DOCK CRASH FATAL TO FOUR

Accident at the Head of the Lakes Said to Be Due to Carelessness of Switching Crew.

Two men are known to have been killed, two are fatally injured, four were seriously hurt and five are said by the workmen to be unaccounted for as the result of a collision of ore trains at the Allouez ore docks.

Nick Libest and John Koski, laborers, of Superior, are the dead.

Isaac Isel, laborer, leg cut off; and an unidentified man, laborer, leg and arm cut off, cannot live.

APPLY TORCH TO BUILDINGS

Incendiaries and Robbers Busy at Virginia.

Incendiaries and robbers made a trip across the city of Virginia and set fire to Mesburg & Lavick's furniture store, with flats above; to the State bank, to the Duluth, Missabe and Northern depot and to Andrew Grande's warehouse.

The Mesburg block was gutted and occupants of three apartments had narrow escapes, having to grope their way out through smoke in their night clothes.

The fires are all known to be of incendiary origin and were reported at intervals of about twenty minutes. At all the places there were oil saturated clothes and paper and attempts were made in every case to break into drawers and open safes.

Entrance was effected in each case through a window. At the bank a small amount in cash and stamps was obtained. The robbers by mistake locked the safe at Mesburg's store, not knowing it was open.

The police received a fake call to a distant part of the city when the gang was ready to operate. One man was seen to be lighting the oiled clothing at the Grande warehouse.

FATAL CAVEIN AT ANOKA

Victims Caught in Trench When Walls Collapse.

One man was killed, five were injured, one so seriously he may die, and twenty or more narrowly escaped when the walls of an excavation being made to install a new boiler in the state asylum for the insane at Anoka caved in.

Scores of workmen dug frantically in the ruins in the hope that the one man, caught beneath more than a ton of cement and mortar that fell into the excavation, might be taken out alive. His body was found crushed.

More than twenty men had been employed digging a deep trench to the boiler room of the asylum.

Those in it were working near the building when suddenly one wall caved in. John Johnson, who was killed, was directly beneath the avalanche. Albin Rydquist, who was probably fatally injured, was caught and almost buried. The others were struck with pieces of falling cement, but managed to extricate themselves and then rescue Rydquist.

CONGRESSMAN IS A BENEDICT

Clarence B. Miller of Duluth Marries Washington Woman.

Congressman Clarence B. Miller of Duluth and his bride are spending their honeymoon at Los Angeles. Their wedding came as the culmination of a romance that had its inception in the national capital, where the congressman while attending to his legislative duties also laid siege to the heart of Miss Gertrude V. Pattison, a niece of former Surgeon General George Sternberg.

It was to avoid ostentatious display and the curious eyes of a host of friends that the couple met in Los Angeles to speak the words that their husband and wife. The ceremony was performed without any attendants.

PULMOTOR SAVES CHILD.

Minneapolis, July 31.—A newly-born baby girl, daughter of Mrs. William Cummings, was saved from death at the city hospital by the use of the pulmotor. The little girl was born apparently lifeless. Dr. Edmund Smith, hospital staff physician, applied the pulmotor for twenty minutes. Then the child was breathing normally. It is believed she will live. A twin brother was born at the same time.

OF GREAT VALUE TO STATE

Minnesota Subject of Laudatory Articles in Eastern Magazines.

The state of Minnesota is getting some valuable advertising at the present time in some of the largest Eastern magazines. A recent issue of The Country Gentleman, an agricultural paper of national circulation, contained an editorial which gave the Minnesota state board of immigration much publicity, and at the same time called public attention to the resources and opportunities of Minnesota.

The Youths Companion of July 17 published an editorial highly complimentary of Minnesota and pointed out the fact that Minnesota had wisely handled her state lands, so that today she has a permanent trust fund of over \$29,000,000 and will have in 1950 a fund of \$200,000,000. Articles of this character, appearing in such largely circulated papers, are of incalculable value to Minnesota. As a result of this publicity many inquiries are being received by the state board of immigration asking about Minnesota's lands and opportunities.

Fred D. Sherman, the commissioner of immigration, is preparing a series of articles on Minnesota which will appear from time to time in several Eastern magazines.

WESTON AT END OF LONG WALK

Arrives at Minneapolis After Hiking 1,600 Miles.

Minneapolis downtown streets were jammed when Weston strode up Nicollet avenue and ended his 1,600-mile walk. Weston immediately laid the mortar on the corner stone of the new Minneapolis Athletic club's building.

SWITCH ENGINE HITS AUTO

One Woman Killed and Several Persons Injured.


One woman was killed and another woman, a man, a boy and a girl were injured at Tracy when a switch engine struck an automobile on the main crossing of the Northwestern road.

The occupants of the car were Mr. and Mrs. Tom Connors and daughter of Seaford, Minn., and Mrs. Wallace Comstock and son of Minneapolis. Mrs. Connors was killed instantly, her body being cut in two by the wheels of the engine. Mrs. Comstock was injured seriously and may die. Her son, Charles Comstock, sixteen years old, is unconscious and is very badly injured. Mr. Connors was shaken up and has a weak head.
