The husband managed to escape arrest, but Mrs. Fletcher was brought back to England, indicted under the old statute of witchcraft and sorcery and sentenced to twelve months' imprisonment with hard labor.—London Spectator.

THREE MEN DIE IN MINE

Funerals of Nashauk Victims Die Close Two Others Probably Mortally Hurt.

Three men are known to have been killed, two others were injured probably mortally and more may have been killed underground in a mine accident at Nashauk.

Though the accident occurred several days ago no word of it was permitted to leak out until the funerals of two of the men killed took place. All were foreigners.

It was learned that two other men had been hoisted from the mine and hurried to a Hibbing hospital. It was said there they have slight chances of recovery.

Mine officials refuse to give out any details concerning the accident.

DEPOT MAY COST \$15,000,000

New Union Station at St. Paul is Assured.

Assurance that a new Union depot would be built in St. Paul shortly was given by Carl R. Gray, president of the Great Northern railroad, and A. J. Earling, president of the St. Paul road, at the conclusion of the meeting at Chicago of the executives of all of the roads involved.

Both Mr. Gray and Mr. Earling placed the cost of the new depot at between \$10,000,000 and \$15,000,000 and both were confident that the actual construction work would start by the spring of next year and possibly before.

The last physical obstacle was removed when Mr. Earling said that a change suggested in the plan would make the physical conditions satisfactory to the St. Paul road.

FOR RELIEF OF SETTLERS

Steenson Has Bill Affecting Northern Minnesota.

Following his announced intention to present a measure in congress for the relief of settlers in Northern Minnesota Representative Steenson introduced a bill providing: "That, as to all homestead entries on ceded Indian lands in the state of Minnesota, heretofore or hereafter made, it shall be sufficient to show at the time of final proof that an amount equal to \$125 an acre for the whole area entered has been expended in draining, clearing, slashing, grubbing, breaking, or otherwise preparing the land for cultivation, although the area actually put under cultivation may be less than that required by the homestead law."

YOUTH DROWNED IN BATHTUB.

Minneapolis, Oct. 21.—Fred Watson, aged seventeen years, of Mahtowa, Minn., student at the state farm school, was drowned in a bathtub at the home of his uncle, C. J. Fauwkner. It is believed Watson was overcome by gas fumes escaping from a heater and fell into the water.

GREAT WESTERN EARNINGS

Ten Per Cent Increase Noted in Report Made Public. An increase of \$1,205,376.29 in the earnings of the Chicago Great Western for the fiscal year ending June 30, as compared with the preceding fiscal year, is shown in the annual report of the company, made to the stockholders at the annual meeting Oct. 2 and just made public. The total operating revenue for the year was \$14,000,618. Of this \$9,795,074 was from freight and \$3,144,283.86 from passenger traffic. Operating expenses were \$10,260,142. The total net revenue for the year was \$3,742,769, the total charges \$2,176,785 and the surplus \$1,245,039.

EBERHART SILENT ON RACE

Governor Declines to Comment on Iverson's Candidacy.

Governor Eberhart, who, it is expected, will again seek the Republican nomination for re-election, has nothing to say concerning the announcement of the candidacy of Samuel G. Iverson, state auditor, and his platform. Neither would he say when he would announce his candidacy, if at all. "There is plenty of time yet to make announcement of my candidacy," he said.

St. Cloud Pioneer Dead.

William True Clark, eighty-three years old, a pioneer lumberman and a resident of St. Cloud for sixty years, is dead. Mr. Clark took part in the fight against the Indians who stormed the town of St. Cloud during the Civil war. He reached St. Cloud from Maine, his native state, in 1857 and entered the lumber business.

IRON ORE IN AITKIN COUNTY

Drilling Operations Are Proving to Be Very Successful.

Interest in mining circles of late has been turned to the country north-east of Aitkin; where drilling operations are giving indications of the existence of large bodies of ore. While it has been thought that the Cuyuna formation extended in that direction so far little development work has been done there.

The Winton-Vermilion Iron company has drills at work on the north half of the northwest quarter of section 9, 47-26, and fine results are being obtained. A recent sample of the ore taken from one drill hole assayed 58.74 per cent metallic iron, only .02 per cent phosphorus and 11 per cent silica.

This is considered a good Bessemer ore and indications point to a very large body of it. The deepest hole is now down 265 feet and the iron formation, which was encountered at 102 feet, is still holding.

DULUTH MAN DEAD AT FRISCO

Succumbs to Wounds Inflicted by Woman.

Joseph D. Van Baalen, a Duluth advertising solicitor, who was shot at San Francisco recently by Miss Leah Alexander, who said he jilted her, is dead.

Miss Alexander chatted and laughed with a young woman friend at the city prison. "By the way, how's Van?" she asked.

The visitor lowered her gaze and the prisoner guessed the truth. "It's not true; it's not true," she cried and became hysterical. The police say she will be charged with murder.

Van Baalen's body will be sent to his parents in Duluth by the Order of Elks.

THIRTY FIREMEN IN DANGER

Blaze at St. Paul Endangers Number of Lives.

Thirty firemen narrowly escaped death and one partially was overcome by smoke in a fire in the T. C. Borg Furniture company's building at St. Paul. After an hour's fight the fire was under control, with an estimated loss of \$50,000.

The flames, which are believed to have started from crossed wires in the elevator shaft, spread with rapidity. Thirty firemen went to the roof with lines of hose and left their positions under orders from Assistant Chief Letford just as a wall of fire burst through the roof and licked the top of the building.

FARMERS TO RAISE ALFALFA

Business Men Will Aid Otter Tail County Growers in Getting Start.

A movement is on foot at Fergus Falls to interest the farmers of Otter Tail county in raising alfalfa. The plan under way is to have twenty leading business men of the county sign a guarantee for \$2,500 and with this sum of money send an agent to some locality where good, acclimated seed can be obtained. This seed will be sold at cost to farmers. Several business men have already signed the guarantee and no difficulty is expected in securing the necessary signatures.

TAKES POISON FOR BRANDY

Farmer Near Caledonia Dies From Liquid Swallowed in Dark.

Joseph McKenna, fifty years old, a well to do farmer residing near Caledonia, had cramps during the night and going into the pantry without troubling to turn on the light reached for the brandy bottle. He took one swallow, then realized that he had taken a deadly poison by mistake and cried for help.

MILL CITY POSTAL OFFICIAL DEAD.

Martin C. Fosnes, assistant postmaster at Minneapolis, died suddenly of apoplexy in his room at the Marlborough apartments in St. Paul. Mr. Fosnes was born in Norway in March, 1851, and came to this country with his parents when he was seven years old. He lived near Winona up to twenty-five years ago, when he entered the postal service.

BITTERLY ASSAILS BRYAN

Henry Lane Wilson Makes Public Letter of Resignation.

Spokane, Wash., Oct. 21.—The letter to Secretary of State Bryan, in which Henry Lane Wilson tendered his resignation as American ambassador to Mexico, was made public here by Mr. Wilson. In the letter, which was written in Indianapolis, Ind., Aug. 28, Mr. Wilson bitterly assails Mr. Bryan for the course pursued prior to accepting his resignation, tendered March 4, and dwelling on the instructions the secretary of state gave to the American ambassador in London. Mr. Wilson also complains of his official treatment after his return to Washington from Mexico.

Objected to Cigar Odor.

Joliet, Ill., Oct. 21.—The odor of a cigar, offensive to John Kraft, resulted in the death of Herman Muhlfeit and the placing of Kraft on trial for murder here. Muhlfeit died from a blow received in a fight with Kraft, started by Kraft's objection to the odor of Muhlfeit's cigar.
