SEPT. 18, 19 AND 20 WILL BE BIG DAYS—PREMIUM LIST IN THIS ISSUE

The county fair this year promises to be a success in every respect, according to the outlook at the present time. From all parts of the county come the reports that the farmers expect a bumper crop, which is the most essential thing in the success of the fair.

J. Jetka and Barney Burton, who were appointed as a committee to solicit from the merchants, commenced work the first of the week, and state that they have met with unusual success thus far. It is thought that there will be no trouble in getting the required amount by subscriptions, and the donations are larger than ever before.

As has been mentioned before, the fair will be held on grounds located west of the railroad tracks near the gun club grounds. This land must be paid for, and also a number of buildings which are to be used for exhibiting.

In this week's issue of the Herald, we are publishing a list of the premiums to be offered at the fair this year. The list will be found on page 7.

It is expected that fairs to be held hereafter will be self-sustaining and that this will likely be the last year that a subscription list will be circulated.

BOUND TO GRAND JURY

JAMES SULLIVAN OF RANDALL CHARGED WITH SERIOUS OFFENSE

James Sullivan of Randall was bound over to the grand jury Wednesday afternoon by Justice Gaudet on a statutory charge. N. Mueller of Randall was the complainant.

His bonds were set at \$700, which were furnished by his father.

The crime with which Sullivan is charged was committed over a year ago. He is a mail carrier on a Rural route from Randall.

The arrest was made on Tuesday and Mr. Sullivan's hearing was set for Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock. All witnesses were not present at this time, however, and the case was adjourned to 3 o'clock in the afternoon, when the state presented its evidence.

The crime, which is a very serious one, will mean a prison sentence of not to exceed seven years in event of conviction. Evidence of the crime, as brought out in the hearing, is circumstantial. His trial will come up at the fall term of the district court, which convenes September 2.

REMOVAL OF MAYOR

GOES TO DISTRICT COURT—JUDGE ROSEER ISSUES RESTRAINING ORDER ON COUNCIL

The city council was enjoined by an order of Judge Roseer of St. Cloud, issued on Tuesday from proceeding with the matter of the removal of Mayor F. C. Johnson, on the charges preferred against him, which charges were to come up at a meeting of the council last night. Alderman F. E. Hall, president of the council, was served with the order Wednesday morning.

The city of Little Falls, through its council, is cited to appear at the opening of court on the 2nd day of September, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard, and show cause why it should not be restrained from further action as regards the removal of the mayor.

The mayor in his complaint alleges that he has performed all the duties of the office in accordance with the requirements of the law to the best of his ability; that the charges are untrue and without foundation; that the city council is not a properly organized council; and asks that a temporary injunction be granted against the defendant that it may not interfere with the plaintiff in the performance of his duties and for such other and further relief as the court may seem just and proper, together with the costs and disbursement.

The board of county commissioners on Tuesday approved the bonds of E. A. Kling for clerk of court. He took the office as soon as the bonds were approved. Mr. Kling will serve by appointment until the end of the present term, which expires about a year and a half from date.

E. A. Kling, clerk of court, is in receipt of a communication from the national capitol, which concerns naturalization papers. According to law applications for papers must be made before September 27, 1913, where the declarations of intention were filed prior to Sept. 26, 1906. If this is not done another declaration will be necessary and the person will have to wait for at least two years before making his application for the papers.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

OFFICERS ELECTED FOR ENSUING YEAR—DISPOSE OF REGULAR BUSINESS

The regular annual meeting of the school board was held at the First National bank Saturday afternoon with all members present except John Wetzel.

T. C. Gordon was re-elected president for the ensuing year. L. E. Richard was re-elected secretary at a salary of \$150 for the year. John Wetzel was re-elected treasurer, and his bonds fixed at \$10,000. G. W. Massey, S. C. Vasaly and Carl Bolander were appointed as purchasing committee.

The first Wednesday of each month was selected as the day for the holding of the regular monthly meetings and the German American National bank was designated as the meeting place.

The janitors in the various school buildings were given an increase of \$10 per month for the ensuing year.

The matter of making repairs as needed in the schools before the opening of the fall term, was left to the purchasing committee with power to set.

September 1 was set as the date for the opening of the public schools. The first day of September is Labor day.

The sewer plans for the new high school, as drawn by T. Walsh, were accepted and the secretary was instructed to advertise for bids on the same. Bids are to be opened Monday, August 11.

Proposed White Way

LITTLE FALLS MAY BE ILLUMINATED BY POST LIGHTING SYSTEM

The city council met in an adjourned session Wednesday evening, with all aldermen present except Brown. The main reason for the meeting was to take up the matter of the proposed white way.

Alderman Loucks, chairman of the post lighting system committee, reported that the matter had been taken up with the Water Power company, and that estimates had been made.

T. C. Gordon, who was present at the meeting, addressed the council, giving a summary of the plans and cost of the proposed white way. As suggested, this system of lighting would extend for eight and a half blocks, beginning at Broadway and Second street west and running on Broadway to Second street east. The system would also run one block north and one block south on First street east and one block south on Second street east on the west side of the street.

The lighting would be the same as is now used on Second street north east, with clusters of five lamps on each post, four sixty watt mazdas and one forty watt. The estimated cost of installing this form of lighting would aggregate \$620 per block or \$5,270 for lighting the city as proposed. This, however, would not include the Broadway bridge. The cost, aside of the installation, would be \$24 more per month than at present. Should the city install the new white way, it is understood that the county commissioners will put in the same form of lighting around the court house block. Another meeting, as announced in another column, will be held Monday evening, August 11, when the matter will be taken up more thoroughly.

An ordinance, relating to sidewalks and boulevards, which was introduced by Alderman Carlson, was passed by the council. Upon examining Bay street, prior to laying cement sidewalks, it was found that a number of shade trees stood two feet outside of the lots and in order to build the walk according to the provisions of Section 10 of Ordinance No. 168, it would be necessary to remove the trees or to build the walk around them. The amendment provides that the walk be built two feet from the lots and cuts down the width of the boulevard, which should be six feet, to four.

The street commissioner was given permission to expend not to exceed \$200 more for improving Broadway west. His report for \$126.75 was approved by the council.

Wm. Batters, custodian at the city hall, brought up the matter of having a new boiler installed in the heating plant at the city hall, as the one now in use can not be repaired. The matter was referred to the fire committee for investigation.

ORDINANCE IS KILLED

WOULD HAVE CLOSED ALL INSIDE SALOON DOORS, REMOVED CARD ROOMS, ETC.

The regular monthly meeting of the city council was held Monday evening, with all members present except Brown.

A permit was granted to the Vasaly Realty company to erect a two-story brick building on Broadway, next to the building occupied by Val. E. Kapsner and M. V. Wetzel.

The bill of N. N. Bergheim for \$267 for attorney's fees in connection with preparing of the new charter, also including paper, stenographer, etc., was allowed.

The new charter was submitted to the council and the matter of holding a special election was discussed and proposed to be held on October 28. The proposed charter was ordered printed, once a week for four weeks, in the papers of the city.

Alderman Peterson of the park committee asked the council for an additional donation of \$25 for a fence at the Pine Grove park, in which to keep the deer. The cost of the erection of the same came above the original figures as the posts could not be secured in this vicinity and were shipped in from Brainerd.

Deyo & Rehan of the Victor theatre were granted a transfer of theatre license from Wm. Burns.

Crossings of crushed rock were ordered in at Third avenue and First avenue of Fourth street northeast. A number of other crossings were also ordered in and sidewalks ordered laid.

Alderman LaFond brought up the matter of opening Second avenue N. E. The corner lot at this place has been used as a road for some time as the road was never opened up but the lot has been purchased and fenced in which makes it necessary to open the avenue. The matter was left in the hands of the street commissioner for action.

The matter of the hearing of Paul Posh and Chris. Karnowski as to why their liquor licenses should not be revoked, were postponed until the first meeting in September as one of the witnesses for the state is out of the city at the present time.

The street committee was instructed to look into the matter of laying a cross walk in the alley between the Larson & Briese grocery store and the Diamond Sign jewelry store.

The ordinance, introduced by Alderman Parshall some time ago, to regulate the sale of intoxicating liquors, was taken up at this meeting. The ordinance, had it been passed, would require all doors leading into and another room to be closed up and all card rooms to be taken out. It would allow no chairs or benches in the saloon, with the exception of one chair for the bartender, to be kept behind the bar. It would require the removal of all blinds between the hours of 11 p. m. and 5 a. m. and would require one light to be burning all night so that the place could be inspected from the outside by the police. A number of local citizens spoke as being opposed to the ordinance and an aye and nay vote was taken on the same
