

# RAINS GIVE RELIEF

## Precipitation General Over the Entire Northwest

# LONG DROUTH FINALLY BROKEN

### Downpour Results in Immense Benefit, Although Some Crops Are Too Far Advanced to Be Helped.

St. Paul, July 10.—Rains that attacked the drouth in all parts of the Northwest and gave many districts a thorough soaking brought messages of rejoicing from North Dakota, South Dakota, Minnesota and Northern Wisconsin.

A steady, drizzling rain was general throughout the Black Hills in Western South Dakota and did immense good to the range and to crops. A third of an inch was the precipitation at Mitchell, S. D., where a shower followed the steady downpour of the night. Up to now the moisture that fell in the last month amounted to only half an inch. Madison and Brookings, also in the eastern part of the state, reported an all night rain that insures a fair grain crop, and the rain was continuing over Eastern South Dakota. Yankton, in the southeastern part of the state, and which was visited by no rain for a month, had its third drenching for the week, and more appears on the way. The drouth has been decisively routed. Aberdeen, in Northern South Dakota, reports hard rains east of Aberdeen as far as Moberly and south to Mitchell. The precipitation in Aberdeen was .45 of an inch.

Light showers fell in North Dakota at Enderlin, Valley City, Kensal, Harvey, Kenmare, Portal, Comstock and Fargo; in Minnesota at Thief River Falls, Elbow Lake and Glenwood.

### More Rain in Minnesota.

Southern Minnesota had more rain. Winona reported a refreshing thunder shower that broke the long drouth and gave precipitation of .25 of an inch. Showers have followed a heavy rain at Redwood Falls. Farmers expect good crops. The barley and rye harvest is in progress and early oats will be cut next week. Corn and wheat prospects are better than usual. Rain also fell in Pine county, Northern Minnesota, where towns have been in peril from forest fires, and great relief is felt. Crow Wing county had a heavy rain.

Northern Wisconsin, which with Eastern North Dakota, has shared the tribulations due to the long drouth, had good rains. At Eau Claire the precipitation in the last seven weeks has been seven inches less than the normal. The first rain that Hudson has had in three weeks fell and will help the wheat, corn and potato crops, though it is too late to benefit oats, barley and rye. New Richmond had an inch of rain, the first real fall in two months. Rain over Chippewa county continued all day. Cumberland, Wis., had a six hours' rain that brought final relief from the forest fires.

The sixty-day drouth in Iowa was broken by a fine rain, which is quite general in the northern and western parts of the state.

# COAL LANDS ARE WITHDRAWN

### President Signs Orders Affecting Millions of Acres.

Beverly, Mass., July 9.—Continuing his policy of practical conservation, President Taft signed orders withdrawing 35,073,164 acres of coal lands from the public domain in the states of North Dakota, South Dakota, Washington, Utah, Colorado and the territory of Arizona.

Of the total withdrawals 20,698,469 acres are new, while 14,374,695 acres are covered in confirmation and ratifications under the new law, approved June 25, of withdrawals made during the past four years by both President Roosevelt and President Taft.

# GARMENT MAKERS STRIKE

### Fifty Thousand Men and Women Out in New York City.

New York, July 9.—Fifty thousand garment and cloak makers, of which 8,000 are women, walked out at the call of the International Garment Workers' union, which demands an eight-hour day, an increase in wages and a guarantee that contractors shall stand behind sub-contractors for wage payments.

The fight thus far is purely local, but officers of the union said that if the employers attempted to sublet their work in other cities, notably Chicago, Philadelphia and Cleveland, the union would call a strike there also.

# TRAIN HITS TROLLEY CAR

### Three Persons Killed at Winnipeg Street Crossing.

Winnipeg, July 9.—The Oak Park local crashed into a street car and trailer loaded with passengers for the park at the Pembina street crossing, killing three persons and injuring many others. The fender of the locomotive struck between the two cars, completely wrecking them.

### Noted Woman Aviator Fatally Injured in Fall From Biplane.



# IN FALL WITH AEROPLANE

### Baroness de la Roche, Woman Aviator, Fatally Injured.

Betheny Plain, Rheims, July 9.—Baroness de la Roche, the first French woman aeroplane pilot, was fatally injured here by falling from a height of fifty meters.

The baroness had flown around the field once at a height of eighty meters when suddenly in front of the applauding tribunes she appeared to become frightened and confused at the approach of two other aeroplanes. She started to descend, but while still fifty meters from the ground lost control of the machine.

The aeroplane turned over and fell like a log. The baroness' legs and arms were broken. Her mangled body was removed to the hospital, where she is dying.

# MOB LYNCHES YOUTH

### Execution at Newark, O., Follows Murder of Citizen.

Newark, O., July 9.—Carl Etherington, twenty-two years old, employed Thursday night by the State Anti-Saloon league as a blind tiger raider, was lynched here following a day of almost continuous rioting. The heavy doors of the Licking county jail were battered down and Etherington was dragged from his cell. He was shot, kicked and bruised before the street was reached, and the finish followed quickly.

Etherington early in the evening confessed he had killed William Howard, proprietor of the Last Chance restaurant and former chief of police, in a scuffle during a raid of alleged "speak easies" and narrowly escaped lynching at that time.

When Etherington mounted the block, ready for the swing, he was asked to make a speech.

"I want to warn all you young fellows not to try to make a living the way I have done—by strike breaking and taking jobs like this," he said. "I should have worked, and I wouldn't be here now."

# MANY CITIES BAR EXHIBITION

### Sentiment Against Fight Pictures is Spreading Rapidly.

Chicago, July 7.—Moving pictures of the Johnson-Jeffries fight will be prohibited in many of the larger cities of the country through fear of the renewal of the race bitterness, as well as a possible lowering of the moral tone of the people. This means a heavy loss to the syndicate which purchased the rights to reproduce the fight, paying Jeffries \$66,000 and Johnson \$50,000. It was said the promoters expected to "clean up" \$1,000,000 in the next month.

Following the lead of Washington many cities have prohibited the exhibition of moving pictures of the fight. Among those which have already raised the bars are Cincinnati, Boston, Louisville, Norfolk, Va.; Harrisburg, Pa.; Milwaukee, Savannah, Ga.; Lexington, Ky.; Providence R. I., and Fort Worth, Tex. Similar action will probably be taken at once at Baltimore, St. Louis and Detroit.

# ENDORSED AT THE POLLS

### Conservatives Returned to Power in Manitoba.

Winnipeg, July 12.—The Roblin government of Manitoba and the government ownership of elevators succeeded at the polls, the Conservatives electing twenty-seven and the Liberals fifteen seats. All cabinet members had big majorities. In the last house the Liberals had but thirteen seats and the Conservatives twenty-eight.

The government operation of telephones was one of the questions at issue. The promised reductions in rates have not been made.

All the ministers of the cabinet were elected, Premier Roblin increasing his majority by over 100. Such familiar figures as Bernier, Chevrier, T. H. Johnson and Lawrence will again sit in the house.

# LOEB AT BEVERLY

### Collector of Port of New York Confers With Taft.

# PREFERS HIS PRESENT PLACE

### Former Secretary to President Roosevelt Not Anxious to Enter Race for the Governorship.

Beverly, Mass., July 12.—William Loeb, Jr., collector of the port of New York, frankly told President Taft that he would rather remain at his post in the customs service than to run for governor of New York this fall. The president as frankly told Mr. Loeb that the Republican nomination seemed to be coming his way, and that it would take more than a fishing trip to the Rocky mountains to stop it.

The former secretary to President Roosevelt left for New York, leaving the impression here that if it became absolutely necessary for him to take the Republican nomination he would do so and would make it a whirlwind campaign.

The mention of the New York situation was incidental to talk on general politics between the president and Mr. Loeb. They were together in the morning before the president went to the Myopia links for a game of golf with Henry C. Frick, who lives near here, and they lunched together at John Hays Hammond's cottage in Cloucester. After the luncheon the talk was continued. Mr. Taft was anxious to hear something of the situation as viewed by some one outside of the immediate administration circle.

### Favors Loeb's Nomination.

Mr. Taft is not interfering in the New York situation in any way. He and Mr. Loeb are the closest of friends, and whenever Mr. Loeb's name has been mentioned to the president in connection with the New York governorship he always has enthusiastically approved the suggestion. Mr. Loeb has known this for some time. He has known that, as far as he could legitimately do so, the president would bring all of his influence to his support in anything he might undertake.

The collector discussed New York state politics with the president from various angles. Mr. Loeb made no attempt to conceal the more serious aspects of the situation from the Republican point of view. He expressed again the belief, however, that the Republicans would get together and that the splits in their party would be offset by divisions in the Democratic ranks.

Aside from the New York situation the tariff came in for a share of consideration at the conference. Both the president and Mr. Loeb believe that the tariff commission and the big appropriation for its work have wonderfully strengthened the hands of the Republicans and offer a common ground on which the factions of the party can meet.

# IN SUPPORT OF BEVERIDGE

### Former President Roosevelt to Speak in Indiana.

Oyster Bay, N. Y., July 8.—Albert J. Beveridge, United States senator from Indiana and one of the most prominent and consistent of the "progressive" Republicans, came down from Sagamore Hill with a promise from Theodore Roosevelt to deliver a campaign speech in his fight for reelection to the senate. Mr. Beveridge departed content and smiling, but he left it for the colonel to make an announcement of the proposed campaign speech in the senator's behalf. And this is what Mr. Roosevelt said:

"Mr. Poulke and Mr. Swift came to Sagamore Hill and spent the night here. They came to request me to go to Indiana and speak in behalf of Senator Beveridge. I promised them that I would."

He added that he had agreed to make only one speech for the senator and as far as is now known he will make only one. The time and place for this speech have not been fixed.

# THREE TRAINMEN ARE KILLED

### Wreck on the New York Central Near Newton Hook, N. Y.

New York, July 12.—Three trainmen were killed and a trainload of passengers shaken up when northbound train No. 59 on the New York Central, known as the Northern and Western express, was wrecked near Newton Hook, nine miles north of Hudson.

The engine and baggage car jumped the track and toppled completely over. The railroad officers here report that all passengers were able to continue their journey.

The Twentieth Century limited, on which Jack Johnson, the heavyweight champion fighter, was coming to this city, was delayed an hour by the smash up.

Serious Wreck in Alabama.

Birmingham, Ala., July 12.—Six trainmen and three passengers were injured when the engine of the fast southbound passenger train No. 1 on the Alabama Great Southern railroad jumped the track near Toomsboro, Miss.
