CHAS. EASTMAN DEAD.

A fearless and efficient northern Minnesota editor passed away in the death of Charles Cutter Eastman, for the past twenty years owner and editor of the Wadena Pioneer Journal, which occurred Thursday morning of last week at 10 o'clock, aged 46 years.

For four years he had been suffering from an incurable nervous malady, but his demise was hastened by an accident which occurred to him on February 5th this year in which he sustained a double fracture of his leg, the shock bringing about his utter collapse.

Mr. Eastman was a native of Anoka. Besides his widow he is survived by his mother, two sisters and three brothers. John W. Eastman, another brother, who was editor of the Thief River Falls News, died last November.

Charley Eastman was a man of ability and integrity, and despite his malady was of a cheerful disposition. For twelve years he was postmaster of the Wadena postoffice.

His funeral was held last Saturday afternoon at 8 o'clock from the home.

RICES PIONEER ANSWERS CALL.

Rice, March 4.—Thursday evening at 8:11 o'clock was sounded the first trumpet call to which Mrs. Zetiah Bryant Rice, wife of the "Father of Rice," responded and went to receive her reward. At the completion of an exemplary life of 79 years, Mrs. Rice laid down her temporal duties to accept that which has been prepared for her in the hereafter.

Coming here from the East, Mr. and Mrs. Rice first resided in St. Paul for three years. They then moved to Little Falls, where they lived two years.

Forty-eight years ago they went to Rice where they lived until the death of Mr. Rice, about two years ago. During the past five weeks Mrs. Rice has been in ill health. Her death resulted from bronchitis and occurred at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Joseph Orin, about six miles from this village.
