SECRETARY'S REPORT OF 1914 BUSINESS OF FARMERS' FIRE INS. CO. OF LITTLE FALLS

The report of the secretary of the Farmers' Mutual Fire Insurance company of Little Falls, as given at the annual meeting held recently, shows that the company enjoyed a nice growth during 1914.

Four hundred and thirty-three policies, representing \$607,615 in insurance, were in force at the end of the year, as compared with 410 policies representing \$551,377 at the beginning of the year.
