MINNESOTA ISSUE OF 1908.

Governor Johnson accepts the issue of the state campaign on the lines laid down by his opponent, J. F. Jacobson, and points to the administration of the past four years, with its practicable reforms, and constructive measures, as the fulfillment of his campaign pledges and the justification of the big vote of confidence cast for him by the people of Minnesota.

Governor Johnson also points to the great array of results in state development—177,000 acres of state swamp lands reclaimed, miles of improved highway constructed, state aid distributed to 1,000 additional public schools, 300,000 volumes added to school libraries and \$4,300,000 added to the value of Minnesota schoolhouses, large additions to land, buildings, equipment and enrollment of agricultural colleges and experiment stations, development of state binding twine plant at the state prison and also of a new harvester and binder manufacturing plant, the extension of the state university and its increased enrollment, the establishment of the state immigration bureau, the development of the State Agricultural society enterprise and the development of state institutions and internal improvements generally—as worth all they cost to the people and the state.

Governor Johnson also points to the new boards and departments created—the permanent tax commission, which in its first year brings \$500,000 of new revenue into the state treasury from iron mines; the state highway commission, which is developing a state system of good roads; the state drainage commission, which has added \$885,000 to the wealth of the state during the past two years from reclaimed state swamp lands at a cost of \$185,000; the state timber board, which has recovered half a million dollars from timber trespassers; the state immigration bureau, which has brought thousands of new settlers into the new counties; the new department of fire marshal, which has effected reduction of fire insurance rates—as progressive departures worth to the state one hundred times their cost.

Governor Johnson also points to the practical achievements of the executive departments controlled by him—insurance department, whose practical reforms have commanded national prominence; public examiner's department, which has recovered in two years \$150,000 of public revenue and made the unparalleled record of taking over 232 new banks in four years; labor bureau, which has made state labor inspection of great practical value for the protection of labor and opened free employment bureaus; dairy and food department, which has expanded the state's efficiency in dairy and food inspection 50 per cent in four years; public instruction, which has broken all records in practical educational work; board of control, which has reduced cost of binder twine 2 cents a pound and in four years made for the state a net profit of \$716,000—as demonstrating the practical value of his administration to the state.

Governor Johnson points to the reforms achieved—prosecution of timber thieves and recovery of half a million dollars of trespass damages; preservation of state's mineral wealth for the public schools and stopping the leasing of the state's mineral lands to iron and steel companies and lucky individuals at one-half to one-fourth value; recovery of hundreds of thousands of dollars of unpaid taxes from railroad, telephone, telegraph and express companies; reduction of freight and passenger rates; abolition of passes and rebates, and improvement in the financial management of every state office and institution—as fulfilling his promises to the people who gave him 70,000 plurality and justifying their further confidence in his stewardship.

To this vast array of practical statesmanship and constructive achievement Candidate Jacobson simply says "extravagance," although the state budget to pay the bills was controlled by a Republican legislature, which authorized and voted every dollar of expenditure. Mr. Jacobson also alleges increased taxes, although the total increase in state taxation would not amount to ten cents a person upon the people of this state, and the increased taxes upon iron mines, street railway and lighting companies, logs and lumber, franchises and royalties, corporations and inheritances, has more than paid the additional revenue to put into effect all the above reforms and carry through all the above improvements.

As stockholders and directors in this great democratic institution, the state, the issue is up to you. Do you want Governor Johnson's kind of administration continued? Does his stewardship meet your endorsement? If it does, the day for expressing it is on Nov. 3.

Foraker Says Invoke the Law.

Before making this suggestion he sums up the various charges that have been made and discusses briefly the legal ethics as to service for various clients.
