ABOUT THE STATE

News of Especial Interest to Minnesota Readers.

LAW WITHOUT PRECEDENT

Railroads and Shippers Doubtful of Effects of the Cashman Distance Tariff Statute.

Significant to railroads and even more to shippers was the announcement by the state railroad and warehouse commission that it has completed the task of compiling a new schedule of freight rates in accordance with the terms of the Cashman distance tariff law enacted by the last legislature.

The commission, in making this announcement, outlined its method of procedure. The tariffs will be submitted to railroad officials and interested shippers at once. Beginning about Nov. 5 the commission will hold open meetings to hear all criticisms and suggestions concerning the tariffs it has framed, that may be advanced. These will continue for a month or more, when the commission will revise such schedules as are proved to be defective and establish the schedule, which is to go into effect on Jan. 1.

What effect the law will have on state railroads and industries no one, not even the most expert railroad freight rate experts, dares to guess. Even the state commission is unable to venture a prediction. That body has followed the law closely in making the new rates, but as the entire system is a novelty in Minnesota, there is nothing upon which to base conclusions as to the ultimate result.

By changing from a flexible distance tariff—the basis of all railroad rates is the distance which the commodity is carried—to an inflexible distance rule, as inflexible as any geometric formula, Minnesota is discarding a system for which it fought six years in the courts and in support of which thousands of dollars of the people's money was spent. It was while the validity of these rates was still being considered by the United States supreme court that the legislature passed the Cashman law altering the whole system, and giving the railroads, if they so desire, an opportunity once more to test in the courts the validity of state made rates.

The principle behind the Cashman law is simple. If a railroad carries 100 pounds of brick from St. Cloud to St. Paul, seventy-five miles, for 10 cents, it must carry the same amount of the same commodity for 10 cents over every other seventy-five-mile stretch of track on its line. This is a hard and fast rule, applying to all commodities.

MANAHAN MAY ENTER RACE

Minnesota Congressman Urged to Seek Nomination for Governor.

James Manahan, congressman at large from this state and announced candidate for congress in the new Tenth district, may yet get into the race for the Republican nomination for governor, according to George S. Loftus, his political manager.

"Mr. Manahan could win easily in the Tenth district, but he has been urged by so many people to get into the fight for governor that he is considering it," said Mr. Loftus. "He has received some flattering offers of support."

Mr. Manahan will be home early in November.

That an entirely new man, well known but not heretofore mentioned for the governorship, probably will be brought out and receive the endorsement of the Progressive Republican league, was the statement of C. H. Richter, chairman of the governing board of the league.

MISS HALL IS PRESIDENT

Women Have Things Their Own Way in Educational Election.

Women teachers swept triumphant through the elections of the Minnesota Educational association, in convention at Minneapolis.

In the victory of Miss Elizabeth Hall of Minneapolis for the presidency the city forces prevailed against the country and won the most hotly contested election in the history of the association. The officers chosen are:

President, Miss Elizabeth Hall, Minneapolis; vice president, G. A. Foster, Willmar; directors for two years, Miss Frances Smith, Winona; Miss Frances Bishop, Northfield.

The secretary and treasurer of the state association are to be elected later by the board of directors.

ZERO WEATHER ON RANGE

Allen Junction in North State Records Low Temperature.

Zero weather has arrived in Northern Minnesota. The mark was recorded at Allen Junction, a station on the Duluth and Iron Range road.

The temperature at Duluth was 17 degrees above zero, at Ely it went as low as 2 degrees, at Eveleth it reached 19 degrees and at Two Harbors 14 degrees.

REV. DR. FORBES IS DEAD

Well Known Methodist Divine Expires at Duluth.

After an illness from a complication of diseases of four weeks' duration Rev. Dr. Robert Forbes, aged seventy, one of the corresponding secretaries of the board of home missions and extension work of the Methodist church, with headquarters at Philadelphia, died at Graham hospital at Duluth.

Dr. Forbes was taken ill at Eugene, Ore., while making his annual tour of the conferences he served. He was well known in Minnesota, where he had been prominently identified with religious work for many years.

Before assuming the pastorate of the Asbury Methodist church at Duluth, which he held for six years, he was pastor of the First Methodist church at Minneapolis and the Jackson street and Central Park churches of St. Paul. He was district superintendent of the Duluth district for about six years and was appointed to the position he held at the time of his death by the board of bishops eleven years ago.

THOMAS MILTON IS DEAD

Gave Minnesota Name of "Bread and Butter State."

Thomas Milton, founder of the Milton Dalry company of St. Paul and originator of the synonym for Minnesota, "The Bread and Butter State," is dead. He had been ill since early in August and his death was not unexpected.

Mr. Milton was born in Hereford, Eng., fifty-one years ago. He reached St. Paul in 1882 and Dec. 12, 1888, established a retail dairy.

Mr. Milton probably accomplished as much as any man in the state in putting Minnesota before the world as a great butter producing state. In 1896 he carried off world honors in butter competition and he and the late Joseph S. Moody at that time coined the expression, "Minnesota, the Bread and Butter State," which is known the world over.

REMARKS CREATE SURPRISE

Pastor Says Half the Churches Ought to Close.

A bomb was thrown into the Churches and Corrections conference at the Church of the Redeemer in Minneapolis when Rev. James W. Cool of the Lynnhurst Congregational church, Minneapolis, said that when half the churches now existing in Minnesota close their doors then the socialization of rural communities can begin and not until then.

"We have no use for anything in any community except a Catholic, Lutheran and Protestant Evangelical church," said Dr. Cool. "I don't care what the other denominations may be we have no use for them."

MINNESOTA DAY IS JUNE 6

That Date Set Apart at Anglo-American Show.

Minnesota day at the Anglo-American exposition will be June 6, 1914. The date has been selected by the executive committee of the fair, which will be held in London from May to October next year.

Other states of the Northwest will have the following special days: Wisconsin, June 29; South Dakota, Aug. 12; North Dakota, Sept. 25.

The object of the exposition is to celebrate the centenary of peace and progress in the arts, sciences and industries of the United States and the British empire.

TWO BROTHERS ARE KILLED

Tossed in the Air When Motor Handcar and Train Collide.

Two men were killed and a third was injured when a motor handcar on which they were riding was struck by a train on the Northwestern road between Tyler and Lake Benton.

Edward Bradtko and his brother, Otto, lost their lives, and Fred Albrecht, their companion, was injured in jumping from the car when the train struck it. All of the men were residents of Lake Benton.

The Bradtkos were killed instantly, being thrown some distance from the track with the wrecked car.

EDSALL HELPS IN RESCUES

Minnesota Bishop One of Passengers on Wrecked Express Train.

Bishop Edsall of the Protestant Episcopal diocese of Minnesota was one of the wreck victims of the Gilt Edge express on the New Haven road in Rhode Island in which fifty-two persons were injured. He was returning to his home from the Episcopalian convention at New York.

When the cars left the track Bishop Edsall, who escaped practically unhurt, was among the first to rush to the assistance of the injured and worked for some hours bandaging cuts and broken bones.

Boats Crash at Duluth.

A barge of the Tonawanda line, up-bound "Night," and the steamer Coralia, down-bound with ore, collided in the Duluth ship canal, the barge being badly damaged. It was towed to Superior ship yards and the Coralia continued on its way after putting back to the harbor where it was inspected.

Government Wins Victory.

Rome, Oct. 28.—Further results of the Italian general elections confirm the government victory and it is certain that the premier will have a large majority of supporters in the chamber of deputies.
