Board of Health NOTICE

The board of health of the city of Little Falls hereby gives notice that due regard for the public health demands a complete sanitary reform within limits of the city.

THEREFORE IT IS ORDERED, that on or before May 1, 1912, every manure pile or other accumulation of filth within the limits of the city of Little Falls shall be removed from such limits, and that all such accumulations upon private property shall be removed by or at the expense of the owners thereof. The accumulations upon the streets and alleys of the city shall be removed by or at the expense of the person who caused the same, where known, and where not known shall be removed by the street commissioner of the city at the public expense.

The street commissioner and the police of the city are ordered to report to the health officers of the city every violation of any provision of this order which shall come to their knowledge after the time stated.

Every such violation will be punished according to law.
