HAVE GOOD MEETINGS

Minneapolis Address Local Church Men on Men and Religion Movement.

A number of the churches of the city gave the Men and Religion Forward movement a substantial boost last Sunday, when prominent Minneapolis men interested in the movement addressed the different congregations and told of the origin and purpose of the organization, the center of which for this section of the United States is Minneapolis.
S. T. Johnson, chairman of commission and apportionment of the national council of the organization, spoke at the morning services at the Congregational church; U. S. Cates of the permanent judicial commission spoke at the Methodist Episcopal church and T. W. Todd at the Baptist church. Rev. Geo. E. Platt addressed his own congregation at the Church of Our Saviour along those lines.
In the afternoon a general meeting of church men and those interested in the moral up-lift was held at the Methodist Episcopal church, which was addressed by the Minneapolis men. A committee of fourteen representing the different churches of the city, was appointed to forward and carry out the plans of the movement here.
A union mass meeting was held in the evening at the Congregational church. Registration cards were signed by a number of local men to attend the meetings of the movement to be held in Minneapolis October 3 and 4.
