NEW SERIES OF STAMPS

A Change to be Made in Those on Stamped Envelopes

A new series of stamped envelopes of the one, two, four and five cent denominations will be manufactured by the post office department after June 30th of this year.

In the new series the elliptical stamp displaces the square stamp, which came in use some years ago in the stead of the elliptical stamp. The one-cent envelopes will bear the head of Benjamin Franklin in bas-relief with a green background, and the four cent envelopes will bear the same with a black background. The head of George Washington on a red background on the two cent and on a blue background on the five cent denomination will be used in the new series.

"United States of America" in capitals as also the denomination in bold outlines will appear within a border on the stamps.

The new envelopes will not go on sale until the department's supply of those in use is exhausted, nor will they be applied to postoffices until required through a shortage of the old style. The new stamps will also supplant those in use on newspaper wrappers at present.

With the new issue the price will be increased slightly. The increase will fall upon those who buy in large quantities, for it amounts to but 4 cents a thousand, and will not affect the purchaser of small quantities of stamped envelopes and newspaper wrappers.
