## ATTEMPTED SUICIDE

### Mrs. Annie Rodgers, Who Is in County Jail Takes Carbolic Acid

There was a case of attempted suicide at the county jail yesterday morning, when, at 9 o'clock, Mrs. Annie Rodgers, who is incarcerated there pending her trial for the passing of a forged check on the Buckman hotel, swallowed the contents of a small bottle containing a quantity of carbolic acid, which she had in her possession for the treating of her nose and an ear.

The woman is a morphia fiend, and being advised by the doctors that she should be furnished the medicine, she would get desperate, the medicine had always been furnished her.

Yesterday morning she ran out of her supply and notified Sheriff Long accordingly. The sheriff immediately went to the court house and telephoned Dr. E. E. Hall to send some over. He had no more hung up the receiver, however, when he received a message from the jail, stating that the woman had taken carbolic acid. He immediately called up doctors Casca, Trues and Hall, and in a few minutes they were at the jail making a strenuous effort to save her life.

When Mrs. Rodgers took the carbolic acid she hurried down stairs and falling on one of the girls exclaimed that she had taken carbolic acid. Mrs. Long was obliged to force the woman to swallow a copious amount of cream, and the doctors say that that was the only thing that saved the woman's life. It made her throw up the poison, and after some hours' work the doctors had brought her to. She is now out of danger, and seems to want to live some time yet. Her mouth, lips, chin and neck are quite badly burned from the carbolic acid.

The attempt at suicide was doubtless due to her extreme nervous condition in being temporarily out of morphia, which is life to her, and her despairing of getting any more.

## BEAULIEU MOVES MORE INDIANS.

Indian Agent Theodore H. Beaulieu left Saturday morning for the White Earth Indian Reservation, with eleven Indians—men, women and children. One of the party was old Chief Ney-Gwon-Ay-Be, the oldest chief of the Mille Lacs Lake band and one of the most stubborn. He has up to this time persisted in living in the land of his fathers, and Mr. Beaulieu feels highly pleased that he has convinced the old gentleman that White Earth is a much better place for him than Mille Lacs Lake. Ney-Gwon-Ay-Be is about eighty-five years old and can well remember the time when he helped lead the Mille Lacs band against the warlike Sioux, fighting side by side with the early pioneers of Minnesota. There are still about 250 Indians at the lake, which Mr. Beaulieu expects to have transported to White Earth in the next few months. —Mora Times.

## JOHN DIEDRICH DIES AT ALBANY.

St. Cloud Journal Press, 29: John Diedrich died at his home in Albany at 7:30 last evening after a brief illness of Bright's disease. The funeral services will be held at the Albany Catholic church Thursday morning at 9 o'clock.

John Diedrich was born at St. Martin 82 years ago. He resided there with his parents until he was 20 years of age, when he purchased an adjoining farm. Twenty years ago he came to Albany, where he purchased a block and went into business. This he conducted until about a year ago, when he retired. The deceased was well known through western Stearns county and was highly respected.

He is survived by his wife and six children, who are as follows: Misses Clara, Margaret, Minnie, Anna, and Leona and Andrew Diedrich.

The deceased was a brother of the late Joseph Diedrich of this city. Mrs. Matt Gross of Lastrap, and Mrs. P. J. Gau of Granite are sisters.

## SMALL POX REGULATION

### No Strict Quarantine, But Patient Cannot Leave House

The following are the new regulations regarding smallpox cases, adopted by the state board of health which went into effect Jan. 1st. The local health officer having knowledge of, or having reason to suspect, the existence of smallpox shall investigate, and at once place upon the house where smallpox exists, a sign setting forth the facts. This sign is to serve only as a warning to those who wish to avoid the house, and not as an indication of quarantine. When the attending physician considers a smallpox patient as having recovered he shall report the fact in writing to the local health officer, who shall thereupon remove the warning card from the house. The patient must not leave the house until after the removal of the warning card.

"The apartments occupied by a smallpox patient shall be deemed infected and when vacated by death or removal of the patient, shall, together with their contents, be thoroughly disinfected under the supervision of the local health officer.

"Every physician shall immediately report to the local health officer, in writing, the name of every smallpox patient under his care, the state of his or her disease, and his other place of residence. A report must be made for each case as it occurs in a family or household.

"Every physician shall report, in writing, to the local health officer the death of any smallpox patient under his care within twelve (12) hours thereafter.

"The local health officer of any city, village, or township, must report immediately to the secretary of the Minnesota State Board of health all cases of smallpox occurring within his jurisdiction."
