

ST. PAUL CHOSEN HEADQUARTERS

Northwest Development League Organizes at Helena.

ADVERTISE SEVEN STATES

Complete Set of Officers and Executive Board Selected and Fund Started to Carry on Work.

Helena, Mont., May 6.—St. Paul was selected as headquarters for the Northwestern Development League and a total of \$32,000 was pledged in less than five minutes to carry on the work, the Twin Cities contributing \$12,000, Seattle \$10,000 and the balance being made up by North and South Dakota, Idaho, Oregon and Montana.

In all a fund of \$100,000 may be raised to carry on the work until the first of the year. An executive secretary to carry out the projects of the league will be chosen at a meeting of the executive board to be held within the next month.

The officers of the league elected are: President, Lewis Penwell, Helena; treasurer, H. C. Sampson, Spokane; vice presidents, L. M. Newman, Montana; Senator Fox, Idaho; Dennis W. King, Washington; William Hanley, Oregon; J. H. Dight, Minnesota; Governor Vessey, South Dakota, and John Bruegger, North Dakota.

Executive Board—R. W. Reynolds, Montana; W. M. Morgan, Idaho; R. R. Wilson, Washington; C. C. Chapman, Oregon; C. L. Kluckhohn, Minnesota; E. Y. Sarles, North Dakota; South Dakota to be filled later by the president.

The meeting was unusually successful and free from efforts to introduce politics. A spirit of co-operation predominated throughout and the indications are that great good will be accomplished for the seven states that have joined in the conference.

Adopts Strong Resolutions.

A strong set of resolutions was adopted by the conference, recommending the organization of auxiliary development leagues in the states and in the various towns to work in harmony with the league.

That the present interests of the railroads and people are in harmony and that unanimity of action between them is vital to the development of this section.

That the league favors extensive advertising of the Northwest.

That all the states interested should provide state departments of immigration.

Urging the enactment of publicity bills and the appropriation of money for publicity by the states in the league.

Urging the extension of agricultural education in secondary and elementary schools and commending the operation of demonstration trains of the Northwest products by railroads.

Urging the government to aid in opening the great waterways of the country by bond issues, if necessary, and commending country life movements, such as playgrounds, parks and community centers.

Opposing the withdrawal of natural resources by the federal government when such resources are needed to properly develop the country adjacent thereto and favoring a modification of the conservation policy of the government to conform to these principles.

WIND FANS CANADIAN FIRES

Many Small Towns Are in Danger of Destruction.

Winnipeg, May 9.—Swept by a high wind forest fires are raging in Northern Manitoba and Saskatchewan and along the international boundary, which threaten a repetition of last fall's disasters.

Many small towns and large saw mills along the Canadian Northern railway are in danger and hundreds of men are fighting the flames. The Canadian Northern has several relief trains ready for operation and has sent a train to Kelwood, which was in danger. Fires are burning fiercely at Swan River, Dauphin and at the foot of Riding mountains. Many settlers have lost everything, bridges have been destroyed and miles of telegraph poles have been burned.

The situation in the Prince Albert district is alarming. The fires did considerable damage on the outskirts of Hudson Bay Junction and Waking Chief Wagner and part of the Prince Albert fire brigade are still fighting the flames at Big River.

Former Senator Kittredge Dies at Hot Springs, Ark.


Hot Springs, Ark., May 5.—Former Senator Kittredge of South Dakota died here after being unconscious forty-eight hours.

HABEAS CORPUS SUSTAINED

Millionaire Packer Need Not Produce Books in Lorimer Probe.

Chicago, May 7.—Judge A. J. Pettit, in the circuit court, declared that the Illinois senate could not force inspection of the private accounts of Edward Tilden. His decision, having this effect, was to uphold the writ of habeas corpus obtained by Tilden, G. W. Benedict and W. C. Cummings after they had been arrested on charges of contempt of the state senate, in refusing to present the accounts to the Helm committee.

Tilden was named by Clarence Funk, of the International Harvester company, as a person to whom he was directed to send a check for \$10,000 to make up a fund of \$100,000 alleged to have been used in electing United States Senator William Lorimer.

HOUSE APPROVES FREE LIST BILL

Twenty-four Republicans Join Democrats in Its Favor.

Washington, May 9.—Nine hours of continuous pounding at the hands of the Republican minority of the house of representatives failed to make a single change in the first Democratic tariff bill, that placing on the free list agricultural implements, meats and many other articles. The bill passed the house by a vote of 236 to 109, the Democrats voting solidly and mustering twenty-four Republicans with them.

Minority Leader Mann threw amendment after amendment into the debate, ranging all the way from free rice to free lead and pig iron; but those that were not ruled out of order were cheerfully voted down by an almost solid Democratic vote.

The Republicans who voted for the measure were Representatives Anderson, Davis, Lindbergh, Miller, Volstead and Steenerson of Minnesota; Anthony, Jackson, Madison, Murdock of Kansas; Hanna and Helgeson of North Dakota; Lenroot, Kopp, Morse, Nelson of Wisconsin; La Follette and Warburton of Washington; LaFerty of Oregon; Kemp of California; Hubbard of Iowa; Morgan of Oklahoma; Norris of Nebraska and Roberts of Nevada.

THREE PERSONS DROWNED

Steamer Sunk in Collision in the Detroit River.

Detroit, May 6.—The steel steamer Fisher was sunk opposite Wyandotte in the lower Detroit river, in a collision with the steamer Stephen Clement of Cleveland. Chief Engineer W. W. Auhl and Steward Louis Sugden and Sugden's wife, who was assisting him, are missing and are believed to have been drowned.

The Fisher sank with a big hole amidships in a few minutes. A boat from the Clement rescued the remainder of the Fisher's crew, who jumped overboard in their night clothing.

JUDGE COWAN IS ACQUITTED

End of Impeachment Trial of North Dakota Jurist.

Bismarck, N. D., May 6.—Judge John F. Cowan, on trial before the state senate sitting as a court of impeachment, was acquitted at the hands of that body, when President Burdick announced to the respondent that he had been found not guilty upon each and every one of the charges and specifications contained in the articles of impeachment presented to the senate against him by the house of representatives.

Burns Going to Los Angeles.

New York, May 9.—Detective William J. Burns has left here for Los Angeles to arrange for the presentation of evidence against John J. McNamara and his brother, James B. McNamara, accused of dynamiting the Times building.
