

HIGH WON FROM SAINTS

Game Was a Fast and Clean One—Score 30 to 16

In the fastest, cleanest and best played game of the season, the fast local high school quintet, which won the "state high school championship" last year defeated the speedy Athletic five of St. Cloud on the local floor Friday night by the score of 30 to 16. From the spectators' viewpoint the game was the best ever witnessed here, not being marred by the frequent calling of fouls and rapping, there being but four on the local and five on the St. Cloud side. The officiating of Murphy and Moran was of the highest order which always pleases the fans as well as the players.

St. Cloud scored first when Murphy called a double foul, Liljedahl being successful in fouling the net while Grencen's attempt was a failure. The visitors held this lead for only a short time, when Diederich found the net for the first field bucket putting the navy blue and orange in the lead, which they kept the rest of the contest.

The first half went to the high school five by the score of 20 to 6. Dumpy and Hall the local forwards each found the net for three baskets apiece, the former securing two of his baskets after some pretty team work had been finished. Liljedahl was the first to find the net for a field basket for his team, while Tuftord at left fouled scored high with two baskets, one of which was the longest shot noticiated this season.

The second half was nip and tuck, but the locals again finished on top by the score of 10 to 7. Hall and Dumpy did all the scoring for the locals in this period, the former securing three field baskets and the latter two. Brennan played his usual strong game at center, holding Carew the visitors tall and speedy center to one basket and himself securing one, but Pick had hard luck several times, the ball rolling around the rim and refusing to go in. Diederich at guard played a strong game, holding kib Robertson, captain of the Carlton college quintet and star athlete, to two baskets and also feeding Hall and Dumpy in fine style. Greisch also played a good game, holding his opponent to two baskets. For the visitors Robertson and Liljedahl were in the battle every minute while Tuftord and Litzinger at the guards worked like trojans.


