

## PARCEL POST IN EFFECT

### LOCAL PATRONS TAKE ADVANTAGE OF NEW LAW—SERVICE PROMISES BIG GROWTH

While the parcel post has not been taken advantage of to any great extent at the local postoffice as yet, there is promise of a growing use of the mails under this plan. The postmaster at each office will report to the department the 15th of the month on the amount of mails handled under the new law.

On fourth class matter there is a great decrease in the price of carriage over the former charge through the mails, which is also under express rates.

Three packages were sent by one party to different parts of the country, which under the former classification would have cost 88 cents, at a saving of 53 cents. On another package of merchandise sent within the first zone, there was a cost of 8 cents for carriage, whereby formerly the cost would have been 28 cents.

Throughout the country the parcel post has been taken advantage of for the sending of most every conceivable thing, eggs, chickens, pies, etc., having been mailed.

Care should be taken to use parcel post stamps only on these packages, as otherwise they will be held up for postage.

## FIREMEN'S GYMNASIUM MEETING TONIGHT

A meeting of the Firemen's Gymnasium association will be held at the city hall this evening and all members are requested to be present. The organization was perfected last year and some apparatus was purchased and installed in the main room on the second floor of the city hall. The apparatus was taken down during the summer period but will be replaced and the gym will be opened to the members of the association again in a few days.

The plans for this year include the purchasing of more paraphernalia. The firemen now have an excellent shower and a tub bath in the basement of the city hall which were put in by the council.

A gymnasium was maintained by the firemen several years ago at the city hall and some of the apparatus used then forms part of the present equipment.

## BILL TO AMEND ANTI-PASS LAW

## AS TO TOBRENS TITLE

### One Acquiring Interest Pending Proceedings, Should Answer at Once

The state supreme court has handed down a decision in reapplication of T. H. Brown, to register title to real estate in Crow Wing county. Thomas H. Brown, applicant-respondent, vs. Fred J. Hagadorn, et al, defendants, Northern Water Power Co., et al defendants respondents, Wm. H. McGrath, et al, appellants.

Under R. L. 1905, section 3395, providing that where a person acquires an interest in land pending proceedings to register the title thereof and prior to the entry of decree, he must appear and answer in such proceedings "at once." Persons who delayed more than six months after actual notice of proceedings to register the title to certain land, before making application for permission to answer in such proceedings in order to assert interest were not entitled to answer as a matter of right: R. L. 1905, section 3396, having no application to such a case.

The trial court held, in such case, not to have abused its discretion in denying the application for leave to answer.

Order affirmed.

## IRON OPTION IS GIVEN

### JUDGE HALE OF DEERWOOD TAKES OPTIONS ON 375 ACRES IN ROSING TOWNSHIP

Judge James T. Hale of Deerwood has secured option on 375 acres of land in the eastern part of Rosing, Morrison county, about 35 miles northwest of this city. The instruments of which there were three were filed in the office of the Register of Deeds Saturday, and are for a period of one year.

Each option is given for \$1 and "other valuable consideration" and are subject to renewal for a period of one year upon the payment of \$2 per acre. The options are let for mineral explorations and contain a clause, giving to Mr. Hale or his heirs the right to purchase the properties at \$100 per acre.

Following is a description of the lands: From Ernest Roxberg, lots 1, 2, 4 and the SW 1/4 of the NE 1/4 of section 32, township 133, range 29, containing 135 acres. From Oscar Roxberg, the E 1/2 of the NW 1/4 and the N 1/2 of the SW 1/4 in section 29, township 133, range 29, containing 100 acres. From Peter Swanson and August Swanson, the E 1/2 of the SE 1/4 of section 31, township 133, range 29, containing 80 acres.

As Mr. Hale is associated with many of the big iron men on the Cuyuna range, it is thought very likely that drilling operations will commence on the land very soon.

## GETS FINAL PATENT PAPERS

Final patent papers for the sickle cut lawn mower which he invented have been received by Geo. Gerritz. He has also made application for Canadian patents.

Mr. Gerritz will put one of the machines on exhibition at one of the hardware stores shortly and will give demonstrations early in the spring. He has as yet made no arrangements for its manufacture, but has a number of offers to put the machine out on a royalty basis. It is to be hoped that they can be manufactured at this point.
