PRESIDENT TAFT IS RENOMINATED

Sherman of New York Again Selected for Second Place on the Ticket.

ROOSEVELT WILL RUN AS AN INDEPENDENT

Colonel's Supporters Hold Separate Meeting and Name Their Favorite.

Chicago, June 22.—With nearly 350 of the Roosevelt delegates declining to vote and hastening away at adjournment time to tender to Colonel Theodore Roosevelt the nomination of a new party, the fifteenth Republican national convention, at the end of a long and tumultuous session, renominated William Howard Taft of Ohio for president and James Schoolcraft Sherman of New York for vice president.

President Taft received 561 of the 1,078 votes in the convention, or twenty-one more than a majority.

The decision of the Roosevelt people, under direction of their leaders, to refrain from voting left no other candidate near the president. The announcement of the Taft victory was greeted with cheering from his adherents and groans and hisses from the opposition.

When it became absolutely certain that Mr. Taft would be nominated without great difficulty the leaders in control of the convention decided to give him as a running mate his companion on the ticket in 1908.

All others dropped from the race and Mr. Sherman was the only candidate regularly placed before the convention. A motion from New Hamp-

shire to make the nomination by acclamation was declared out of order. The ballot for vice president was as follows: James S. Sherman, 597; Herbert S. Hadley, 14; William E. Borah, 21; Charles G. Merriam, 20; Albert J. Beveridge, 2; present but not voting, 352; absent 71.

Silence Expresses Revolt.

At no time was there any indication of a walkout of Roosevelt delegates. They expressed their revolt by silence. A "valedictory statement was read in behalf of Colonel Roosevelt, asking that his name be not presented and that his delegates sit in mute protest against all further proceedings.

A great majority of the Roosevelt delegates in the Illinois and all in the Missouri and Idaho delegations declined to follow his advice, but Colonel Roosevelt's sway over the delegations from California, Kansas, Maine, Minnesota, Nebraska, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, South Dakota and West Virginia was all but absolute.

Most of the delegates from these states announced their purpose of helping to give Mr. Roosevelt an independent nomination at another hall later in the evening.

The split in the convention occasioned no surprise. It was but a fulfillment of predictions that had been made during the past several days.

The closing scenes of the convention were marked by counter demonstrations for President Taft and Colonel Roosevelt.

The first test vote after the announcement of the Roosevelt valedictory came on the adoption of the party platform. The affirmative vote was 666. Roosevelt delegates present and not voting numbered 343. There were 53 nays, 36 of them from the La Follette states of Wisconsin and North Dakota.

Senator Robert M. La Follette of Wisconsin was placed before the convention, but Colonel Roosevelt's wishes were carried out by his followers and they remained silent during

the call of the states for nominations. On the voting for president the Roosevelt delegates again, as a rule, remained silent. The detailed vote was: Taft 561; Roosevelt 107, La Follette 41, Cummins 17, Hughes 2, not voting 344, absent 6. At times during the balloting the convention was in great confusion.

PLATFORM OF THE TAFT CONVENTION

Principles on Which President Will Seek Re-Election.

Chicago, June 22.—The platform adopted by the Republican national convention reaffirms belief in the principles of a protective tariff, calling for the maintenance of import duties "high enough while yielding a sufficient revenue to protect adequately American industries and wages." It states that some tariffs at present are too high and asks for their reduction. It endorses the tariff commission and condemns the Democratic party for its tariff bills of the past session.

The platform opposes the recall of judges as "unnecessary and unwise," but calls for legislation to expedite court actions and to provide means to simplify the process of removing a derelict judge from office.

It speaks for keeping up the navy, for encouragement of a merchant marine and establishment of a parcels post. It endorses the policy of international arbitration in justifiable controversies.

It favors "a liberal policy toward Alaska" to promote development of its resources, standing for opening of the coal lands under a law that will prevent monopoly.

It calls for continuation of conservation policy and for a scientific inquiry into the causes increasing the cost of living.

It favors legislation amending anti-trust act that "will define as criminal offenses those specific acts that uniformly work attempts to restrain and monopolize trade."

FINDS LABOR MEN GUILTY

Justice Wright Sentences Federation Officials for Contempt.

Washington, June 25.—Samuel Gompers, Frank Morrison and John Mitchell, the American Federation of Labor leaders, were held guilty of contempt of court by the supreme court of the District of Columbia in connection with a court injunction in the Bucks Stove and Range company boycott case. They will attempt to appeal again to the supreme court of the United States, which reversed their former conviction.

Justice Wright sentenced Gompers to one year, the same as upon his previous conviction, and sentenced Morrison to six months. John Mitchell was not present and will be sentenced later.

SEVENTEEN BODIES FOUND

Death Roll in Niagara Dock Collapse Twenty-eight.

Buffalo, N. Y., June 25.—Every hour added to the toll of dead in the accident at Eagle park, Grand island, when fifty feet of an excursion dock collapsed and dropped 100 persons into Niagara river.

Seventeen bodies have been recovered and identified and there is a list of eleven more who were known to have been at the park and have not yet been accounted for.

FIRE SWEEPS CANADIAN TOWN

Many Buildings Burned and One Thousand Homeless.

Quebec, June 25.—Fire destroyed many buildings, including the Chateau Saguenay, the cathedral, the town hall and the Chicoutimi hotel in Chicoutimi, in the district of Saguenay.

Between 100 and 125 buildings were burned and about 1,000 residents were made homeless.

ROYALTON ROAD FIXED
A crew of eight men and four teams were at work Saturday under the direction of Pres. R. L. Palmer and Sec. R. B. Millard of the Morrison County Automobile club, fixing the bad places in the Royalton road. The mud holes have been filled and motorists have not these to be wary of any more between Little Falls and Royalton.
