BOARD OF EDUCATION ORGANIZES FOR ENSUING YEAR AT MEETING SATURDAY

The board of education organized at a meeting held at the First National bank Saturday, T. C. Gordon being elected president, L. E. Richard secretary at salary of \$150 per year, and John Wetzel treasurer. J. K. Martin, G. W. Massey and S. C. Vasaly were appointed a purchasing committee. Security bond for \$10,000 was decided upon as the amount to be given by the treasurer.
