**MALICIOUS DESECRATION OF RICE CATHOLIC CHURCH**

The authorities of Rice, a village about 19 miles south of this city, are seeking two young men, whom they suspect were the vandals who broke into the Immaculate Conception Catholic church of that place Friday night and stole the sacred host and chalice and did much damage to the interior decorations of the church. The young men are thought to be residents of Rice. Services were held in the church on the evening of Good Friday and after the services the church was locked. It was between this time and Saturday morning that the edifice had been entered. Candelsticks were broken and strewn over the floor in the sanctuary, flowers were scattered around and altar cloths were thrown into a state of confusion. The ciborium containing the consecrated host for the communion on Holy Saturday was also taken. The ciborium and most of the host was found in a cornfield. The host had been scattered through the field.  
If found the young men will be severely dealt with. They will have to face two charges, one of breaking and entering the church and another charge of disrespect which comes under the general law.

**BOARD OF HEALTH NOTICE!**

The board of health of the city of Little Falls hereby gives notice that due regard for the public health demands a complete sanitary reform within the limits of the city.

THEREFORE IT IS ORDERED that on or before May 1, 1914, every manure pile or other accumulation of filth within the limits of the city of Little Falls shall be removed from such limits, and that all such accumulation upon private property shall be removed by or at the expense of the owners thereof. The accumulation upon the streets and alleys of the city shall be removed by or at the expense of the person who caused the same, where known, and where not known shall be removed by the street commissioner of the city at the public expense.

The street commissioner and the police of the city are ordered to report to the health officers of the city every violation of any provision of this order which shall come to their knowledge after the time stated.

Every such violation will be punished according to law. By the board.
