Mrs. Frank Renick of this city and niece, Miss Esther Renick of Richland Center, Wis., visited relatives in Roy-alton Wednesday.


Albert Swanson of Brainerd was in the city Tuesday, enroute to Valparaiso, Ind., where he attends Valparaiso university.






