mutual Life and the New York Life. The aggregate of the contributions, made out of the "yellow dog" funds of the companies, was \$148,000.
