


COME AND GONE

PAY FINE FOR MISTAKE IN IDENTITY

As a result of his not being able to distinguish one of his cattle from one belonging to a neighbor, Stanley Drelack of Pike Creek was fined \$5 and costs, amounting to \$10.70, in Justice Gerritz's court Saturday afternoon.

Drelack's two-year-old heifer strayed from the place during the day and he set out to find her. He saw one which he thought was his at his neighbor's, Mrs. Frank Ginter's place, and proceeded to drive it to his farm. Mrs. Ginter told him that the heifer belonged to her. He answered that if the heifer was not his she would not stay with his cattle, but would return home. This she attempted several times. In the meantime Drelack's stray heifer was found on another neighbor's farm and was taken home.

The woman had a warrant sworn out for Drelack's arrest, charging him with forcibly taking the heifer from her place.

STUNG TO DEATH

Albany Enterprise (20)—The eight-month-old son of Mr. and Mrs. John Kulas, of St. Anna, died this morning, having been stung to death by bees. The lad succumbed to convulsions and the poison from over 250 stings was too great to overcome. Dr. Anderson, of Holdingford, was called and later Dr. Wippermann, of Albany, was summoned, and both executed their services diligently but the youngster's system was filled with the awful poison. The parents were at church on Tuesday when the older children failed to watch the child who wandered to the apiary unnoticed until the cries were heard from him. The eldest of the children suffered severe stings in rescuing their brother. The child was unattended for two hours, until the mother and father returned. The doctors removed about 75 stingers.


The residence of Wm. Hang on Second street northwest was struck by lightning during the storm Saturday. The chimney was knocked down.
