

**ASSIGNS PASTORS IN DIOCESE****REV. H. KLEIN OF ST. NICHOLAS ASSIGNED TO LASTEUR CHURCH**

St. Cloud Journal-Press: Rt. Rev. Bishop James Trobec has announced the assignment of four different clergymen in this diocese and the new pastors will assume their new stations in the near future. Rev. Joseph Kilian, assistant pastor at the Cathedral church in this city for the past year and a half has been appointed pastor of St. Patrick's church at Melrose. Rev. G. Schollenberger, former assistant pastor at the Cathedral here, but who has had charge of St. Patrick's church in Benton county, has been assigned to the pastorate of St. Nicholas church. The church and parsonage in this town was recently destroyed by fire, but temporary quarters, pending the building of a new church, have been established and he will conduct services there. Rev. H. Klein, former pastor of the St. Nicholas church, has been assigned to Lastrup in Morrison county. Rev. Frank Welp, who has been in charge of St. Patrick's church at Melrose, will go to Alexandria.

Rev. J. Kitowski, former pastor at the church at Foley, has returned from a year's vacation spent abroad. He has been assigned pastor of the church at St. Anna.

**BABY GIRL CHOPPED TO PIECES**

Staples, Minnesota, June 23—A fox terrier, carrying the dismembered trunk of a baby girl from a swamp, has revealed a gruesome tragedy in Byron township, twelve miles north-east of Staples. Later the dog brought to the 12-year-old son of a farmer, Mannik, an arm, which like the trunk had been rudely chopped from the body. The elder Mannik reported the case and today County Attorney Ed. Rogers, Deputy Sheriff Mack Kennedy and Coroner E. F. Miskella, of Walker, are on the scene. The baby is believed to have been twelve hours old before being killed.

**MRS. C. L. BROWN INJURED**

Mrs. C. L. Brown of Mason City, Iowa, sustained serious injuries Sunday of last week, when she fell from the second story window of a hotel. She had been ill for some time before and it is thought that she fell from the window during a fainting spell. She was found on the ground below by a woman who lived in an adjoining building. Mrs. Brown is the wife of C. L. Brown, who formerly operated the Buckman hotel in this city, and has many acquaintances here.

**BOAT CAPSIZES—TWO DROWN****ACCIDENT OCCURRED ON FISH TRAP LAKE—VICTIMS WERE SISTERS**

In an attempt to change places in a rowboat while fishing on Fish Trap lake near Lincoln last Saturday at about 4 p. m., two women, Mrs. J. J. Schmelz of Staples and a sister were drowned, and Wm. J. Schmelz, a brother-in-law of the former, narrowly escaped a like death.

Mr. Schmelz was rowing and the two women were trolling. They tried to change places in the boat, but in the attempt one of them fell, causing the boat to capsize. The accident occurred near a large island in the middle of the lake, and no one was near at the time.

The man was rescued by a fishing party in a launch who discovered the capsized boat from the distance, shortly afterward, and the lake was dragged for the bodies of the two women. These were found about two hours later. The remains were taken to Staples for burial.

**BISHOP TROBEC RESIGNS**

St. Cloud, Minn., June 19.—Rt. Rev. James Trobec, bishop of St. Cloud, one of the oldest and best known Catholic prelates of the north-west, has received word from Rome of the acceptance of his resignation. He desired to retire in favor of a younger man. He is 76 years old.

Bishop Trobec was ordained in 1869, in St. Paul, where he organized and conducted the St. Agnes congregation in 1887 and for ten years subsequent.

He was born in Billichgratz, a small village of Austria. He was the son of a farmer. After two years of home schooling at parochial schools and eleven years in a seminary in a nearby city, Liebach, he emigrated to America in 1864. He spent a year at St. Vincent's college in Pennsylvania, before coming west.

His first assignment was at Bell Prairie, where he remained until October, 1866.

He has been appointed Bishop Titular of Lykopolis, an honorary appointment by Pope Pius, but will remain administrator of the St. Cloud diocese until the appointment of his successor. He will then spend his remaining years in this state.
