

THE STATE LAND SALE

Nine Hundred and Forty Acres Sold--\$7 to \$9 the Price Paid

At the state land sale held in the auditor's office at the court house last Friday morning 940 acres of land, mostly in the northeastern part of the county, was disposed of. State Auditor S. G. Iverson had charge of the sale and was assisted by Deputy B. Sheehan. These gentlemen paid this office a pleasant call after holding the sale, and Mr. Iverson stated that it was one of the best land sales held in years. Besides buyers from this county there were parties from Appleton and Mankato, Minn., who purchased different tracts of state land. As all mineral rights are reserved by the state on these lands, the land is not bought for speculative purposes but because of its adaptability to farming, dairying and stock raising.

Carl H. Stucke of Appleton purchased a half section of land and made a total of 448 acres, all located in Granite town, and will move a fine dairy herd on it shortly. The average price paid for the state land was \$7 per acre, while the maximum was \$9 per acre, the latter being paid by Eli Melander of Raul Prairie for a small tract in that town.
