MAY PROBE IN WALL STREET

BROADER POWERS GIVEN COMMITTEE INVESTIGATING

Testimony May Be Taken Elsewhere Than in Washington Which May Mean Gotham Money Market.

Washington, Jan. 18. — The House by unanimous consent has authorized the note leak committee to employ counsel and accountants and hold hearings here or "elsewhere." The "elsewhere" may be in Wall street, New York. After a preliminary delay in the House, Representative Pou of the leak committee asked unanimous consent to extend the life of the committee 30 days. The request was granted. No witnesses were heard by the committee Wednesday. Hughes May Be Counsel. Charles Evans Hughes, late Republican candidate; Samuel Untermyer and Frank W. Lehman are among those suggested for the committee's counsel. 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WILL BE FLOATED IN THIS COUNTRY BY J. P. MORGAN.

New York, Jan. 18.—Another new British loan, amounting to \$250,000,000 will be floated in this country by J. P. Morgan and company, that banking firm has announced. This is the third flotation, including the Anglo-French, of British loans in the United States since the outbreak of the war. The new loan, secured by high grade collateral, will take the form of 5 1/2 per cent convertible notes, dated February 1, 1917, \$100,000,000 to mature in one year and the balance in two years.

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ROYALTON CONSIDERING ERECTION OF NEW VILLAGE HALL

ROYALTON, VILLAGE HALL. Project which is of great importance to the progress of the village of Royalton has been on foot for some time. Commercial club, viz: that of the erection of a new village hall something that would fill a long-felt and much-needed want in more ways than one. To further the plan and at the same time get definite information on the subject from reliable authority the club at a special meeting Tuesday had a member of a firm of Minneapolis architects, A. M. Dean, meet with them and submit plans and drawings of a building which can be put up for \$15,000; said building to be of reinforced concrete and brick, 4x30 feet, with a single story and a second story, the lower floor to have a twelve-foot ceiling and the upper story a fourteen-foot ceiling. It is proposed that up to the first floor shall be located space for the fire apparatus, hose drying racks, offices for the use of village officials. The upper floor to be devoted to a council chamber of ample proportions, cloak rooms and an auditorium of not less than 30x50 feet which could be used for general purposes, such as, basket ball games, etc., with a 12-foot stage across the rear end. The structure would be strictly fireproof and would answer the purposes for which it would be erected, for many decades to come. We believe it to be a project that will meet with hearty approval by the majority of the progressive citizens of Royalton, and in order to get the matter where public opinion on the question of erecting a building which will express itself, a committee was appointed at the Tuesday evening meeting to canvass the village and solicit signatures to a petition to the village council to have the question of issuing village bonds to the extent of \$15,000 to secure funds to defray the cost of the erection of such a structure voted upon at the coming spring election. Another committee was also appointed to formulate more detailed plans concerning such a building and get the views of the village council on the same. Attorney Byron R. Wilson was also instructed to act in his capacity as secretary of the club to look into the necessary legal aspects of the matter, and, among other things, to ascertain the amount in case the proposition carries at the spring election. The club is also sending out circulars to the effect that the proposed building made for publication in order to give our citizens an idea of how the building would appear.
