

# CONSIDERS FIRE TRUCK

## CITY COUNCIL TO INVESTIGATE MATTER—GRANT PERMITS—REFUSE LIQUOR LICENSE

An adjourned meeting of the city council was held Monday evening at the city hall with Aldermen Kiewel, Brown, C. E. Carlson, Parshall, Koslosky, C. A. Carlson, Loucks and Hall present.

The street commissioner was instructed to grade up five blocks on Second street west—2 blocks south and 3 blocks north of Broadway; also 4 blocks on Fourth street west—2 blocks on east side of Broadway.

Geo. Ender, chief of the fire department, in view of the fact that the Fourth ward chemical was in need of extensive repairs, asked that the city council consider the proposition of purchasing an auto-truck for the fire department. Such a truck would include chemical, hook and ladder and hose, and the shortest time it would take to get to a fire would result in the saving of much property; also would make a material difference in insurance rates. The city fathers had before the council meeting looked over the damaged chemical in question, and decided to leave the matter of an auto-truck to the fire committee to look up the cost of same and to investigate the matter of securing a better equipped fire department for the city and report. Mr. Ender stated that the Firemen's Relief association would be willing to loan the city some money to help purchase the fire truck.

A resolution was passed in which the city agrees to pay an additional \$158.80 towards the Third street northeast sewer, recently constructed, providing the property owners redraw their objections to the assessment for the improvement.

A. F. Koslosky was granted a permit to construct a shed, having fire proof roof, on the back of his lot in the business section.

A. K. Hall was granted a permit to construct and repair foundations on his business property on Second street northeast and to erect a solid brick one story building on the condition that he file plans and specifications when starting to build.

Brick & Denis was granted a permit to construct a 45 foot door for the roof of the Little Falls Plumbing & Cycle company building.

John Vertin was granted a permit to build a one-story frame addition to his dwelling house on First avenue southeast.

The bid of H. J. Dorman and brother to repair the West side fire house for \$60 was laid over, and the building committee, which reported the station as badly in need of repairs, was instructed to have the building repaired.

Frank Bourassa was granted a liquor license, but Albert J. Holland's application for a liquor license, having purchased the C. J. Jackson saloon on Broadway east, was turned down, only Aldermen C. E. Carlson, Parshall and Loucks being in favor of granting the license, on the grounds that the man was unknown to them.

The bill of St. Gabriel's Hospital, sum of \$42 for care of a Mr. Kiley, who is suffering from a dangerous cancer in the neck and was placed at the hospital at the order of the city physician, was laid over to the next meeting.

Bill of W. H. Ryan in sum of \$933.10 for putting in the Third street northeast sewer was left to regular meeting for the O. K. of the street commissioner.

The Howe, Seales company bill in sum of \$405 was held over until the work on the city scales is finished up. G. H. Enke's bill, sum of \$82.16, for labor, etc., on flag staff, was laid over for the table for explanation.

Adjournment was taken to next Tuesday.

A special meeting of the city council was held Saturday evening, Aldermen Kiewel, Lane, C. E. Carlson, Hall and Koslosky being present.

A delegation of ladies from the Civic League appeared before the council with the request that the city provide teams for the hauling away of garbage cans, which the league would ask the citizens to provide at their respective residences into which to put garbage and place conveniently for the teamster to haul away and empty. The request was granted.

Fire Chief Ender told of the condition of the Fourth ward chemical. F. J. Schwalier was granted a liquor license.

D. M. Cameron, representing the property owners, who kicked on the assessment of the board of public works for the Third street northeast sewer, requested that the city appropriate more for the sewer as there had been extra cost on account of a rock ledge in laying same. N. N. Berghain explained the action of the board of public works and asked that the city appropriate more towards its share of the improvement. The matter was acted on at Monday's meeting.

The president of the council was instructed to appoint a committee of three, to include the city attorney, to appear before the state tax commission and see that the city's interests are taken care of in the actions of that board.

The city clerk was instructed to buy a mower to be used in cutting down the grass on the sides of the streets of the city.

The report of the committee appointed to look into the matter of opening Tenth avenue southwest, which was that the improvement was not practical at this time, was accepted.

The request of L. J. Drellack that Fourth avenue northeast, from First street to the river, be fixed up, was referred to the street committee for investigation.

W. H. Ryan was granted a permit to repair the stairway on the Jones & Ferrell building on First avenue southeast and a few other repairs on it.

S. K. Harting was granted a sidewalk permit. The street commissioner was instructed to fix that part of Fifth avenue northeast, between Seventh and Eighth streets.
