Explaining Proposed New Meter Rates For Electric Lights

The Water Power company is probably the last in this state, operating an electric light plant, to continue selling lights on the flat rate basis, and it has had under consideration for some time the matter of establishing a method fair to everyone.

The matter of arriving at an equitable and fair method of selling the current called for an endless amount of correspondence with lighting plants located in cities of about our own size, and the following combination metered and flat rate has been decided as being both equitable and fair:

A charge of 10 cents per month for each incandescent lamp, and in addition a metered rate of 7 1/2 cents per Kilo-Watt, less 33 1/3 per cent, if bill is paid by the 10th of each month.

As an example of the result of the above rate on a residence having seven lights, the following would be the outcome:

7 incandescent lamps at 10 cents \$.70
An average of 3 lamps burning 4 hours each per night will consume 720 Watts per night, or 21 K. W. per month. 21 Kilo-Watts at 7 1/2 cents, makes..... 1.57
Less 33 1/3 per cent discount..... .52
\$1.05

The metered service and rate will effect an actual saving to the patron over the present flat rate, and customers will have the additional benefit of an all day service, and the use of electric flat irons, that can be operated for 2 1/2 cents per hour.

The long burning cremers, such as saloons and restaurants, will fare just as well as the residences. At the present time this class of the trade is paying 70 cents for car room and other lights that are only in use occasionally.

Allowing that these customers need light on an average from the 1st of the month to 6 hours a day for 30 days in each month, a 16 C. P. lamp would consume for this number of hours 11 Kilo-Watts if current a month: 11 Kilo-Watts at 5 cents net..... \$.55
Flat rate..... .10
\$.65

Most of the saloons and restaurant's use 3 Glowler Nernst lamps, for which they are now paying \$3.00 per month or \$2.85 net. Through a meter the result of 6 hours' burning would be: 46 Kilo-Watts at 5 cents net..... \$ 2.30
Flat rate..... .50
\$ 2.80

It is not the object or expectation of the company that metered rates will increase its present lighting revenue, but it does expect an additional revenue from current used for flat irons, and also from small power motors that can then be installed, but are prohibited now because the outside districts only have a night service. A metered rate will allow the use of 32, 16, 8 and 4 C. P. lamps, while on a flat rate it is impossible to make residence rates on so many different sizes of lamps.

An equitable lighting rate is one that makes the same price to everyone for each hour that lamps are used; there is no equity in allowing one man to burn a light all night and only charge 30 cents for it, while another is charged \$1 for the same service; the only difference being that the former is a residence and the latter is not.

It is the intention of the company to start installing meters as soon after the 1st of April as possible, and to put the metered rate into effect May 1st. Notice is given this early, so that customers will have an opportunity of getting the matter properly explained, and this will be cheerfully done at any time. No charge whatever is made for installing meters.
