IT IS MAYOR MOEGLEIN

Well Known Business Man Gets There By a Large Majority

Geo. F. Moeglein was elected mayor of Little Falls Tuesday by 183 majority over Dr. N. W. Chance, in a total vote of 895.

In a hotly contested fight in the First ward Philip Germain was elected over J. C. Bighouse by the fatal number of 13.

Constable F. N. Ferrell retains his position, defeating Geo. R. Kay by 145.

L. Signor is elected assessor by a close vote, defeating C. G. Simmons by only 8 votes.

The other candidates were without opposition. They included City Clerk Cary, City Treasurer Sylvester, Justices Gaudet and Gerritz, Alderman at Large Kiewel, and Alderman Dewey.

Chas. W. Hall, father of B. F. Hal of this city, died at Raymond, S. D., March 6th, aged 83 years.

Last Friday morning Frank Hall, of Little Falls, Minn., arrived in town for the purpose of attending the funeral of his father, C. W. Hall, who died at Raymond, S. D. Wednesday but he was very much grieved to learn upon his arrival here that his father was to be buried at Raymond.

Frank Droskowski, a prominent business man of the West side and for many years a resident of Little Falls, died at his home at 3:30 o'clock Monday morning, on the West side, at the age of 68 years.

He then built and occupied the place now occupied by Jos. Smida on the West side, but on account of ill health sold out to the above named person about six months ago, since which time he has not been actively engaged in any line of business.

The deceased is survived by his wife, a brother and three children, Vlad, Chris and Celia to mourn his loss.

The funeral services were held at the Swan River Catholic church Wednesday morning and the remains interred in the Swan River cemetery.

After having been confined to the house during the past winter by bronchitis, and general weakness, attendant to extreme age, Chauncey Woodworth, aged father of C. W. Woodworth, died at the home of his son in this city Saturday afternoon, at the age of 85 years.

DISTRICT COURT

The case of N. Burton & Co. vs. Wilson Bros. of Park Rapids, occupied the entire session of court last Friday and concluded Saturday morning.

The plaintiff alleged that he furnished goods to John F. Kennedy, as per contract made with Wilson Bros. in 1903, to the amount of \$375 and that none of this sum had been paid.

The entire day's session of the district court was taken up Monday by the case of state of Minnesota vs. Julius Goltz, as was also Tuesday morning.

The next case to be brought up was that of the state of Minnesota vs. Adam Patyk, the charge being that of cutting and stealing timber belonging to John Perovitz.

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ROAD WILL BE BUILT

Contractors Preparing to Commence Operations Very Soon

From all appearances work on the Soo extension will be pushed on at a rapid rate. W. E. Hall, of the firm of Hall Bros. of Foley, who have a contract to operate a supply store for the construction crews of the new Soo extension from Brocton to Duluth, was in the city Sunday and drove out to a point about eleven miles northeast of Pierz, where they will operate the store.

He made a contract with Dana Brown to haul supplies, and Mr. Brown started his part of the work Tuesday morning when he took out a car-load of supplies.

Foley Bros., who have the contract for the grading and laying of the rails, have sublet most of this work to small contractors, and prices being good for the work, the firm expects to have the extension from Brocton to the Mississippi river completed by the first of September.

They will rush the work from Barnton to a point on the Mississippi a few miles above Royalton and in fact, the whole extension will be rushed, so as to be completed next fall in time to haul the wheat to the head of the lakes.

CONGRESS MAID IS SOLD

Congress Maid, the fast pacer owned by Jack Greish has been sold to W. E. Lowe of Harvey, N. D. Besides a good sum of money Mr. Greish got in exchange the speedy mare, "Lady Option," with a record of 2:30. Mr. Greish is now in possession of his new horse. Congress Maid was shipped to her new home Wednesday.

John Kerich returned Thursday from Rochester, where he was operated on for gall stones.

Wm. Wood, private secretary to Congressman Lindbergh, is now located in the city at the West hotel.

The trial of Paul Fournier and Shorty Wesley, for the murder of Miss Agot Dahl and her father, will close up at Bemidji at the present term of court. Much new testimony has been secured, and it is likely that the men will be convicted.

Miss Marjory Mecascker was taken with a sudden attack of appendicitis Tuesday morning. Her condition did not improve and she was taken to the hospital Tuesday and was operated on by Dr. Courtney of Brainerd and Dr. Millspeugh of this city. Her condition was quite serious but it is now quite satisfactory.

O. Duclos will soon leave for Wrenshall, where he owns a brickyard. The yards at that place will be entirely remodeled, and the kilns will be burned with coal. Mr. and Mrs. Duclos will later on both move to that place, where they will reside for the coming year. Mr. Duclos' son, Oscar, will have charge of the local yards in the absence of his father.

COUNTY BOARD

The county board was in session Wednesday and Thursday this week. The petition of Louis Dunn and others for the change of a state road running through Pike Creek was rejected. A petition for a school district in Pulaski was rejected.

\$350 was appropriated for a bridge to cross Platte between Buh and Belle Prairie. The auditor was instructed to issue a warrant for the balance due on the Pillager bridge.

The county treasurer was instructed to strike off the assessment of Isaac LaFond from the tax assessment books of the city of Little Falls. The abatement of C. J. Herrick was approved. \$75 was appropriated to the town of Belle Prairie for road and bridge purposes, also the same amount was allowed to the town of Clough for the same purposes. A large number of bills were allowed.

BRAINERD GIRL KILLED

Miss Muriel O'Brien Is Run Down on a Terribly Mangled

Brainerd, Minn., March 19.—Miss Muriel O'Brien, the sixteen-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. P. F. O'Brien, 803 Fourth avenue, was fatally injured today by being run down by the cars. She was walking down the track of the Minnesota & International railroad and just at the curve in the Northern Pacific shop yards, where the roads join, she was met by a Minnesota & International local freight train just leaving town.

A stretcher was obtained from the shop offices and she was placed in a freight car and taken at once to the Northern Pacific sanitarium, where her feet were amputated and her head dressed. Owing to the great loss of blood and the terrible shock, she failed to rally and died this afternoon.

Her father left only last week for the west and her mother is almost an invalid.

L. W. Vasily left for Bemidji Tuesday noon, where he had been summoned to appear before the grand jury as a witness in the Jennie Anderson insurance case. It will be remembered that at the death of Mr. Anderson, who belonged to the local lodge of the A. O. U. W., the insurance money was to go to his wife, Jennie Anderson, who was at that time living in Bemidji. The necessary papers and finally the draft for the amount of insurance was sent to Bemidji, presuming that it was being sent to the right person. The communications and draft, it seems had all been received by another person by the same name. The wrong Jennie Anderson cashed the draft and then bought another draft to a Michigan bank for a part of the amount. This draft was later on held up on account of some error in the making of it. In this way the woman did not get the full amount sent her out of the death. The woman was apprehended in Michigan and brought back to Bemidji. The A. O. U. W. afterwards paid the right Jennie Anderson the amount of the policy.
