## SAW MILL STARTS LATER THAN LAST YEAR

**THURSDAY MORNING—A WEEK LATER THAN LAST YEAR**

The saw mill of the Pine Tree Manufacturing company of this city commenced operations for the season Thursday morning. This is a week later than it started last year, when work commenced April 10.

Supt. T. O. Berg has been busy getting men and has been fortunate in retaining almost all the old employees. A trial run was made Wednesday afternoon and as everything had been overhauled during the winter no trouble was experienced in starting. The mill will run night and day with 11 hour shifts.

The late start was due to the continual cold weather until last Sunday, when the thermometer jumped from freezing to 70 above zero and the ice went out the same day.

## TO PRESENT PETITIONS

**TO COUNCIL NEXT THURSDAY EVENING, FOR AND AGAINST RAISE IN LIQUOR LICENSE**

The matter of raising the saloon license of the city to \$1,000, will be taken up at the meeting of the council next Thursday evening, and petitions have been circulated for and against the raise, to be presented that evening. Some of the business men have also been asked to write letters on the question. There will likely be a number of people present to speak on the matter also.

## WILL ENFORCE SIDEWALK ORDINANCE

Hereafter no baseball practice will be allowed on the streets and bicycle riding on the sidewalks will also be prohibited. Mayor F. C. Johnson has issued orders to that effect to Chief of Police LeBlanc and the latter states that the orders will be enforced. There has been considerable complaint about both and it is reported that one lady was injured as the result of a ball in the streets. The violation of the ordinance prohibiting riding bicycles on the sidewalk carries with it a fine of from \$1 to \$10 or a limit of ten days in the county jail. Peddlers and transient merchants will also have to obtain a license for the sale of their goods in the city.

## WORK ON GARAGE PROGRESSING

Work is well under way on the new garage which is being erected on First street southeast. The boiler room is nearly completed and the crew is now working on the walls of the building. C. B. Buckman is superintending the work and states that the garage will be completed in about two months. The building will be a one story structure, with brick facing and will be lined with hollow tile, which will make the building absolutely frost and moisture proof.

## MEADOW FIRE LOSSES

**ISAAC RAYMOND AND FRANK PEDLEY OF LITTLE FALLS TOWN SUFFER**

A meadow fire on the Platte river flats destroyed a good deal of property Wednesday. A barn on the Isaac Raymond farm was burned and the house was only saved by backing. Neither building was occupied.

The fire also destroyed the buildings on the farm just west of Frank Pedley's place, which contained 100 bushels of corn belonging to Mr. Pedley and the household goods of Frank Sinclair. Some farm machinery and about 15 tons of hay were also burned. The loss will aggregate quite a sum.

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Pedley, who were fighting the fire, on account of the rapid advance of the flames, were hard pressed to get out of the fire's path.

## JOHN WELTER MAY BE PARDONED

John Welter, who was sentenced to the state penitentiary for a murder 19 years ago on circumstantial evidence, may be pardoned, according to an article in the Minneapolis Tribune of this week. Welter was convicted of the murder of a harness maker named Kosanke in his shop late one night. He has spent 19 years at the penitentiary and is now a member of the prison Chautauque society. The case has been continued for further investigation.

## DRIVES HAVE STARTED

**CREW OF 75 MEN START UPPER RIVER DRIVE AT BRAINERD YESTERDAY**

The upper drive started operations Thursday morning from Brainerd with a crew of seventy-five men, five teams and a steamboat. Ed. Lovio is supervising the work again this year.

With the high stage of the water it is expected that the drive will make fast time, but as there are about 50 million feet of logs to be moved this year it may necessitate the increasing of the crew to 100 men.

The lower drive will start from St. Cloud in about ten days and will be under Otis Wahl. They will work to Minneapolis from the granite city and it will take considerably longer time.

Today the Mississippi and Rum River Boom company will also commence operations. They have a large amount of work on hand as some of the booms were torn from their holdings when the ice went out.

## WANT SALARIED TEAM

**FANS ANXIOUS TO HAVE LITTLE FALLS ON BASEBALL MAP THIS SEASON**

The Athletic association held their annual meeting Monday evening, and also heard the report of the committee on the baseball situation. The consensus of opinion was that the ball team this year be under the direction of the association.

The committee, Chas. Sylvester, Al. Dominick and Jos. Moeglein reported that the fans were in favor of a salaried team to play about two months. They stated that the cost of such a team would be about \$2,250 and as the gate receipts would average about \$1,000 it would be necessary to get subscriptions for about \$1,250. Should the team then prove a winner and the gate receipts show up better, the team would play for another month or so. The total amount subscribed last year was nearly \$1,000 but this amount could not be reached this year should the team be run as it was last year.

According to the figures of the committee with a salaried team three or four games would be played every week and out of this at least two would be played in the city, one week day and a Sunday game.

With a salaried team and a capable management on whom all responsibilities would rest, Little Falls should have a winning team.

A committee was appointed to solicit the necessary funds to finance the team as follows: Geo. Gordon, Earl Wetzel, Geo. Kiewel, Al. Dominick, Chas. Sylvester and John Cairns.

E. W. Kalher was reelected president of the association, Jos. Moeglein, secretary and Al. Dugas, treasurer.

The board of directors, besides the officers is composed of Frank Kiewel, P. J. Vassly, Dr. S. R. Fortier and Julius Jetka.

A balance of \$56 was reported in the association's treasury, the rent for the ball park for this year having been paid.

## OVER TO GRAND JURY

**ED. PALMQUIST, EMPLOYED BY ED. CASH, CHARGED WITH THEFT OF \$30**

Ed. Palmquist, employed on the farm of Ed. Cash, south of town, was arrested Monday by Deputy Sheriff Paul Felix, charged with grand larceny in the second degree. The man has been in the employ of Mr. Cash for the past three years and was always trustworthy, but shortly before the theft had acted queerly.

The charge was preferred by Miss Chillquist, who was recently married to Geo. Cash. She stated that she had stored \$30 in a room at the home of Ed. Cash, and, thinking it safe, paid no attention to it until she was in need of funds, when she discovered that the money was missing.

The man had been drinking very much of late and had stayed upstairs all day Sunday. When asked if he was going to have dinner he said he did not want anything to eat. He finally came down, saying that he was going to meet Geo. Cash, who was in the city. Mr. Cash, however, did not meet him on his way home and this aroused the suspicions of Miss Chillquist.
