News of Especial Interest to Minnesota Readers.

TWO CONTESTS VERY CLOSE

Hammond and Preus Defeated Opponents at the Recent Primaries by Closest of Margins.

An apparent error in reporting the vote for state auditor from Kittson county is expected to cut down the total vote for Henry Rines, candidate for the Republican nomination, by 600.

The figures in one of the hottest fights at the polls ever staged in the state now are: Preus, 64,638; Rines, 64,485. Preus is leading by 153 first choice votes. The second choice compilation to date is Preus 2,942, Rines 2,337. On the second choice ballot Preus leads with 105. The total lead for Preus is 258 votes.

W. S. Hammond moved up to 993 majority over D. W. Lawler in the race for the Democratic nomination for governor.

The official returns on Hammond and Lawler differed slightly from the newspaper figures in a number of counties and the addition of the official figures in fifty-three counties to the newspaper figures on the remaining thirty-three gave Hammond 21,186 and Lawler 20,213.

Lee's Plurality Over 14,000.

William E. Lee's plurality in the contest for the Republican nomination for governor now exceeds 14,000. In 2,472 precincts the vote is: Eberhart 81,794, Lee 95,913.

All other contests have been settled and it is now only questions of majorities for Irving A. Caswell, clerk of the supreme court; J. A. A. Burnquist, lieutenant governor; Walter J. Smith, state treasurer; Lyndon A. Smith, attorney general; O. P. B. Jacobson, railroad and warehouse commissioner, and Justice George L. Bunn and Albert Johnson of Red Wing for the two nominations for the vacancy on the supreme court bench.

Charles B. Elliott of Minneapolis, a former member of the court, and Judge P. W. Morrison of Norwood are in third and fourth places, respectively, with Judge William Watts of Crookston and Hunt of Litchfield trailing. The complete tickets of the two leading parties follow:
