

## MRS. GOLLNIK WINS

**Entitled to Homestead and \$500 of Estate of Murdered Husband**

The decision of the probate court in the matter of the estate of William Gollnik from which an appeal had been taken has been affirmed by the district court Judge M. D. Taylor holding that Mrs. Gollnik who is serving a life sentence for the murder of her husband is entitled to have the homestead of 80 acres and \$500 personal property reserved for her, so that in case her sentence be commuted she would not be penniless.

Mrs. Gollnik's attorneys petitioned the probate court in February that this part of the property be reserved for her, but the administrator and Mrs. Adelaide Mangel eldest daughter of Mr. Gollnik, fought this, claiming that she was not entitled to anything and that by the life-sentence which she is serving she can be considered the same as dead. Judge Shaw decided the matter in favor of Mrs. Gollnik, and an appeal was taken. The case was then argued in district court in March, and taken under advisement by the clerk of court a few days ago as above stated.

The case will be taken to the supreme court.

Saturday morning Stillmacher was found guilty of the charge preferred against him in Justice Gerritz's court and was fined \$20 and costs or serve sixty days in the county bastille. On his promise to leave the county, sentence was suspended, and he has gone, supposedly to Montana, where he has relatives.

## "PORK BARREL" GONE

**Supreme Court Kills Road and Bridge Appropriation Bill**

St. Paul, July 9.—The supreme court this morning handed down an unanimous decision to the effect that the state road and bridge appropriation in the amount of \$300,000 per year, better known as the "Pork Barrel" was and is unconstitutional. This will probably mean that whatever moneys may be appropriated by the legislature hereafter for road and bridge purposes will be handled and distributed by the members of the state highway commission instead of the members of the state legislature as has been the case heretofore.

The decision was not unlooked for, though it comes as a disappointment to a large number of legislators. Proceedings against the appropriation were started some six weeks ago by Senator Cooke in the Ramsey county district court, which held the act to be unconstitutional. The supreme court now affirms that decision.

## INSURANCE DEPARTMENT BULLETIN NO. 23.

Certain mutual fire insurance companies doing business in this state have been giving a discount from the premium written in the policy, amounting in some cases to 25 per cent, for payment of the premium within sixty days or less after date of policy. The Attorney General has ruled that this is a violation of the anti-rebate law, Chap. 427 Laws of 1909. Companies have been notified that the practice must cease.

The attorney general has ruled that, when a house becomes vacant by the removal of the owner or occupant, and such absence extends over a greater period than thirty days, even though furniture and furnishings remain in the house, the house is vacant. The insured in order to protect himself must have a vacancy permit attached to his policy to cover this hazard.

The Keystone Guards of Athens, Pa., are not licensed to do business in this state. Anyone soliciting for them should promptly be reported to the county attorney of the county where the offence is committed.

The fire losses in Minnesota for May amounted to \$255,000 as compared with \$120,000 for the same month in 1908. The losses in the United States were \$14,324,000 as compared with \$13,492,000 in May 1908.
