Homemade Drag Good For Roads. This drag is designed for fining and packing soil for the better preservation of moisture. It is three and one-half feet wide, made of 2 by 8 inch lumber and put together with four inch spikes. The handles, which may be taken from a castaway implement, are two and one-half feet long. The chains are attached through auger holes. In making the notched cuts to give the required pitch for the drag boards take out three inches. The boards are two and one-half feet long.—Southern Agriculturist.
