JAIL FOR TWO TITLED WOMEN

Prominent London Suffragettes Sentenced in Police Court.
London, Nov. 25.—Lady Constance Lytton and Lady Sybil Smith, both prominent in the suffragette movement, were sentenced to a fortnight and a week respectively in jail at the Bow street police court for smashing windows during the demonstrations of Tuesday last.
Mrs. Mary Leigh, who had been seven times previously convicted and whom the police described as the "most troublesome suffragette," was sentenced to two months in jail and if she were again convicted she would be sentenced to hard labor.

COLONEL ROOSEVELT ISSUES STATEMENT

Seeks to Discourage Booming Him for President.

New York, Nov. 25.—Theodore Roosevelt, when asked regarding the report that he may be a candidate for president, told a World correspondent that a statement might be made as follows:
"The World says in a special dispatch from Oyster Bay:
"Colonel Roosevelt finds it difficult to understand the comment, the statement reads, that has followed upon his article in the Outlook regarding national laws and business interests. He has said exactly the same thing many times before. He cannot see why it should be assumed that this article indicates he is ready to take any personal part in the coming campaign.
"It can be stated that Colonel Roosevelt has received many letters indicating the willingness of the writers to give him political support if such is desired. It can be stated that Colonel Roosevelt received a letter from a certain United States senator offering the full Republican support of the senator in case Colonel Roosevelt should wish to be a candidate in the national campaign. To this letter Colonel Roosevelt has replied that he earnestly hopes the senator will not only refrain from any action looking to the nomination of Colonel Roosevelt, but also will prevent his friends from taking any such steps."

TRAIN FALLS INTO RIVER

Thirty Persons Killed in French Railway Disaster.
San Mar, France, Nov. 24.—Thirty passengers lost their lives when a train plunged into the River Thouet owing to a breakdown of a bridge on the state railway at Montreuil-Bellay, in the department of the Maine-et-Loire.
The train, which had started from Angers, was traveling to Poitiers. It contained 100 passengers. While it was crossing the bridge over the Thouet the structure, which had been greatly weakened by recent floods, broke, crashing with all the cars into the swollen stream.

Tokio, Nov. 25.—The Japanese destroyer Harusame foundered off Shi province in a storm and forty-five of the crew of sixty perished.
