CAPTURE OF 60,000 TEUTONS CLAIMED

RUSSIANS ROLLING DOWN UPON HUNGARY MAKE GREAT PROGRESS DURING THE WEEK.

VICTORIES NEAR BUKOWINA

Petrograd Reports Important Gains for Slavs in New Offensive Against Province—Land Forces May Attack Constantinople.

Petrograd, April 8.—Russian armies rolling down upon Hungary have captured more than 60,000 Austrians and Germans in the last week of fighting in the Carpathians, according to figures furnished by the war office. An official statement announced that in the Baligród-Uzok pass section alone the captives in seven days' fighting totaled 389 officers and 33,155 men, and that 17 cannon and 101 rapid frasers, as well as large quantities of ammunition, had been taken. Westward, in the fighting for the Lupkow pass, an equal number of prisoners have been taken, the war office announced, but exact figures were not available. Win Victory Near Bukowina. Official dispatches received here reported important victories for the Slavs in the new offensive against Bukowina. They were received several hours after the war office announced decided gains for the Russians by the capture of the Rostok pass and the villages of Smolnik and Orosz Ruszka, the latter town on the Hungarian side of the mountains and midway between the Lupkow and Uzok passes. After a battle that began last Wednesday the right wing of General Ivanoff's army captured the village of Okna, 18 miles northeast of Kolomea. Annihilate Two Battalions. "By a furious attack with fixed bayonets, our detachment captured the enemy's position, annihilating two Honved battalions," said the official statements. "We took 21 officers, 1,000 men and eight guns." The extreme left wing of Ivanhoff's army, operating northeast of Czernowitz, captured the village of Zamouchine, driving the Austrians back toward the Pruth. The extent of the new Russian victory in the Carpathians, reported in the official statement from the war office, was not clear in military circles. Whether the Russian force reported to have crossed the mountains and to have captured Orosz Ruszka were large or numbered only a few regiments was the question that puzzled military critics here. Menace Railway Heads. Leading south from Orosz Ruszka a good road follows the Cirkra river for ten miles to the town of Sztalesin, at the northern terminus of another railway stretching south into the Hungarian plains. If a Russian force of considerable size has routed its way through to Orosz Ruszka, the Slavs are now menacing two important railway heads, at Bartfeld and at Sztalesin, at the same time battling for possession of a trunk line leading south through Mezo Labore. Desperate fighting is reported in the Lupkow pass region and eastward toward the Uzok.

Only One Violation by British.

Washington, April 8.—Informally announcing the action of the British ambassador in transmitting a denial by the admiral of the British fleet off the Atlantic coast that his vessels had obtained provisions or supplies from American ports, Counselor Lansing, of the state department, said that with one exception the department had found no violation of neutrality in connection with supplies for British cruisers. Last September, Mr. Lansing explained, a wireless message arranging for a tug to take supplies to a British vessel was picked up. Representations were made by the Washington government at the time to the British foreign office, and it was said there had been no evidence to show that the attempt was ever repeated.

Hold Murder Suspects.

Aberdeen, S. D., April 8.—Roy Webb and Alex Peterson, Chicago, were arrested at Hettinger, N. D., and are being held at McIntosh on the charge of having murdered Edward A. Parker of New York here and then placing his body on the Milwaukee tracks where it was struck by a train. The men will be brought to Aberdeen by Sheriff Wyckhoff of this county.

Austrian Painter Dies.

Amsterdam, via London, April 8.—A dispatch received here from Salzburg announces the death of the Austrian painter, Franz von Pausinger.

To Grant Serbian Outlet.

Paris, April 8.—Italy and Serbia are about to conclude an agreement, telegraphs the correspondent of Excelsior, at Rome, upon the basis that Italy will not oppose Serbia's occupation of territory giving her an outlet to the Adriatic on condition that this territory be not fortified.
