

BRIEF ITEMS OF NEWS

Minor Events of Interest From All Parts of the World.

Wednesday, May 29. Snow fell near Midlothian, Tex., Tuesday. It afterwards turned into cold rain.

The shipping interests of Halifax, N. S., remain crippled as a result of the strike of the longshoremen.

For the second time in the present year British consols touched 84% on the London market, the lowest point since 1848.

A heavy frost fell all over Eastern and Central Kentucky Monday night. It is feared that it killed all fruit and early vegetables.

Joseph L. Stickney, the noted war correspondent who stood on the bridge of the Olympia with Dewey at the battle of Manila bay, is dead.

J. F. Chamberlain, a prominent merchant and one of the pioneer business men of Superior, Wis., is dead, following a stroke of apoplexy several days ago.

Thursday, May 30. The convention of the International Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers is in session at Dallas, Tex.

All union carpenters in Dubuque, Ia., struck Wednesday in sympathy with striking millmen. Building operations are at a standstill.

Gardiner M. Skinner, for many years the oldest member of the Episcopal diocese of Michigan, is dead at Detroit, aged ninety years.

The scout cruiser Birmingham was launched at Quincy, Mass., Wednesday. Miss Mary Campbell of Birmingham, Ala., christened the vessel.

William F. Skinner, seventy years old, who served in Stonewall Jackson's brigade during the Civil war and who was given a medal of honor for bravery, committed suicide at Washington by inhaling illuminating gas.

Friday, May 31.

The French cruiser Chanzy, which went ashore on one of the Saddle Islands May 20, will prove a total loss and has been abandoned.

Memorial exercises in honor of the nation's dead were held Thursday at all the cemeteries around Chicago, at Fort Sheridan and at Lincoln park, around the monument to Abraham Lincoln.

The graves of more than 5,000 Union soldiers buried at Winchester, Va., were decorated Thursday by members of the Ladies' National Memorial association. Memorial services also were held.

In the Western Association league ball game at Hutchinson, Kan., Oklahoma City beat Hutchinson after twenty-three innings of play by a score of 3 to 1. Neither team scored until the eighteenth inning, when both made one run.

Saturday, June 1. Mrs. Harriet Matilda Bain, aged seventy-nine years, widow of Edward Bain and one of the wealthiest women in Wisconsin, is dead at Kenosha.

Walter S. Cheesman, president of the Denver Union Water company and one of the foremost capitalists and citizens of Denver, died suddenly Friday.

Dispatches to Dun's Trade Review indicate that the business situation is still largely dependent upon the temperature, which has been most irregular, but, on the whole, improvement is reported.

The Southern Pacific has put its overland and coast trains on a slower running schedule. Traffic has been so heavy on the various lines that it has been found practically impossible to maintain the existing schedules.

Monday, June 3.

The Chicago Chronicle has suspended publication because of lack of patronage.

General Billot, ex-minister of war, is dead in Paris. He was born in 1828 and distinguished himself during the Franco-Prussian war.

About 400 carpenters are on strike at Louisville, Ky. They demand an eight-hour day and a minimum wage of 37 1/2 cents per hour.

An effort is to be made to secure for Chicago the Democratic national convention next year as well as the Republican convention.

Dr. James H. Hammond was found dead in his room in Minneapolis, apparently a victim of heart disease. He was about sixty years of age and had practiced medicine in the Mill City for twenty-five years.

Tuesday, June 4. United States Pension Agent Horace Thompson, aged forty-nine years and well known throughout the state, dropped dead at Marinette, Wis., from heart disease.

Pearl Wight of New Orleans, the Republican national committeeman of Louisiana, has accepted the post of commissioner of internal revenue, to become effective on Dec. 1.

The net income of the Amalgamated Copper company for the year ended April 30 last is shown by the annual report to be \$14,154,400, an increase over the previous year of \$4,992,863.

United States grand jury indictments have been returned at Boston against Michael Latros, former Greek consul at Lowell, Mass., and John H. Poulens, also of Lowell, in connection with charges of smuggling Greek boys into the United States.

FOUR PERISH IN FLAMES.

Home of Walter Schiffer at Long Branch, N. J., Destroyed.

Long Branch, N. J., May 31.—The two daughters of Walter A. Schiffer of New York, secretary of the United Cigar Manufacturers' company, Marion, aged ten, and Ruth, aged fourteen, and two servants, Mary Diller and Tilly Monthon, were burned to death in a fire which destroyed the handsome residence of Jacob Rothschild, which Mr. Schiffer had rented. In attempting to rescue her children Mrs. Schiffer was so severely burned as to be in a critical condition and Mr. Schiffer suffered severe burns in fighting the fire.

Two guests of Mr. and Mrs. Schiffer, B. Citroen and M. Brecher, were also seriously burned. In jumping from a window John Irvine, the butler, suffered a fracture of his left arm and his back was injured. Mrs. Holt, the governess, suffered several severe burns while trying to secure the children in her care, and Kate McMurray and Josephine Hottman, servants, were injured by jumping from the windows.

MOTORMAN UNDER ARREST

Charged With Causing Death of Seven in Collision.

Elyria, O., May 31.—C. M. Forney, motorman of a Cleveland and Southwestern traction car, was arrested in Cleveland and brought to Elyria to answer to the charge of being responsible for the death of seven persons, killed in a traction accident here, and for the injury of eight more persons, several of whom will probably die. He pleaded not guilty before the mayor and was bound over in \$5,000, in default of which he went to jail.

Forney was operating a car which ran at high speed into the rear end of another car standing still on a straight track in broad daylight. Both cars were crowded with passengers.

CUT OUT COMMISSION MEN

Packers Buy 'Cow Stuff' Direct From Shippers.

Omaha, June 1.—The fight between the packers and the live stock commission men over the purchase of "sheep stuff" subject to postmortem examination took a new turn during the day when Armour & Co. purchased 220 cows direct from the cattle raisers subject to the new rule of the packers governing this class of live stock.

Commission men at all yards are advising shippers and raisers not to ship stock until the new order is rescinded. This is the first break in the cattle growers' line. Armour's manager says the "sheep stuff" was purchased at "normal figures," but refuses the actual price.

NEWS IN MINNESOTA

Happenings of a Week Throughout the State.

A novel reason was given at the police board meeting in St. Paul last week for the removal of a patrolman at the Rondo police station. It was reported by the sergeant that the patrolman had made a sleeping berth of the tool shed at the site of the new cathedral. He said that the patrolman had a small alarm clock in his hat to wake him every hour when he had to pull the patrol box.

A mud turtle was found last week near Little Falls bearing the name M. N. Young, 1881, cut on its back. Mr. Young, who is a member of the state legislature from the Forty-eighth district, explains that he caught several turtles twenty-six years ago when they were quite small and cut his name and the year on their backs. The turtle found proved to be one of these.

A most remarkable flowing well has been struck on the farm of George Swift, three miles northeast of Menota. A 2 1/2-inch pipe was sunk to the depth of sixty-five feet, when there was a sudden rush of water and the stream was forced eighteen feet into the air. The well continues to spout and the flow is estimated at about 300 barrels an hour.

Judgments aggregating \$496,697.74 were entered Friday in the office of the clerk of the Hennepin county district court against former insurance company officials. The entry of judgments followed the filing of Judge David F. Simpson's findings in the cases brought by the company against the former officials.

When Walter Lundgren, driver of the Minneapolis morgue wagon, got to 319 Washington avenue in answer to a summons to remove a suicide's corpse he found that the body was that of his own father, William Lundgren. Ill health is believed to have been the reason for the suicide.

An elevator company is not subject to taxation on grain stored by it for farmers, as the grain belongs to the farmers, not the elevator, according to a decision handed down by the supreme court in the case of the Northwestern Elevator company vs. the state of Minnesota.

Trouble is brewing between the Telegraphers' union in Minneapolis and the Western Union company and it is said the union has threatened to call a strike unless differences are settled immediately.

Several of the ministers of Albert Lea have secured an injunction to prevent Sunday ball playing adjacent to that city.

CRIMES AND MISHAPS.

The saloon of M. Solomon at St. Paul was the scene of a bold but unsuccessful holdup. A young man giving the name of M. Wheeler shoved a revolver under the nose of Charles Duncan, bartender, and demanded the money in the till. Duncan grabbed the revolver and was shot in the hand, after which the bandit dashed from the saloon, but was captured after a short chase.

A street car on Central avenue, Minneapolis, was struck by a Northern Pacific switch engine. The car was damaged and the passengers were badly shaken up. Charles Duffy had his right leg broken and Mrs. Mary Lundgren suffered severely from the shock.

William Stith of Swanville, eighteen miles west of Little Falls, the nine-year-old son of J. D. Stith, a prominent merchant of that village, was killed at Grey Eagle by being struck with a pitched ball in a game between Grey Eagle and Swanville.

Fred Haback, a resident of Blakeley, was struck by a train while walking across the track at that place and instantly killed. He was about sixty-five years of age.

Gustave Firschow committed suicide at Stillwater by placing the muzzle of a loaded shotgun over his head and pulling the trigger with his toe.

Charles Kavander, seventeen years old, was killed while braking on a dinky engine for Drake & Stratton at the Fayal mine near Eveleth.

Fred Chadwick, aged thirty-five, a switchman on the Northern Pacific railroad, was instantly killed in the St. Paul yards.

Adolph Anderson, employed as a laborer in Calvary cemetery, St. Paul, committed suicide by hanging.

OBITUARY.

Judge Lewis L. Wheelock dropped dead at his home in Owatonna Friday of heart failure. Judge Wheelock was a member of the law firm of Wheelock & Sperry of that city. He was about sixty-five years old and had been prominent for years in Minnesota politics, at one time being considered a probable candidate for the governorship and serving in the Minnesota senate. He was also prominent in G. A. R. circles.

Monroe Baldwin, Jr., of Redwood Falls, was found dead in his bed at the Wilber hotel in Minneapolis last week. The young man was on his way home from California and was attempting to reach home before death from the white plague could overtake him.

David C. Ferrell is dead at Wayzata, Lake Minnetonka, at the age of eighty-three years. Ferrell was born in New York in 1852 and moved to Minnesota in 1854. He was prominent in the early history of the state.

Anson Wilson, a pioneer of Olmsted county, is dead. He resided in Rochester since 1856.
