

LOCALS LOSE TO BRAINERD

VERY RAGGED GAME FROM THE FIFTH INNING—DOMINICK GIVEN POOR SUPPORT

Little Falls was given a bad beating by Brainerd on the Brainerd diamond Sunday afternoon, the score at the end of the game being 10 to 3. The defeat of the local team is laid to poor work in the field, as it would be ridiculous to think that a team of Brainerdites could hammer Dominick for a total of 12 hits in seven innings under any other circumstances. Peter Newman pitched the eighth and ninth innings. The lineup of the locals was changed considerably, as Carlyle of Minneapolis, who was to play at short, failed to show up.

No scores were registered on either side until the last half of the fifth inning, when Brainerd got four runs. Bush started things by getting to first on an error by Louier. Bender hit safely, advancing Bush to third, and Gavin singled, scoring Bush. Victor hit one near third base, which Smith grabbed and threw home to catch Bender. The ball struck the runner, however, and he scored. Victor went to third, Erickson made first on an error by Murphy and Gavin was caught at second, Larson struck out and Shefflo was hit by a pitched ball, filling the bases. Cook sent one out in the left field, scoring Victor and Erickson. Templeton flew out to left field, retiring the side. The Brainerdites scored three more runs in the sixth inning. With the two men out Gavin pounded the ball out for a two-bagger, Victor singled, scoring Gavin, Erickson got a hit, scoring Victor and Larson hit safely, scoring Erickson. Shefflo then struck out, ending the scoring this inning. The last three scores made by the up-river team came in the seventh

inning, when Cook hit, stole third and scored on a hit by Templeton, Bush hit, scoring Templeton and later came in on an outfield error.

Little Falls got their three scores in the ninth inning, Louier got a hit and scored on a passed ball, Allison singled, Murphy flew out to third base, Stoll made first on an error by Shefflo, which also allowed Allison first base and Smith struck out, for the third out, ending the game.
