

SEVEN DEATHS DUE TO MISTAKE

Clerk Sells Gasoline for Kerosene Oil.

TWO OF FAMILY ESCAPE

Minnesota Farmer, Wife and Five Children Perish in Fire Following Explosion—Passerby Rescues a Couple of Little Ones and the Father, but the Latter Expires Twenty-four Hours Later.

Badger, Minn., Nov. 10.—Nels Jensen, his wife and five children were burned to death three miles south of Warroad.

Jensen bought five gallons of kerosene, as he supposed, from the Warroad Mercantile company.

A clerk had previously emptied a barrel of gasoline into the kerosene tank and Jensen got gasoline instead of coal oil. He used a little of the contents of the can to start the kitchen fire and an explosion followed, the noise of which was heard a mile away.

Trevor Garry of Warroad, who was driving by the Jensen home, saved two children and took Jensen, badly burned, to town, where he died twenty-four hours later.

The mother and five children were cremated in the house, which burned to the ground.

ARRIVES THREE DAYS LATE

Cunard Liner Uttonia Encounters Very Bad Weather.

New York, Nov. 10.—The 10,000-ton Cunard liner Uttonia, with her starboard engine wrecked and one of her propellers out of commission, arrived from Mediterranean ports after a trip some of the officers said was the roughest passage known to them. When the 1,300 passengers walked down the gangplank they breathed sighs of relief.

The Uttonia was three days overdue. She sailed from Almeria, Spain, Oct. 28, and soon afterward encountered high seas, squalls and gales. The accident which delayed her took place while the vessel was in mid-ocean on Nov. 3. On that evening the starboard engine broke down.

WILL APPEAL IN LABOR CASE

Federation Executive Council Favors Continuing Fight.

Toronto, Ont., Nov. 10.—The executive council of the American Federation of Labor, in a report to the convention, recommended that an appeal be taken to the United States supreme court from the jail sentences imposed on President Gompers, Vice President Mitchell and Secretary Morrison for contempt in the Buck Stove and Range company boycott case.

The council recommends also that an appeal be taken in the original injunction case, the alleged violation of which resulted in the contempt proceedings against the three labor leaders.

REFUSED TO PROTECT BLACKS

Mutinous West Virginia Troops Will Be Mustered Out.

Charlestown, W. Va., Nov. 10.—By direction of Governor Glasscock orders have been issued by Adjutant General N. S. Burlew that Company A, Second Infantry, West Virginia national guard, located at Gassaway, be mustered out of service on account of the failure of a majority of the members of the company to report as ordered last Thursday to protect the lives of two negroes suspected of implication in an assault upon Mrs. Alfred Lockhold.

VALUABLE LUMBER BURNED

Fire in Michigan Causes Heavy Loss to Property.

Manistique, Mich., Nov. 10.—About 3,000,000 feet of pine and hemlock lumber owned by the Hudson Lumber company at Garnet, some forty miles east of here, burned. The fire department was called from here and put out the fire, saving the mill and some 75,000 feet of lumber. The burned lumber was valued at about \$20,000 and was insured. The fire is thought to have been of incendiary origin.

Lightning Kills Iowa Hunter.

Fort Dodge, Ia., Nov. 10.—Henry Strine, thirty years old, was killed by lightning while hunting near this city. A bolt entered Strine's temple, burning a large hole and fusing his finger prints on the barrel of the gun. His brother, who was standing near him, was rendered senseless.

Lowers Mile Auto Record.

Atlanta Ga., Nov. 10.—Lewis Strang, in a Fiat registering 200 horsepower, made a mile straightaway over the new automobile speedway in the remarkable fast time of 37.7 seconds, lowering the record of 43 seconds made recently by Barney Oldfield at Indianapolis.

EXCEEDS ROOSEVELT PRICE

Peary to Receive \$120 a Word for Pole Story.

New York, Nov. 5.—The literary end of discovering the North pole is more profitable than that of running errands in Africa for the Smithsonian Institution. Commander Peary is to get 20 per cent more a word for the magazine story of his achievement than former President Roosevelt is getting for his hunting story and, as a rule, words do not grow as long in the Arctic as below the equator.

Mr. Roosevelt's price is \$1, but Commander Peary is to get \$1.20 a word for a story of about 50,000 words that is to run serially in a magazine for the next eight months.

CAR SHORTAGE INCREASES

Most Acute in East, Middle West and Southeast.

Chicago, Nov. 6.—A fortnightly statement issued by the American Railway association regarding the car situation says:


There has been an increase of 55 per cent in the shortages reported, which now total 35,636 cars. The surplus, however, shows a decrease of only 5,631 cars, leaving 30,996, of which about one-half are box cars. This surplus is principally in the Northwest, while the more severe shortages are in the East, the Middle West and the Southeast.

JUDGE GAYNOR ELECTED

Tammany Candidate Is Chosen Mayor of New York.

New York, Nov. 8.—Tammany elected another mayor of Greater New York but lost its grip on city finances. William J. Gaynor of Brooklyn swept the five boroughs to victory as mayor by at least 70,000 plurality, defeating Otto T. Baugard, Republican fusion, and William Randolph Hearst, independent.

He failed, however, to carry his ticket with him, and the Republican fusion forces will control absolutely the board of estimate and apportionment which will disburse approximately a billion dollars during the ad-

ministration. This is more than half a defeat for Tammany, for the control of the board of estimate was one of the principal issues of the campaign.

In Cleveland the reign of Tom L. Johnson as mayor was ended by the election of Herman C. Baehr, the Republican nominee. Mayor Johnson was a candidate for a fifth term as mayor and the issues were purely local.

In Cincinnati the Republican nominee of Boss Cox, Dr. Schwab, was elected mayor by an increased plurality. He is the man whom President Taft wished to go home to vote against.

BABE'S CRIES SAVE MANY

Arouse Sleepers in Burning House at Milwaukee.

Milwaukee, Nov. 5.—The cries of a fifteen-month-old baby son of Mr. and Mrs. Morris Cohen probably saved eighteen persons from death in a fire which damaged the building in which they live.

While every one else in the crowded two-story frame building was asleep the little child awakened to find his room filled with smoke. The child's mother was awakened by feeling the little one's hands pulling at her arms and the child's voice raised in screams of terror.

ARMISTICE WITH THE MOORS

Spanish Commander Hopes to Soon Conclude Peace Treaty.

Madrid, Nov. 5.—The Spanish commander in Morocco wires that he has arranged for an armistice with the Moors and that he expects that, as a result, peace in Morocco will soon be assured.

Engineer Killed in His Cab.

Sioux City, Ia., Nov. 5.—While sitting in the cab of his engine, making fast time on the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railroad, between Manilla and Sioux City, John Smith, one of the best-known engineers on the system, was instantly killed by the breaking of the driving rod.

THREE THOUSAND SLAIN IN BATTLE

Minor Abyssinian Princes Fight Engagement.

KING MENELIK INTERFERES

Wife of Abyssinian Ruler Had Ordered Victorious Commander to Devastate the Region Inhabited by His Opponents and to Massacre the Population, but Her Husband Countermands the Edict.

Cologne, Nov. 10.—The Cologne Gazette prints the details of a battle between the forces of Prince Abate and Prince Abrahé, minor Abyssinian rulers, in which over 3,000 were killed in seventy-five hours of fighting. The forces of Abate were victorious and Abrahé was captured.

While the battle was on Empress Taitu, wife of King Menelik, prayed unceasingly for the success of Abate, including herself in the royal chapel.

where she knelt for hours with a heavy wooden cross on her shoulders. When Abate's victory was made known to her she ordered the victorious prince to devastate the entire region inhabited by Abrahé's supporters and to massacre the population.

King Menelik, however, countermanded the order of the empress and issued an edict of mercy.

MAKES AN APPEAL FOR PITY

Mme. Steinhil Cries Out Against Court Procedure.

Paris, Nov. 10.—"Have pity on me! I am an unhappy woman who should not be tortured," cried out Mme. Steinhil on the resumption of her trial here for the murder of her husband and stepmother. The appeal came during the testimony of the jeweler with reference to the changes of jewelry confided to him by the prisoner, but which she originally claimed had been stolen by the assassins. The prosecuting judge responded that accused persons always repeated that cry when embarrassed for an answer.

Mme. Steinhil admitted anew that she had had certain jewels, the gifts of her admirers, melted, but she maintained that this was done to keep the facts of her life from the knowledge of her daughter.

THOUSANDS ARE HOMELESS

Typhoon Sweeps Panay Island in the Philippines.

Manila, Nov. 10.—Panay, an island of the Visayan group, Philippines, was crossed by a typhoon last Sunday. The storm was especially severe in Capiz province, where many houses were destroyed. Five thousand persons are homeless and much property and crops were destroyed. The wind, which was of hurricane force, was accompanied by heavy rains and much of the country is flooded.

GRAFT MAY REACH MILLIONS

Not Known How Much Was Stolen at German Navyyards.

Berlin, Nov. 10.—The defalcation at the Kiel navyyards may amount to several millions. There is no means of knowing even roughly the amount of the government's losses through the selling at nominal prices of immense quantities of copper, steel and other supplies by the connivance of a ring of dealers with the minor naval officials.

Bjornson Taken to Paris.

Christiania, Nov. 10.—Bjornstjerne Bjornson, the Norwegian novelist, who has been seriously ill for the past five months, passed through Christiania in a special hospital car, which was conveying him direct to Paris, where the electro-therapeutic cure will be tried.

Higher Wages for Employees.

Bethlehem, Pa., Nov. 10.—The wages of several thousand employees of the Bethlehem Steel company will be restored to the scale in vogue before the 1907 depression, according to an announcement made by Charles M. Schwab, president of the company.
