ST. PAUL MEN WIN CONTEST

Title to Iron Ore Land Worth Half a Million Confirmed by Decision of State Supreme Court.

The state supreme court has confirmed the title of Representative Charles N. Orr of St. Paul and his two partners, Herman F. Stark and Charles E. Collett, in a St. Louis county iron mine estimated to be worth \$500,000 or more. William Sutton and Lyman Sutton of Duluth are the losers.

The case has been in the supreme court for months. The reason for the delay was a divided court. The opinion of the majority, Chief Justice C. L. Brown, Justice George L. Bunn and Justice Andrew Holt, is written by Justice Holt. Justices Phillip E. Brown and Oscar Hallam filed vigorous dissents.

Some months ago the defendant Sutton brothers, through their attorneys, Butler & Mitchell of St. Paul and George H. Sullivan and J. N. Searls of Stillwater, asked the supreme court to review a decision relating to the mortgage registry tax which they asserted was obtained through the filing of an improper test case to predetermine the rights of Orr, Stark & Collett when the questions at issue in the instance case were brought up for trial.

Sensational charges of fraud were made and it was alleged the supreme court had been imposed on. Others implicated were William G. White, a St. Paul attorney, and M. W. Fitzgerald, register of deeds for Ramsey county. The supreme court, however, refused to accept the petition and ordered the clerk not to file it after it had been received.

RINES MUST PROVIDE BOND

Court Orders Recount in Minnesota Auditorship Case.

The votes cast for Henry Rines and J. A. O. Preus at the primary election will be recounted.

Following a hearing before Judge John H. Steele in Hennepin county court the recount was ordered provided Mr. Rines puts up a bond for \$5,000 and makes more definite his allegations of fraud at the polling places.

Two referees will be selected. They will select a third. These men, at a stipend of \$15 a day, will conduct the recount.

The court order gives Mr. Rines five days in which to file an amended complaint and Mr. Preus will have five days in which to answer.

The recount will begin about Aug. 1.

CONVICTS TO CLEAR LAND

Plan Favored by Minnesota Federation of Labor.

The State Federation of Labor opened its annual convention at Duluth with 500 delegates present. Mayor Prince welcomed the visitors.

President E. G. Hall made his report and so did Secretary-Treasurer W. E. McEwen. The latter urged the extension of the initiative and referendum and praised the workmen's compensation law.

The committee on convict labor appointed last year in a report demanded the abolition of convict factory labor, approved the using of convicts in the clearing of state lands under the honor system, but declared that convicts "must not be exploited for private profit or in unfair competition with free labor."

RESTORES LAND TO ENTRY

Bill Passed by House Refers to Tract on Upper Mississippi.

A bill passed by the lower house of congress, on motion of Representative Lindbergh, restored to entry a large tract of land in Minnesota at the headwaters of the Mississippi river. The land, which is located in Aitkin, St. Louis, Crow Wing, Cass, Hubbard, Itasca, Beltrami and Koochiching counties, about 6,000 acres, was withdrawn for fowage purposes at the time of the construction of the Mississippi dams and reservoirs. The bill, offered in the senate by Senator Nelson, probably will become a law soon.

OWNER IMBIBED TOO FREELY

Duluth Saloon Closed Because Proprietor Was Intemperate.

For the first time in the history of Duluth a saloon has been closed because it is alleged its proprietor, Gust Johnson, imbibes too freely.

W. A. Hicken, commissioner of public safety, has sent word also to other saloon keepers warning them to be temperate. He says men who cannot control their own appetites for liquor are not desirable in the saloon business in that city.

Three saloon keepers have elected recently to keep sober for the first time in years.

BOARD UNABLE TO AGREE

Cannot Determine Wages for Girls and Minors.

Finding it impossible to reach any agreement by a majority vote as to the minimum wage for women and minors engaged in the mercantile industries of the Twin Cities the advisory board of the state minimum wage commission, after a long session, voted to dissolve.

A report will be made to the commission that the board could reach no agreement by a majority vote.

According to Miss Eliza P. Evans, secretary of the commission, the result will be that the commission will take the subject into its own hands, order public hearings in St. Paul, Minneapolis, Duluth, Winona and St. Cloud and cite the employers to show their books so that the wages paid to women, girls and minors may be ascertained.

FIVE CLUBWOMEN INJURED

Auto in Which They Are Riding Goes Over Embankment.

Five well known Minneapolis clubwomen fell over the 300-foot bluff at Indian Mounds park at St. Paul when the automobile in which they were riding lost its headway on one of the turns in the road that skirts the top of the hills above the Burlington railway tracks.

The car and its occupants rolled down the steep incline for a distance of fifty feet, stopping on a ledge. Mae Wessberg, librarian at the summer branch of the Minneapolis public library, was most seriously injured and may die. Her companions suffered serious internal injuries. All were given emergency treatment by R. A. Schnacke, police surgeon.

VIGOROUS CAMPAIGN ON TUBERCULOSIS

Minnesota State Board Decides to Quarantine.

The Minnesota state board of health has officially declared tuberculosis to be a communicable disease and subject to certain quarantine regulations. This action was taken at the suggestion of Dr. H. M. Bracken, secretary of the board, and marks an epoch in the fight against the white plague in Minnesota. The following resolution was passed:

"Whereas, tuberculosis now is recognized as a communicable disease, therefore, be it resolved, that a case of open tuberculosis must be isolated either in a sanatorium or at home; "Be it also resolved, that all early cases shall be so cared for as to prevent the disease reaching a stage that will become dangerous to others, if possible."

This resolution means that in counties where there are no sanatoria the board will see that in all open cases of this disease, where there is danger of contagion, certain quarantine rules must be enforced.

According to members of the board this resolution and its enforcement is the most important action taken by the state in the war against tuberculosis since the campaign began.

DENIES RINES' APPLICATION

Court Holds Change of Venue in Election Contest Legal.

J. A. O. Preus won the first round in his fight for the Republican nomination for state auditor with Henry Rines when the supreme court refused to compel the Hennepin county district court to transfer the contest proceedings instituted by Rines back to the district court of Kanabec county.

Rines filed his contest papers in his home county and Preus immediately asked that the matter be transferred to his own home county, Hennepin. This was done accordingly under the law and the hearings began before Judge John H. Steele of Minneapolis. Rines asked at this juncture that the case be sent back to Kanabec county. Judge Steele refused his request and mandamus proceedings were filed in the supreme court to compel him so to act.

ATTEMPTS TO KILL WIFE

St. Paul Man Then Ends His Life With Poison.

N. J. Rupplinger, twenty-seven years of age, is dead at St. Paul and his wife, Irene, twenty-six years old, is in a serious condition at the City hospital as the result of a quarrel. Rupplinger, following the quarrel, is alleged to have struck his wife on the forehead with a flatiron. Then he drank two ounces of carbolic acid. He died in a few minutes.

Mrs. Rupplinger will recover, it was said at the City hospital.

SCALDS KILL MANUFACTURER

Steam Shovel Blows Up at Wrenshall, Minn.

Bert Hart, twenty-eight years old, a brick manufacturer of Wrenshall, Minn., died in a hospital at Duluth from the effects of scalds. He succumbed two hours after his arrival on a special train.

A steam shovel blew up at Hart's plant. A heavy section of machinery pinned Hart to the ground and he was enveloped in a cloud of steam.

COMBATING THE FLY

Until quite recently we have been content simply to keep out flies by means of screens on windows and doors and have done little or nothing to prevent their increase.

A stable should not be built near a dwelling house and manure should not be allowed to accumulate. Keep the manure covered or in a dark place if possible until removed. If it is not possible to do this, the hauling away of manure every few days and spreading it over the field where it will dry, will lessen the fly evil. Spraying a manure pile with poison or other liquid is not practical. Keep your premises clean, as free as possible from filth of all kinds—slop, water, garbage, and refuse heaps. If you live in town and your neighbor allows such nuisances upon his premises complain to your board of health. Numerous other methods of combating flies are stated in Extension Bulletin 43, entitled Flies and Their Control.—F. L. Washburn, Entomologist, University Farm, St. Paul.

MAY GET MOOSE FOR PARK

A valuable addition to the collection of animals in the Pine Grove park can be secured by the citizens of Little Falls at a small cost, if they take immediate action. The animal is a large cow moose, which is now being held in captivity at Ellendale, N. D.

Val E. Kasperek, learning that it would be possible to get the moose, wrote to the council of Ellendale in regard to it, and received the answer that the Ellendale council might be induced to sell the animal to Little Falls, providing the keeping charges and the crating charges, which amount to about \$120, would be paid. The letter also stated that immediate action should be taken as several other cities have made inquiries about the animal.

It is estimated that the total cost of getting the moose here would be \$150, which could be easily raised by popular subscription.
