## FLORENCE NIGHTINGALE.

Famous Nurse of the Crimean War is Dead.



### FAMOUS NURSE PASSES AWAY

Florence Nightingale Succumbs to Attack of Heart Failure.

London, Aug. 15.—Florence Nightingale, the famous nurse of the Crimean war, and the only woman who ever received the Order of Merit, is dead at her London home. Although she had been an invalid for a long time, rarely leaving her room, where she passed the time in a half recumbent position and was under the constant care of a physician, her death was somewhat unexpected. An attack of heart failure brought the end.

### THOUSANDS DROWNED

Hordes of Others Homeless and in Want of Food.

Tokio, Aug. 15.—With hundreds of dead bodies caught in the collapsed structures in the east section of Tokio, 600,000 Japanese homeless and near 6,000,000 starving in the prefectures adjacent to Tokio and Yokohama, as the result of the floods, prayers for mercy are ascending in the great temples in Japan.

The government's effort to give aid to the shelterless hordes of men, women and children and the futile efforts of the civil authorities to bring order out of chaos, have been pitiable when compared with the tremendous disaster brought in the cities and towns of the Hondo low lands. From Takasaki and Karasawa on the north to the Shiduzokka river on the south, the sea has reached out and claimed the land, laying great stretches of water over fertile lands, destroying lives, wiping out homes, demolishing residences and further impoverishing the peasantry.

The total number of dead cannot be ascertained until communication with the interior is restored. The most conservative estimate is 3,000.

### Passes Half Million Mark.

Washington, Aug. 16.—The population of Pittsburg is 533,905, an increase of 82,392, or 18.2 per cent, as compared with the combined population of Pittsburg and Allegheny of 451,512 in 1900.

# DOCTORS BLAME BUFFALO GNAT

## Declare Insect Spreads Infantile Paralysis. LIKE YELLOW FEVER PEST

In Report Filed With Iowa State Board of Health Physicians Say Gnat Is Similar to Mosquito Which Carries Germs of Southern Scourge. Will Now Seek a Remedy for the Disease.

Council Bluffs, Ia., Aug. 17.—Physicians here are convinced that they have discovered the cause of infantile paralysis that has reached the contagion stage in many localities in Iowa. Now they will search for a remedy for the disease.

After laboring for weeks they unite in announcing that in their opinion the disease is produced by a small flying insect, known throughout the West as the buffalo gnat, which makes its appearance during June and disappears with the coming of the first frost in autumn.

In a report which they will file with the Iowa state board of health the doctors say the buffalo gnat is similar to the mosquito which carries the germs of yellow fever. They say it is the only winged insect that will crawl under the covers of the couch of its sleeping victims or find the skin of a person in daylight by creeping under the clothing.

The buffalo gnat, the physicians say, has the short antennae characteristic of the yellow fever mosquito and when placed under a powerful lens shows a long, slender, two-edged lance, a small saw and the nose of the disease breeding mosquito. It carries a set of muscles that compress the glands and squeeze from a small sack in the head the paralysis germs, injecting them into the system of its victim.

### CAMP ON CAPITOL GROUNDS

State Troops on Strike Duty at Columbus, O.

Columbus, O., Aug. 17.—The statehouse yard holds many tents of the privates of the First regiment, Ohio national guard, who arrived here on call by Governor Harmon for strike duty.

There has been little rioting or serious disorder since the announcement that the troops would return to Columbus and the street cars are running on something like schedule time. The militia is in absolute control of the situation, although martial law has not been proclaimed.

The soldiers cook their meals on the statehouse grounds. Director of Public Safety McCune formally discharged the thirty-three mutinous policemen who refused to go on the cars when ordered by Mayor Marshall.

Adjutant General Weybrecht has made a request for \$100,000 to cover expenses.

### WRECK ON MISSOURI PACIFIC

One Man Killed and Thirty-five Persons Injured.

Nevada, Mo., Aug. 17.—One man was killed and thirty-five persons were injured when the tender of Missouri Pacific passenger train No. 209 jumped the track eleven miles north of here.

An unidentified negro was killed and thirty-four passengers were injured, none, it is stated, seriously.

Fireman Grover Murdock of Nevada was scalded.

The smoker, baggage and mail cars and one chair car were completely wrecked. The Pullmans remained on the track.

### Customs Officers Seize Opium.

New York, Aug. 17.—United States customs inspectors recently made a seizure of opium in Hoboken, N. J., which, it is believed, may reveal a plot of great magnitude to swindle the government. Three arrests were made and the men were charged with having brought in twelve pounds of opium bought in Shanghai.

### Extinguished by Clockwork.

Clark, S. D., Aug. 17.—The city of Bradley has installed a new system of street lights that are extinguished by clockwork. The board of trustees has placed ten new lights in the business section of the town. Each has a gas burner and generator, and a clock connected with each light turns it out at the required time.

### Ends Life on Wife's Grave.

Minneapolis, Aug. 17.—Lying across his wife's grave A. Fross was found dead in Layman's cemetery. Fross had a bullet hole in his head and a gun lay nearby. His wife died about two months ago and it is thought that dependency caused him to take his life.

### Kentucky Election Fight Fatal.

Lexington, Ky., Aug. 17.—Word was received here of a general fight in a school election in Breathitt county, in which Lewis Napier was shot and killed and several others more or less hurt. Several arrests were made, the prisoners being taken to Jackson, Ky.

## WALTER WELLMAN.

Explorer Is Preparing for His Flight Across the Atlantic.

### MAKING PRELIMINARY TRIALS

Wellman Expects to Cross the Atlantic in September.

Gloucester, Mass., Aug. 16.—Walter Wellman, aviator and Arctic explorer, has left for Atlantic City to commence a series of preliminary flights in his dirigible balloon up and down the coast preparatory to his flight across the Atlantic next September.

Wellman's ship is on the Zeppelin type, but dispenses with the inner braces; is 228 feet long and equipped with two eighty-horsepower engines and one ten-horsepower.

### LOSS TOTALS MILLIONS

Brussels Exposition Partially Destroyed by Fire.

Brussels, Aug. 16.—The Brussels Universal International exhibition is virtually at an end as a result of the fire which wiped out two-thirds of the buildings and exhibits and entailing a loss that is estimated at from \$10,000,000 to \$20,000,000.

No lives were lost, but at least forty persons were injured in the stampede in the Bruxelles Kermesse, a sort of American "white city."

The fire, which resulted from a short circuit in the telegraph building, completely destroyed the Belgian and British sections and practically ruined the International gallery, in which were the exhibits of America, Austria, Russia, Denmark, Norway, Japan, Turkey and Switzerland.

The French section was also virtually destroyed. This section was filled with priceless works of art, of which those that escaped the flames were ruined by smoke and water.

The flames were not checked until they had reached the Italian section, which was slightly damaged. Practically the whole of one side of the Avenue des Nations, the central thoroughfare of the exposition grounds, was wiped out. A number of houses were also burned.

Millions of dollars' worth of diamonds, laces, tapestries and art works were destroyed.

The loss of these is what swells the total to such tremendous figures, as many of the art stores and galleries of the old world had been ransacked for the benefit of the exposition.

### HAD POLITICAL INFLUENCE

Why Cecil A. Lyon Was Asked to Join in Land Deal.

Sulphur, Okla., Aug. 14.—What part Cecil A. Lyon, national committeeman of Texas, took in the activity at Washington for the approval of the old tribal McClurry contracts for the sale of Indian lands was described by Mr. Lyon in the hearing before the congressional investigating committee.

These contracts were disapproved by President Roosevelt in 1908. The new contracts, which are the cause of the present investigation, Mr. Lyon said he has no interest in.

Asked if he was requested to join in the old contracts because of his political influence and acquaintance with President Roosevelt Mr. Lyon said:

"It is entirely possible."

Mr. Lyon then told of his going to Washington and of his failure to have the contracts approved.

### IS VICTIM OF TUBERCULOSIS

Joe Gans, Former Lightweight Champion, Dies at Baltimore.

Baltimore, Aug. 11.—Joe Gans, formerly lightweight champion pugilist, is dead.

Gans died of consumption, which manifested itself about a year ago. Late last spring he went to Arizona, with the hope of restoring his health, but the disease had been too deeply seated and he declined rapidly. He was brought here last week to die. He was thirty-four years old.

Gans won the title of lightweight champion from Frank Erne at Fort Erie in one round in 1902 and lost it to Battling Nelson in 1908.
