THE NEW CREAMERY

New Machines Will Arrive
Next Week--Start in
May

The new creamery plant being erected on 1st ave. southeast, near the dam, by O. A. Johnson, which is to cost about \$2,000, will be ready for occupancy about the first week in May. The new building is built on about the same site as the old one, which was burned about the middle of August, but is larger, being 24x44 ft. The building is nearly completed and the machinery, which will be new and up-to-date in every respect, will be installed next week. A ten horse power electric motor will furnish the motive power and a small steam boiler will be used to heat the water. The old creamery plant had a capacity of 1,000 lbs. of butter per day, the new one will have about double that capacity. A cement floor has been constructed in this building and the new plant will be a great improvement over the old in many other respects. Mr. Johnson has been in the creamery business here for the last six years and understands the business thoroughly.

H. L. Jones of Sank Centre will act as buttermaker and manager of this plant for Mr. Johnson, whose time will be pretty well occupied in different business propositions. Mr. Jones will probably have an interest in the new plant. He will come here as soon as the creamery starts up and will move his family to this city, making his home here.

A TOUCHING TRIBUTE.

At Mankato, Minn., on the 18th inst., a great man passed from earth. Rev. John H. Czeszynski was born in Poland fifty years ago, and came to this country when a mere boy to make his way among strangers. He could not speak the language of the country, but he could work, and he did work at anything he could get to do to earn a honest dollar and he applied his earnings to securing an education. For years he attended Pillsbury Academy at Owatonna. Then he applied at St. Thomas college as a candidate for the priesthood. Seven years later he was ordained by Bishop Cotter, and began a career which in many respects has been most remarkable. As a young man he noted the terribly demoralizing effect of the liquor traffic upon his own people and allied himself with the advocates of total abstinence. The result of his labors along that line are most far-reaching. Whole communities have given up the vice of intemperance, responsive to his earnest appeals for a sober citizenship. —Dr. Bixby in Lincoln Journal.

WORTH MORE THAN GOLD.

Counterfeit Sovereign Worth More Than the Original.

A well known photographer who recently paid into his bank a sovereign which appeared to be much worn was astonished a short time afterward to find that its value had been credited to him at 21 shillings. It appears that on reaching the mint the coin was discovered to be a clever counterfeit made of platinum heavily gilt. At the time at which it is supposed to have been made it was worth about seven and sixpence, but at the present price of platinum a sovereign's weight of that ponderous metal is worth much more than a sovereign's weight of gold.

Medicine for Plants.

A very large and sturdy orange tree was growing in a small pot. "If that tree," said the florist, "didn't take pills it would require a pot as big as a bathtub to grow in. But it takes pills like a hypochondriac."

"Chemists, agricultural experts, make now plant pills—pills no larger than chestnuts, that contain sustenance for six months, a kind of tabloid food. These chemists analyze a plant's ash and make pills of the constituent salts.

"The pills, inclosed in a metal cover, are buried in the earth at the plant's roots, and the salts gradually dissolve and diffuse through the metal, giving the plants day by day the sustenance that they require.

"Pills are also applied to weak, sickly plants, which they help wonderfully."

Baron Henri de Rothschild, the millionaire doctor of medicine, attended at the Academy of Medicine in Paris where Dr. Poirier, at the close of a masterly lecture, expressed regret that France had no cancer institute. Baron Henri sent up a note to the lecturer expressing his pleasure at the lecture and inclosing a "little check toward the preliminary expenses of the institute," which represented \$20,000.
