### WILL BUILD NEW PAROCHIAL SCHOOL

Pierz Journal: At a meeting by the members of St. Joseph's congregation last Sunday, it was decided to build a new parochial school to take the place of the one destroyed by fire last week. Father Stieler exhibited plans for the new structure which will be of solid brick, two stories high, 76 feet wide, 80 feet long, with full basement, and will contain eight rooms. The site for the building has not yet been definitely selected, but it is more than likely that it will be built upon the church grounds southwest of the parsonage and facing the east and west street. Work will begin as soon as the condition of the ground and weather permits.

### FIND LARGE BODY OF ORE

The Cuyuna Central Iron company of Duluth, one of the latest mining companies to enter the Cuyuna range field, has found a body of ore said to average as high as 65 per cent metallic iron, according to an item in a Crosby paper of recent date.

The new body of ore lies near the Iron Mountain mine, adjoining the rich Hunter tract, and the deposits are said to extend for about 2,000 feet in length, 600 feet wide and 150 feet deep. The officers of the company claim that they have the largest body of high grade ore on the entire Cuyuna range.

### GIRLS ARE LURED AWAY

In her report to the state board of control, Mrs. F. F. Morse, matron of the training school for girls at Sauk Centre, stated that men from Little Falls, Grey Eagle, Swanville and Ward Springs are interfering with her work in the school by luring the girls away from the school and encouraging them to make their escape. She said that the men come to the school grounds and cited several instances, one concerning several Swanville men who were tried in this city on that charge. She recommended that something be done to remedy this trouble.
