

AITKIN SHUT OUT BY LOCALS

LILJEDAHL'S SQUAD MAKES FIRST GAME OF SEASON BY A 46 TO 0 SCORE

The Little Falls high school team copped the first game this season Saturday in an easy manner. Their victim was the Aitkin high school, the game being played at Aitkin, and the score of the locals (the others did not score), was 46. Owing to the presence of the entire Brainerd squad, with which the locals play tomorrow, Liljedahl's men did not use any modern football tactics but nevertheless went through the game without any particular interference on the part of their would-be opponents.

Scoring started but a couple minutes after the whistle was blown and from then on the locals were on Aitkin ground all the time, making one touchdown after another. Liljedahl believes that they could have piled up an immense score if they could have used anything but

straight football. Lloyd Tanner and Dobbyn were the best ground gainers for the locals but Richard also was on the job and secured two touchdowns. Only one fumble was made by the locals and that was recovered. They were weaker on the defense than on the offense, however. The absence of Captain Levin from the lineup was keenly felt and it is hoped that he will be able to be back in tomorrow's game. The locals lined up as follows: Norman Elvig, le; Wm. AGED PIERZ WOMAN PASSES AWAY AT ST. CLOUD

St. Cloud, Minn., Oct. 12.—Mrs. Barbara Leidenfrost, aged 87 years, died yesterday afternoon at St. Joseph's home after an illness of several days, due to her advanced age. Mrs. Leidenfrost had been at St. Joseph's home for the past two years. The remains were shipped to Pierz, where they will be buried. The funeral will be held from the Catholic church there Monday evening. The deceased was born in Austria. The family came to America at the close of the Civil war in 1865. They settled first in Dane county, Wis., and removed later to Pierz, where they made their permanent home. Mr. Leidenfrost died about six years ago. Six children survive to mourn the loss of the mother. They are John, Leopold and Wilhelm Leidenfrost and Mrs. Clara Yurbig and Mrs. Adam Virnie, all of Pierz, and Mrs. Mary Roeh of Minneapolis.


