

**PIERZ**

July 15.—As announced in last week's Herald Mrs. Beimer died suddenly in the hospital in St. Cloud, where a successful operation for gall stones had been made. She was just making preparations to return home when she was stricken with heart failure and died a half hour later. The deceased was the wife of the late Adam Beimer, who died about six weeks ago. She was born in Roxbury, Dane county, Wis., March 28, 1852. Her maiden name was Maria Leinbert. The remains were brought to Pierz last week Wednesday. The burial ceremonies were held last Friday at 10 o'clock in the St. Joseph's church. Rev. J. Sand of Lastrup officiating in the absence of Father J. G. Stiegler. Interment was in St. Joseph's cemetery. The deceased was a good Christian woman and a member of the "Christian Mothers society" of the St. Joseph's congregation. The burial ceremonies were held under the auspices of the above name society.

The deceased was 22 years of age, at the time of her death, which was caused by tuberculosis of the lungs. She had been suffering for some time until death relieved her last Friday evening at 9:30. The burial ceremonies were held last Monday at Lastrup in the St. John's church. Father J. Sand officiating. The body was laid at rest in the St. John's cemetery in Lastrup. May she rest in peace.

**CHIPPEWA NON-RESERVATION SCHOOL**

The White Earth Tomahawk advocates the establishment of a school for Chippewas exclusively, to be located away from the reservation and to be an institution of higher learning. After pointing out the benefits to be derived from such a school, the Tomahawk says:

"If the government wishes to benefit the Chippewas of this state by further increasing the benefits which they can receive by better educations, it should make a good liberal appropriation next winter from the tribal fund and build a non-reservation school in this state, and in this connection we would suggest the old home of the Indians either in Crow Wing or Morrison counties, where the climate is well adapted to their general welfare."
