**ABE ON THE MOVE**



**CLERK WINS LAW SUIT**

Chief Justice Brown of the state supreme court has just handed down an opinion affirming the order of the district court of Ottertail county, which held that the clerk of the court of that county could collect for making a complete copy of the vital statistics of the county. The law provides that a fee of 5 cents per name shall be paid the clerk for each name indexed. When the clerk of Ottertail county presented his bill for the copying of the list, amounting to about \$2,400, the county commissioners refused to pay it. He then appealed to the district court and a verdict was given in his favor. The opinion of the supreme court, recently handed down, settles the question of the legality of such a collection of vital statistics and the payment for the same.

**PLANNING BIG RABBIT HUNT**

A large number of sportsmen of this city expect to make a raid on the rabbits next Sunday, according to plans which are now being prepared. The party will consist of about thirty hunters. They will drive to some place where the hunting is known to be good and expect to get a big haul. At noon they will meet at some central place and have dinner in the open.
