MORE ROAD OIL PURCHASED

BY CITY COUNCIL—MORE MONEY APPROPRIATED FOR PIKE CREEK ROAD

An adjourned regular meeting was held at the city hall Friday evening by the city council. Bids were received for road oil and the Reliance Oil company, from which the last carload was purchased, was awarded the bid. Their price was 6.9 cents per gallon. F. P. Farrow was granted a permit to rebuild his livery barn a Second street northeast. The barn will be the same size as before but will have a flat roof. Street Commissioner LaFond reported that Second street northeast had been put in good condition by Axel Setterstrom, who had the contract to install the sewer there, and his bill for the balance on the contract, amounting to \$140, was allowed. Street Commissioner LaFond's payroll for \$199.01 for work on the Pike Creek road, was allowed and the council made another appropriation not to exceed \$200 to be spent on the road. The city clerk was instructed to advertise for bids for coal for the city hall. City Treasurer John Vertin presented his annual statement of the city finances, which was referred to the finance committee. They will figure out the tax levy for the coming year, which will be made at the next regular meeting, next Monday evening. C. A. Sprandel was granted a permit to repair the roof of his house, which is located at the corner of Third street and first avenue northeast, inside the city fire limits. The matter of fixing up First street northeast with brickpaving was brought up and was referred to the street committee. Alderman Brown stated that a roadway eighteen feet wide could be fixed up in this manner at a cost of about \$120 per block.

LARGER OPPORTUNITY FOR THE FARMER BOY

The Minnesota farm boy who wishes to specialize in some particular department of farming can now fit his agricultural school training to his specialty. This will be welcome news to many a farm boy. The School of Agriculture at University Farm, St. Paul, which opens for another year on Monday, October 2, has made practically 50 per cent of its courses elective. This makes it possible for the student to choose one particular line and place special emphasis upon his preparation for it. The school, moreover, is now open under advantageous terms not only to grammar school graduates, but to the high school graduate and non graduate as well. In other words, the high school graduate may enter the School of Agriculture and get full credit for such high school work as has been successfully done—48 credits for the regular high school course and 96 credits for the agricultural high school course. Similar credits are granted to girls who have completed high school work. The high school student who has not completed his or her high school course may also receive credit for such part of the course as has been successfully completed. Franz Larson, Ed. According to Attorney Vernon, Dr. Chance made application for the property to be sold and during the time it was being advertised died. His death prevented him from realizing his hope of obtaining the barren and rough island, valuable to him because of memories. Although the island is valueless, according to Attorney Vernon, the two sons gave instructions for obtaining the island regardless of the cost.
