

TWO STRENUOUS GAMES

Locals Lose and Win in Games With Plymouths of Minneapolis

The local base ball grounds was the scene of two of the fastest games played here this season on Saturday and Sunday, when the locals played the Plymouth Clothing House team of Minneapolis, and were defeated in Saturday's game by a score of 4 to 1, but captured Sunday's game by the score of 7 to 5.

But for the many costly errors made by the locals in the first game they would have undoubtedly shut out the Plymouths, as the latter team did not get one earned run, whereas the local's lone run was one of the hardest earned runs that has been seen here for some time past. With two men out and no man on bases in the last of the ninth inning, Kingner negotiated a two-bagger, Lanerman followed suit, and scored Kingner, himself getting a third, but did not get a chance to score as Wetzel went out, putting the side out and ending the game. Kumm for the Plymouths struck out nine men, and Newman for the locals struck out six.

Little Falls had its first chance to score in the third inning, when Stoll, who was the first man up, got a hit over third base, was advanced to second on Kidder's bunt and went third on an error. Brick fanned, Stoll was caught short on third by a short one from "Red" Hill and Fortier failed to beat it out to first. The locals came near scoring again in the seventh inning when Deidrich went first on balls, and then stole second and third. There he died however, as Kingner went out on a low fly to McCarthy, Lanerman out on infield fly to Kumm, and Wetzel struck out.

The Plymouths brought in their four runs in the fifth inning, McCarthy, the first man up, failed to beat it to first, Wassing took first on balls, and then stole second, G. Hill advanced him to third; Kumm also managed to reach first. Wassing brought in the first run on a pass ball. Jennings then beat it out to first. Kumm started in on another error, which was one of a series which were very costly as runs were brought in by the Plymouths which made them a total of 4. Deinen then made first and stole second, but no more scored as "Red" Hill went out on a fly to Kingner and Ryan went out on first, retiring the side.

In Sunday's game which was very largely attended, the locals played all around the Plymouths. Their pitcher, McCarthy, proved so easy to the locals that in the fifth inning the manager of the Plymouth team found it necessary to put Kumm in his place, although the latter had pitched the day before. Wetzel did the twirling for the locals in this game. Roth played short in place of Brick and Neuman played right field. Jennings, the first man up, went to first on balls. Polson negotiated a single, but Jennings was caught on second. "Red" Hill went out on an infield fly to Wetzel, but Ryan and Deinen both reached first safe, and Polson scored went out on a fly to Wetzel, retiring the side. The locals were unable to get beyond second in their half of the first inning. The visitors brought in another run in the second inning, when G. Hill manipulated himself to second on one that he lost in the crowd, then to third and scoring on another pass ball. McCarthy could not beat the ball to first and Jennings went out on a fly to Fortier. The Plymouths did no more scoring until the seventh inning. In the meantime Little Falls brought in four runs. Stoll batted first in the second inning for the locals, but was put out on first. Deidrich, however, landed the ball for a two-bagger, went to third on a sacrifice by Newman, and then scored on a pass ball. Batters went out on first. Wetzel started the fireworks in the third inning by making connections for a two-bagger, but when he stole third the umpire called him out although he was clearly safe. Fortier got to first and went to second on Kingner's sacrifice. Lanerman and Roth, the next two men up, secured each a two-bagger, scoring Fortier and Lanerman. Stoll was unable to make first, making three men out. Deidrich scored again for the locals in the fourth inning. He went first on balls, was advanced to second by Newman, to third by Batter's bunt. Wetzel went out on a foul fly to "Red" Hill. Deidrich scored on Fortier's sacrifice. Kingner hit the sphere to center field, where it was easily handled by Johnson. Little Falls did not score after this until the eighth inning. The visitors woke up in the seventh inning and secured another run. Deinen went out on a fly to center field, Wassing got first on an error by Batters and stole second. He advanced to third on a sacrifice by Johnson, and scored on an error. G. Hill went out on first. The Plymouths tied the local's score in the eighth inning, when Jennings pounded out one that was taken for a foul, but which was called fair, and toured clear around to third, cutting five feet at first and about ten feet at second. The umpire did not see this so the runner was allowed to remain on third. He then came in on a sacrifice by Polson. "Red" Hill ploughed the ground to first, and Ryan went out on a low fly to Fortier. Kumm, who had batted first, went out to Newman. This made the score a tie at 4 to 4, and excitement was running high. At this stage of the game Deidrich appeared with the "big stick" and secured a neat single. He then stole second, and then third, Newman took his base on balls, and then stole second, Batters secured a single, scoring Deidrich. Wetzel fanned, and Fortier slammed a pretty one for two bases, scoring Newman and Batters. Fortier then made third but did not get a chance to score, as Johnson gobbled up Kingner's fly, and Lanerman was put out on first. In the ninth inning the exasperated visitors made one last effort. Deinen took his base on balls, stole second, was advanced to third by Wassing's sacrifice, and then managed to reach the home plate safe. The next two men up Wetzel took in on

WILL PAY POSTAGE

Postage Pensioners To Receive Penalty Envelopes With Next Check

When the old soldiers, widows and others who receive pensions from the government receive their checks in return for the sending of the papers to the pension office at Washington, they will find enclosed what is termed a penalty envelope, an envelope that can be used only for the purpose sent for, else a fine of \$300 is imposed by the government, says an exchange.

These envelopes are sent to old soldiers and others for the purpose of sending their papers to the pension office in October, and should not be thrown away when the checks arrive. The rule of sending the postage to pensioners will effect the postage department to the extent of \$900,000 annually.
