### WOMAN AND COUSIN SLAIN

#### Murder Mystery in Anoka County Disclosed by the Finding of the Two Bodies.

Neighbors who became suspicious of the long absence of Mrs. Walter Bolton from the Bolton farm home near Stacy broke into the cellar entrance and after ransacking the house found the body of the woman in the cellar. She evidently had been killed in the kitchen after a struggle and been dragged to the cellar. A bullet wound was the cause of death, although her body was covered with bruises, showing signs of maltreatment and blows.

Her husband, Walter Bolton, had left the farm labor day to return to his job in Minneapolis and had left his wife with his cousin, Frank Rhodes, and a hired man to look after the farm, stock and cattle.

Neighbors, aroused by the finding of the body, began a search for the two missing men, and accidentally discovered in an adjacent field, about sixty feet from the house, the partially buried body of Frank Rhodes.

The hired man is missing and it is believed by the authorities that he is the man who bought a ticket for Chicago. He had been employed on the place but three weeks.

All that is missing from the house is a mandolin and \$5, unless there were secret hiding places for money which the neighbors knew nothing about. Robbery is not believed to have been the cause of the tragedy. Officials favor the theory that Mrs. Bolton was assaulted and that, Rhodes coming to her aid, was killed in his endeavor to protect his cousin.

### CASE IN HANDS OF BOARD

#### Will Decide Charges Against Minnesota Official.

Charges against Frank A. Whittier, superintendent of the state training school for boys at Red Wing, are now up to the state board of control for settlement.

The long drawn out hearing on the charges preferred by Ralph Wheelock, secretary to Governor A. O. Eberhart, came to a close when E. P. Sanborn, attorney for Mr. Wheelock, made a brief closing talk in rebuttal to Judge Frank Wilson, attorney for Superintendent Whittier.

The board will now start in to study the testimony, covering 2,000 typewritten pages, and the 100 exhibits in the case. This may take a month or more. P. M. Ringdal, chairman, said that the board will take its time.

The legal questions in the case will be decided by C. Louis Weeks, assistant attorney general.

### TAKES LIFE IN BATHROOM

#### W. H. Tucker Shoots Himself in Brain at St. Paul Hotel.

Lying in a bathroom just off his room in the Boardman hotel at St. Paul, a revolver in his hand and a bullet hole through his head, William H. Tucker, assistant treasurer of the Minneapolis General Electric company, was found dead by Detective William Springer of the St. Paul police department. A chambermaid had attempted to open the door of the room, but found it locked and as Tucker had not been seen since he retired to his room the previous night the proprietor called in the detective to force the door.

A. W. Leonard, general manager of the Minneapolis General Electric company, believes that a nervous breakdown, due to overwork and a possibility of a delinquency in getting up his balance, is the cause of Tucker's suicide.

### ROBINSON FOR RIVER FLIGHT

#### Will Make Trip From Minneapolis to New Orleans.

Hugh K. Robinson, the well known aviator, has been nominated by the Transmississippi River Flights association to make the Minneapolis to New Orleans hydro-aeroplane flight of 1,917 miles, which, when accomplished, will set a new world's record for cross country flying.

Robinson will start from the surface of Lake Calhoun, Minneapolis, on Wednesday morning, Oct. 11. He will fly for a purse of \$2,000 raised by the river cities in which he is to give hydro-aeroplane exhibitions.

### SANDPIT CAVES, MAN BURIED

#### Driving Too Near the Edge Man and Team Are Smothered.

Thomas Rooney, fifty years old, was buried alive in a sandpit at St. Paul. Rooney had been grading his lot and had just filled his wagon with sand. In driving away he went too near the edge of the bank and it caved in, taking the team and wagon down with it.

When assistance arrived Mr. Rooney was dead. He is survived by his widow and three children.

### REWARD ON SLAYER'S HEAD

#### Bullet Which Passed Through Body of Mrs. Bolton Found.

The state has made no headway in its search for "Jim," the far famed wanted for the murder of Mrs. Walter Bolton and F. E. Rhodes on a lonely farm in Anoka county. Sheriff John Casey received reports that suspects had been captured at Elk River and Madison, Minn., but when an effort was made to confirm the news it was learned no arrests have been made at either place.

County Attorney Albert Pratt announced that \$200 reward will be given by Anoka county for information leading to the arrest of the double murderer.

At the Bolton farm the bullet which killed Mrs. Bolton was found in the wall of the cellar. It had passed through the kitchen floor, indicating that the woman was killed in the kitchen with a rifle.

### UPHELD BY LOWER COURT

#### Minnesota's "Seven-Senators" Amendment to Go on Ballot.

Judge W. E. Hale of the Hennepin county district court, sitting at Minneapolis, decided that the "seven-senators" amendment to the state constitution proposed by the last legislature should be placed on the general election ballot next year for approval or rejection by the people.

He denied the petition of Representatives Charles R. Fowler and W. D. Washburn, Jr., who sued as taxpayers for an injunction to restrain Julius A. Schmah, secretary of state, from placing the amendment on the ballot.

The plaintiffs announced that they will appeal to the supreme court.

The bill proposes an amendment to the constitution limiting the number of state senators to seven from any one county.

### MAYOR DUMAS OF CASS LAKE INDICTED

#### Attempted Arson in Third Degree Is the Charge.

"Attempted arson in the third degree," reads the indictment of the Beltrami county grand jury returned against Dr. D. F. Dumas, mayor of Cass Lake.

Although the maximum penalty on this charge is but three and one-half years it is the most serious offense that can be charged as a result of Dr. Dumas' alleged conspiracy to rob and burn the postoffice and general store building at Puposky on the night of June 16 last, when Martin Behan and Mike Davis were fired upon and Behan was captured. Dr. Dumas was arrested the next day in Hibbing for complicity in the crime.

Dr. Dumas was arraigned in district court at Bemidji before Judge C. W. Stanton. Marshall A. Spooner, acting for the defendant, entered a plea of not guilty. After a short consultation with Assistant Attorney General James and E. E. McDonald of this city, who is assisting the state, it was agreed that the case should come up for trial next Wednesday morning.

### TAWNEY WILL BE PROMOTED

#### May Be Made Chairman of Boundary Waterways Commission.

Former Representative J. A. Tawney probably will become chairman of the American section of the International boundary waterways commission, as a result of the death of Thomas H. Carter of Montana. Mr. Tawney, Mr. Carter and Frank H. Straeter of New Hampshire were appointed members of the commission by President Taft. Upon the organization of the commission Mr. Carter, on motion of Mr. Tawney, was named chairman. With the death of Senator Carter, Mr. Tawney becomes the ranking member of the commission. The new chairman probably will be elected as soon as the vacancy on the commission caused by Senator Carter's death is filled.

### ANSWERS BUT FEW QUERIES

#### Wheelock on Stand in Minnesota Training School Case.

Ralph W. Wheelock, private secretary to Governor Eberhart, like the governor himself, escaped a grilling examination in the Whittier hearing before the state board of control through technicalities of the law.

Mr. Wheelock was on the witness stand for nearly an hour and was bombarded with pertinent questions by Judge Frank Wilson, attorney for Superintendent Frank Whittier, but was allowed to answer only a few.

Such questions as were ruled material Mr. Wheelock answered fully and frankly, as when he admitted that he knew nothing of his own knowledge prior to the hearing of the abuses charged in the complaint.

Lawyer Files for Senator.

Daniel W. Lawler, former mayor of St. Paul, was the first man to file for office under provisions of the Keefe bill passed at the last session of the legislature providing for election of United States senators by direct vote. He seeks the Democratic nomination, subject to the action of the primaries Sept. 17, 1912.

### CAPTURED IN NORTH DAKOTA

#### Man Wanted for Kidnapping Canadian Schoolteacher.

Hannah, N. D., Sept. 17.—Eluding the vigilance of Canada's far famed mounted police and posses of more than 200 Southern Manitoba citizens and e-saping across the international boundary into North Dakota, only to be captured by a party of six Langdon and Hannah residents, after having been led into a trap by farmers west of the city, was the fate of "Bill" Miner, alleged abductor and assailant of Eleanor Grace Price, the Pembina Valley (Man.) schoolteacher.

### STORM SWEEPS OVER CHICAGO

#### Two Killed and Twenty Injured—Big Property Loss.

Chicago, Sept. 19.—Two persons were killed and twenty injured and a property damage estimated at \$500,000 resulted from a storm which was a remarkable combination of lightning, thunder, wind, rain and hail. It swept through the city from the west and continued for several hours.

The Illinois naval reserve gunboat Dubuque dragged its anchor and was dashed against the government pier by the wind. It was towed back to its mooring in the inner harbor.
