RUSSIANS NEAR ROUMANIA

PUSH AHEAD IN BUKOWINA, LONDON HEARS.

Turkey Reported Sending Reinforcements Into Bulgaria — Division Placed to Menace Roumania.

London, ug. 23.—Political developments in the Balkans overshadow in interest for the moment even the important military operations in progress there. In connection with the attitude of Roumania the course of the Russian campaign in Bukowina, close to the Roumanian frontier, is being closely watched. Gain Brilliant Success. According to unofficial dispatches, the Russians are pushing ahead with the greatest energy in Bukowina, close to the Roumanian frontier, and already have gained "a brilliant success." The latest advices from Teuton sources, however, declare the Russians are being held up by the Teutonic resistance, not only in the Carpathian fighting, but along the entire front in Galicia and Volhynia. The king of Roumania received the German and Austrian ministers to Bucharest in private audience Monday according to a Cologne dispatch. Turks Threaten Roumania. A great battle of nations with the troops of nearly every European belligerent involved is gradually developing in the Balkans as the fighting along the 150-mile front increases in fury. Turkey is sending reinforcements into Bulgaria, according to an Athens dispatch. At least one division of Turkish soldiers is en route to join the Bulgars in the attack on the allied lines, while another division will be so placed as to threaten Roumania should that country decide to enter the war on the side of the Allies.

WILSON IS TOO BUSY TO VISIT SAN FRANCISCO

Declines Invitation Because of Many Critical Matters That Daily Demand Attention.

San Francisco, Aug. 24. — In response to an invitation asking President Wilson to be the guest of the San Francisco Commercial Club should he come to this city in connection with his campaign for re-election the President, in a letter made public here says: "Unhappily it is impossible for me to plan to go anywhere, particularly anywhere at a distance from Washington, while the many critical matters are pressing upon me that now daily demand my attention."
